Happy New Year and welcome to 2013! As we move forward into the new year, we wanted to communicate some of the major goals and objectives we've set for 2013. The Desert Ridge Community Association

Board will be concentrated on achieving six major goals:

Maintain Budget and Fiscal Discipline

Over the past four years, we have focused on reducing costs and finding creative ways to live within our budget. Those efforts have paid off with four straight years of balanced budgets, reserves that are funded above 100% and refunds to our membership exceeding \$250,000 in the past two years. We will continue to stay under budget and expand the services provided to our members.

Reduce Association Fees

With our reserves fully funded, our Board has elected to refund unspent funds back to our membership for two years in a row. Our continued efforts to reduce costs may



create an opportunity to eliminate refunds and permanently reduce fees charged to our members near the end of 2013. Note: we have not increased fees since they were set 18 years ago in 1994.

Increase Community Safety and Awareness

We will introduce a new Community Awareness Committee (CAC) that focuses on fighting crime, reducing graffiti and strengthening Block Watch neighborhoods within Desert Ridge. Our Off-duty Officer Patrol Program alone reduced property crime over 30% last year. You can read more about this important committee on page 15 of the magazine.

Continue Reinvestment into our Community

In 2012, we reinvested over \$1.25 million of reserve funds into maintenance and enhancement projects within Desert Ridge. We will uphold the same high standards for maintenance and repairs throughout 2013. Our new office with additional meeting space will become an important asset for our community.

Develop and Implement Pet Waste Plan

We have received a number of complaints regarding pet waste in Desert Ridge. A field study has confirmed an issue exists and indicates that a large-scale solution is needed. We will develop and implement a plan to dramatically reduce pet waste.

Expand www.desertridgelifestyles.com Website

The initial development of the www. desertridgelifestyles.com website has created an excellent base for communicating information to our members. We will continue to expand and develop this important tool.

We're thankful for your support and look forward to accomplishing great things with you.

Building a Better Community

Well another year has come and gone. 2012 was memorable in many ways, both nationally and locally, some great things and some horrific things. The passage of time comes along so very quickly; it seems just vesterday we were basking in the 115 degree heat of July, ok, maybe not basking but roasting for sure. A new year is upon us, new challenges, new dreams, and new commitments to improve and whether it is to get in shape, quit smoking, be more involved in your community, or whatever other personal and professional goals you have set for yourself, it is important to remember that change can only happen when you decide it will happen.

Your neighborhood and community is an important aspect of your life and your family. You choose a neighborhood based on many things; schools, proximity to work or activities, friends or family, the style of the home, sales price, and also figured somewhere in that equation, safety. The safety of neighborhoods and each and every individual in that community is our responsibility at the Phoenix Police

Department. We take great pride in serving and protecting you and working to improve the quality of life in your neighborhood. Recently every City of Phoenix police officer from the Chief on down reaffirmed their oath, to you, our citizens, as a reminder of this commitment to serve. In building a better community and improving the quality of life, crime prevention plays an

important role. I have written many articles on the various aspects of preventing crime, from burglary, auto theft, identity theft, drug prevention and so on, all in an attempt to help each and every one of you protect yourself and your family as much as possible. We as police officers are your partners in this endeavor, and will be there when you call and also when you don't call, out patrolling the streets of your neighborhood as you sleep, work or enjoy time with your family. We do need your help and your commitment to improve your community because it is a partnership between the police and citizens; we have the same goal and we can achieve it by working together. How can we do that is a question I get often. Many of you have started a Block Watch in your area, which is a very good way to learn and practice good crime prevention at your home and get to know your neighbors. Knowing your neighbors is at the top of the list when I teach Block Watch. I am not asking you to know every detail of your neighbors lives but knowing what I call your "primary" neighbors. These are the ones next to you and the three across the street from you and knowing just the minimum amount of information (at least their names and a good way to communicate with them,

either phone numbers or email address) will go a long way in preventing some types of neighborhood crime. Knowing what is suspicious activity for your neighborhood. Knowing your children's friends and their parents in the neighborhood also helps in building a better community, this was a staple of many neighborhoods in the past and it does exist today, but to a lesser degree. Having community events like street parties is a great way to improve the connectivity of neighborhoods. If you live on streets owned and maintained by the City of Phoenix, you can get permission from the Streets and Transportation Department to close them off for a short time for a neighborhood street party. If they are private streets, get with the HOA or Community Manager and find out what the process is to having a neighborhood street party.


There is a common theme in most crime prevention and that is communication and awareness, communicate with your kids, your neighbors, your kids schools and your police department. If you see something suspicious in your neighborhood, call Crime Stop at 602-262-6151 or for crimes in progress, 911. I am contacted numerous times asking if I am aware of something going on in a neighborhood. With a city of

> 1.6 million and an area of responsibility for me of 85 square miles and 90,000 people, it is sometimes difficult for me to hear of everything going on but I do keep in contact with all of the communities I serve as much as possible so that I may respond with the needed resources to address whatever issue comes up. I occasionally send out community safety emails if I have important public

The Desert Ridge Community Association Nominating Committee is pleased to announce the 2013 election for four (4) open seats on the Board of Directors. The election results will be announced during the Association's Annual Membership Meeting and Election on Thursday, April 18, 2013. However, there are several steps and events that will take place between now and then. Here are a few key dates in 2013, to keep in mind:

- FEBRUARY 14 Board Candidate application forms due to the Association office on High Street.
- FEBRUARY 27 DRCA Board of Directors meeting Board Candidates Meet and Greet/Q&A at 6 p.m. at the Association office on High Street.
- MARCH 16 DRCA Board of Directors meeting Board Candidates Meet and Greet/Q&A at the Cashman Park Spring Picnic from 11 a.m. 3 p.m.
- APRIL 11 Mail-in ballots for election of Board of Directors due from all members to the Association office by 5 p.m.
- APRIL 18 7:00 p.m., Annual Meeting and announcement of election results will be held at the JW Marriott Desert Ridge Resort & Spa.

BOARD CANDIDATE QUALIFICATIONS

The qualifications established by the Desert Ridge Community Association's ("Association") Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, Restrictions and Easements



for Desert Ridge as recorded and amended (CC&R's) and the Association's Nominating Committee per Section 3.8 of the Association's Bylaws for being nominated to serve on the Board are listed below. Please review each item closely before submitting your Candidate Form for consideration.

ALL CANDIDATES MUST BE:

As required per the CC&R's, all items must be complied with through the election at the Annual Meeting:

- An entity owner of record in the Association or a representative of an entity owner of record in the Association. If you are a representative of a confirmed entity owner of record you must provide a signed, notarized letter from the owner of record, appointing you as its' representative.
- A member in good standing, with all assessments current (no more than 30 days delinquent) and no outstanding violation of the CC&R's.
- Not have member rights suspended by the Board of Directors for any violations of the Association's governing documents.

- Not be involved in current litigation regarding compliance or dispute with Association's governing documents.
- Commit to attend regularly scheduled board meetings (at least once a month), as well as the additional time that may be required in order to participate at the committee level.

Additional Qualifications Established by the Association's Nominating Committee:

- All candidates are required to attend one (1) "Meet the Candidate" event either the Board of Directors Meeting on Wednesday, February 27, at 6 p.m. or the Cashman Park Spring Picnic on March 16 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.
- Must attend the Annual Meeting 7:00 p.m., Thursday, April 18, 2013.
- Must attend the Organizational Meeting scheduled within 5 business days of the Annual Meeting.
- Must attend Board Member training, scheduled within 10 business days of the Annual Meeting.

BOARD CANDIDATE FAQ'S

What does the Nominating Committee do?

The Nominating Committee's primary function is to ensure that the community has well qualified candidates nominated from the Desert Ridge community to serve as Members of the Community Association Board of Directors.

What does the Nominating Committee have planned for this year?

A Board candidate announcement was included in the Holiday 2012 issue of the DRL Magazine. This issue contains the board candidate qualifications and email address for the application forms. A "Meet the Candidate" event at the Cashman Park Spring Picnic is scheduled for Saturday, March 16, 11 a.m. - 3 p.m. so that members of the community can meet prospective Board Members.

How many positions are available this year and how long will my term be?

Out of the seven member seats on the Board of Directors, there are four seats on the Board of Directors that are available for election in 2013. Directors are elected to serve two year terms. This year, one of the available seats is a result of a Director resignation in 2012; this position will be elected for a one year term to complete the original unexpired two year term. The remaining three positions will serve two year terms.

What is the process for running for a position on the Board?

Contact the Association office at: 480-551-4550 or email to: desertridge@rossmar.com or stop by the Association office (5415 E. High Street, Suite 220, Phoenix 85054) to pick up the application.

Return all application forms to the Association office no later than 5 p.m. on Friday, February 15.

In addition, candidates are strongly encouraged to attend one (1) "Meet the Candidate" event on Wednesday February 27, or on Saturday, March 16. Candidates must attend the Desert Ridge Community Association Annual Membership Meeting and Election on Thursday, April 18.

What are the Directors' responsibilities?

The Desert Ridge Community
Association is an Arizona-chartered,
nonprofit organization. Directors are
responsible for operating and maintaining
the "common area" property of the
community, reviewing and approving
all site plans and improvements
within the community, and providing
coordination and oversight of the
Subsidiary Associations. Luckily, we have
a management company that handles
most of the day-to-day operations.

What is the time commitment needed while serving on the Board?

The Board typically holds one Open Session and one Executive Session per month, which takes approximately 3 hours, combined. Sometimes there are ad-hoc meetings called, but that is more the exception than the rule. Depending on which committee you would like to be involved with, an additional 1-2 hours per week may be required. Typically, the time commitment averages about 8 hours a month.

When and where are the Board of Directors Meetings?

The meeting schedule is actually created by the Board of Directors. Our current meeting schedule is the 4th Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m., at CityCenter of CityNorth, Desert Ridge Community Association Office Conference Room, 5415 E. High Street, Suite 220, Phoenix 85054.

Do you incur personal liability by serving on the Board?

Generally, as long as a Director acts in good faith with the best interests of the community first, doesn't break any laws, or have any personal benefit, the Association indemnifies the Directors. The Association's Articles of Incorporation provide the most comprehensive explanation of liability. Please read and understand them fully for yourself. The Articles of Incorporation can be found on RossmarConnect, the community information website, or the CD.

How does the election actually work?

There is a one vote per lot for each available position on the board. A qualified Owner will be able to cast one vote for up to 4 candidates.

Do developers and commercial entities get to vote?

Yes, qualified developers and commercial entities get to vote. The Desert Ridge Board is not a Homeowners Association, it is a Community Association. One of the great things about Desert Ridge is that it is still a relatively young development, and only about 35% of the total lots have homes built on them. Since the voting is determined per lot, there is still significant involvement by private and commercial developers and the Master Developer. The Master Developer actually casts votes for all land held by the Arizona State Land Dept.

Tips for people who are running:

Get out there and talk to your neighbors - ask them what their concerns are for the community. Let them know you're running. Candidates may speak with developers as well as the commercial interests. And thank you for getting involved!

Operation Hope continues to work toward educating the general public and parents with information and current news in the war against drugs. In our last meeting, we were presented with the latest issues of what the new bath salts are made of and how quickly these drugs get "recompounded" so that they are not subject to the current

laws. What this means to us is that our police cannot arrest someone for using a drug that is not listed as against the law. In other words, our police department has been held hostage to some of the laws we have – not because of their intention but because of wording. But now we are fortunate enough to have Representative Heather Carter to help.

Representative Heather Carter is serving in the Centennial Legislature as your representative from North Phoenix, Cave

Creek, Carefree and Scottsdale. Currently, Representative Carter is the Vice-Chair of the Health and Human Services Committee, and a member of the Education and Environment Committees. She focuses on legislative issues related to economic recovery for Arizona, including taxpayer protection issues, health care concerns and educational reform. She attended our last meeting and has volunteered to look into the potential of changing the wording on some of these laws to say "mimics the affect of" and not just leaving the wording to that single drug. This would go a long way toward getting some of these drugs into the category of illegal and therefore into the hands of our police.

We also were presented with the Anthem approach to handling some of the issues our parents face. We will moniter the Anthem approach and will provide updates in future issues or Board Meetings.

Working Towards A Bright Future

In addition, the Deer Valley and Paradise Valley Unified School districts are also on board with their support and concern. They recognize that getting the word to the parents of their students is the most important part of this project. With parental recognition and backing, our students will be helped on all sides to have a bright future without drugs.

We want to again thank our police department for sponsoring this Operation and for walking through this problem with our community. In particular, our thanks goes to Commander Klima, Lt. De Benedetto and Sgt. Jamie Rothchild for their time and care.

- Promote and foster programs that encourage all residents to acquire continuing education in neighborhood security, CPR, first-aid, emergency preparedness;
- Improve and strengthen awareness of crime in the Desert Ridge Community through communication and education;
- Develop a closer working relationship with the Phoenix Police Department through our Community Action Officer;
- Encourage and recruit volunteers from within the community to form and serve on neighborhood block watch groups;
- Obtain, coordinate installation and maintain "Neighborhood Block Watch" signs in the respective neighborhoods that have officially become a block watch neighborhood recognized by the Phoenix Police Department;
- Develop crime prevention or awareness programs, seminars, training for the association such as Neighborhood Block Watch Programs;
- Organize and promote yearly the "Getting Arizona Involved In Neighborhoods" (G.A.I.N) event;
- Promote Social and Charitable Events, Fundraising, Block Parties, Clubs, etc. designed to encourage community involvement and awareness.

The Committee will consist of one Chairperson, a Vice Chairperson and the President of the Desert Ridge Community Association Board, who will act as the liaison between the committee and the Desert Ridge subassociations and subdivisions neighborhoods. 

Humans, on the other hand, enjoy the benefits of eating with our teeth, adding a great deal of variety (and enjoyment) to our diet. Through neglect, trauma, or other circumstances, we may lose some or all of our permanent teeth. The result can lead to a decreased ability to eat and poor dental appearance. It wasn't too long ago that removable dentures were too common of a solution to missing teeth. These types of dentures



were often difficult to chew with, uncomfortable, and needed frequent replacement. Better dental awareness, home care, and regular dental checkups have each decreased the loss of permanent teeth. However, in the cases when teeth need to be replaced, modern dental advances have led to successful placement of fixed bridges, implants, and implant supported dentures that can better replicate the benefits of natural teeth. If you are missing any permanent teeth (and don't want to restrict your diet to that of the Blue Whale), talk with your dentist about treatment options to restore your ability to enjoy the benefits of your teeth.

It started early when Community Manager Ken Olson left for a new position at Rossmar & Graham. Terrance Smith, our new Community Manager, was hired and the transition was completed without any issues.

We also saw a change in master developers, as Gray Development Group of Phoenix acquired control of the 140 acres of CityCenter of CityNorth from North Phoenix Partners (NPP) and with it, the rights of master developer.

And speaking of CityCenter of CityNorth... a new lease, expanding the size of the Association's office, was signed and preparations have been made for a February 2013 move to CityCenter of CityNorth.

Other significant events from the past year include:

FINANCES

- For the fifth year in a row, we were under budget saving an estimated \$225,000
- Reserve fund investments generated a whopping 3.7% return on FDIC insured accounts

- Members received another refund bringing the two-year total to more than \$250,000
- Association reserve funds remain funded significantly above 100%
- An updated reserve study with an on-site visit was completed
- Reinvested over \$1.25 million in improvements and repairs throughout Desert Ridge

- Created a new Picnic in the Park event
- Created a new Movie in the Park event
- Introduced evening Coffee Club meetings
- Hosted a series of meetings for residents on the new Black Mountain Boulevard
- Finalized the design of Cashman Park and presented it to the membership
- Expanded the holiday lighting at Deer Valley Road and Tatum Boulevard
- Enlarged the Holiday Lighting Contest to 40 homes and added "Ollie the Trolley".
- Supported the Farmers Market, Aviano 4th of July fireworks event
- Sponsored Boys & Girls Club Basketball League and Aviano Jingle Bells Festival

SAFETY

■ Reduced crime by 30% with Off-Duty Officer Patrol program

- Expanded the Off-Duty Officer Patrol Program from 15 to 25 shifts
- Partnered with Explorer and neighbors to create new student pickup/dropoff plan

- Published four fantastic magazines, expanding the publication to 36 full color pages
- Met the requirements for quorum at every board meeting for the 5th year in a row
- Improved and expanded the community website and email communications to members

- Enhancement of the Desert Ridge Monuments at Tatum & Deer Valley with new landscape plants, Saguaros, lighting and boulders at a total cost of \$61,380.52
- Performed Coconino Wash Erosion Repairs at a total cost of \$5,517.31
- Replaced 275 common area valve box covers, including placement of filter fabric and pea gravel in each box at a total cost of \$6,998.97
- Approved the installation of 27 walkway light bollards in the Glen Eagle and Maricopa Washes at a total cost of \$165,316.89
- Approved the Maricopa Wash Erosion Repairs at a total cost of \$105,362.28
- Replaced over 90 common area sidewalk hazards identified throughout the community at a total cost of \$49,310.00
- Replaced common area tree damage walls abutting private residences at a cost of \$5,013.80
- Replaced the uneven sidewalks identified along the five (5) bridges throughout Desert Ridge at a total cost of \$15,327.74



- Approved replacement of the 17 year-old Central Irrigation Controller System and related components that serves the entire community at a total cost of \$226,586.72
- Approved Annual Tree Trimming and Tree Replacements to be performed at a cost of \$78,434.61
- Negotiated with City of Phoenix an initial "no-cost" plan for paying and leveling

the abutting pavement before and after the four (4) designated scored concrete intersections within Desert Ridge, scheduled to occur in the Spring of 2013

It takes a great deal of effort and coordination to achieve this growth. I'd like to thank every member of our board for the countless hours they devote without compensation and for the members of our Association who have supported us. WINTER LANDSCAPE TIPS FOR SOUTHERN ARIZONA



The mild winter of Southern Arizona entices both locals and snowbirds to the outdoors where they revel in sunny cool days and ideal conditions for patio living. However, the sunny days and Sunday barbecues might fool some into believing that Southern Arizona is full of blooms and color in the winter. In fact, many of our landscape plants, especially native species, are dormant in winter.

However, there is no need to suffer a dull and boring winter landscape. With careful plan-ning and plant selection, you can create attractive combinations that glow in the lovely rich light of the cool season. Evergreen trees, dramatic accent plants, winter flowering shrubs, and native wildflowers are some of the living elements to consider. Vividly colored walls and other hardscape elements can serve as eye catching backdrops for sculptural plants like ocotillo or create "hot" combinations with contrasting flowers.

Keep in mind that very cold winters can frost back even the toughest plants and that warm microclimates might be best for some species. Here are some additional tips to add color, texture, and interest to your winter landscape:

■ If you have an existing landscape with plants that go dormant in winter, interplant evergreen species to create interest and "cover" the bare ones. For example, the evergreen foliage of damianita can be used to hide the leafless stems of red bird-of-paradise in winter. Make sure to leave sufficient room for the dormant plant to achieve its full size in summer.





- Plant evergreens of different colors and textures to create attractive combinations. Wooly Butterfly Bush, with its gray, fuzzy foliage, looks good with the green, needle-like foliage of Tur-pentine Bush. Gopher weed is a prostrate plant with pointed leaves that con-trasts nicely with its vertical, leafless relative, Candelilla.
- Combine "hot" colored flowers together for great effect in the golden light of winter. For example, pansies, calendulas, and Iceland poppies in a pot create bright splashes that liven up a patio or entryway. Another benefit of pansies and calendulas is that they are edible and add as much color to a salad as they do to the outdoors!
- Use other colorful edible plants like red leaf lettuces, gray-green Russian kale, and chard, which has stems that range from white to pink to orange and red.
- Plant container gardens. They are easy to care for, can be located in frost protected areas, and can be emptied for summer or moved out of the way. Attractive, colorful pots add to the effect.

Guests can share in a journey of Italian cuisine guided by an experienced staff through an array of mouth-watering small plates, generous sharing dishes and individual entrees.

At Tuscany, hand-crafted pizzas, delicious pastas and authentic cheeses rule the day. A seasonal menu focuses on locally grown produce fresh from local farms, as well as their very own organic herb garden. Our team of tasters enjoyed this evening of food and Italian style fun.

Here's what we found:

ANTIPASTI BAR

This appetizer is a fun and inventive way to create your own plate of Charcuterie. Make your own cutting board plate full of cured meats, delicious spreads and flavorful cheese. We recommend the Salami, Prosciutto San Daniele and hand pulled Mozzarella. Be sure you don't overlook the "to die for" Maple Walnuts. The EVOO drizzled bread served with this appetizer was simply unbelievable.

VEAL MARSALA

Tender Veal, ridiculously fresh wild mushrooms, spinach and the same Mozzarella we raved about in the appetizer all covered in a delicious Marsala Sauce. This was by far our favorite entrée.

WILD MUSHROOM PIZZA

A delicious pizza full of shallots, truffle oil, chives and sweet onions, perfectly cooked in authentic wood-fired pizza ovens. This pie had wonderful flavors, a nice balance of toppings and a drizzle of truffle oil that tied it all together beautifully.

SALSICCIA PIZZA

The flavors of sausage, garlic sauce, Peppadew peppers and spinach come together in this fantastic pizza dish. A healthy kick of crushed red-pepper for heat and sweet spinach made this pizza a favorite.

SWEET CORN GNOCCHI

Of all the dishes our group tasted, the gnocchi was the least appreciated. We felt the consistency was off and it was just too chewy. The accompanying sauce was flavorless and we would not order this entrée again.





VEAL RAVIOLI

The taste of spinach pasta, zucchini, brown butter and oregano came together in this tender homemade pasta. There was a hint of sweetness and a melt in your mouth goodness we just couldn't get enough of.

RISOTTO

A signature dish of Tuscany made of English peas, pancetta and sunny-up eggs.

We love risotto and this dish was no exception with its rich, complex and hearty flavors. Next time, we may add the optional spicy prawns, or rotisserie chicken.

BLACK AND WHITE

Half chocolate brownie and half chocolate chip cookie, this dessert is served warm with house-made vanilla ice cream. While we enjoyed the taste, it was your standard fare found at a number of other Desert Ridge restaurants.

BERRIES IN HEAVEN

The name says it ALL. Fresh berries floating in a light, airy custard made with Limoncello, cream and mascarpone. HEAVEN served in an old style canning jar.

TIRAMISU

An Italian classic, but this Tiramisu was a little too sweet and a bit on the dry side for our taste.
