From the President Living with Wildlife



Living in Desert Ridge, we have an opportunity to experience the real beauty of the Sonoran Desert. With five seasons to enjoy, we live among some of the most

attractive desert flora and fauna in the world - a spectacular natural playground.

While there is much too enjoy, we must also have a healthy respect for the many desert creatures that live here with us. On any given day in Desert Ridge, you'll see quail, doves, hummingbirds and rabbits; less often, you might encounter larger animals including bobcats, coyotes, javelina and owls. While most of these larger animals are seen from a distance, occasionally there is conflict.

Attracted by food, water, shelter and shade it's important to protect our children and pets from these desert dwellers. The walls surrounding our properties feel safe, but they are no match for a bobcat that can jump almost 12 feet, or a covote that can leap nearly as high and run at 40 miles per hour.

To prevent conflict:

- Remove anything outside your home that may be attracting wildlife. This includes garbage, pet food, water sources, and bird feeders that can attract rodents and birds for these predators eat.
- Allow wildlife to be wild; never feed wild animals.
- Encourage your neighbors not to feed wildlife or leave anything out that might attract the animals.
- Feed your pets inside, and never leave them unattended, especially at dusk and

dawn when animals are most active. If it's necessary to leave a small pet outside unattended, keep it in a sturdy enclosure with a roof.

- Trim and remove any ground-level shrubs and branches that provide hiding places or den sites for coyotes and other animals.
- Secure garbage containers and eliminate odors by cleaning trashcans with a 10 percent chlorine bleach solution. Put trash containers out on the morning of pickup, not the night before.

Cat Owners

The only way to guarantee your cat's safety is to keep it indoors. Outdoor cats face great danger from desert animals, as well as cars.

Dog Owners

■ Keep your dog on a short leash while

Each year we ask ourselves, "what is it we can do to help others? Is a handful of change dropped in Santa's bucket in front of the grocery store enough,


or can we do more?" The residents at Sagewood, a Life Care Services community just down the road from the Musical Instrument Museum, do more every day, and especially during the holidays.

You'd Better Watch Out

For most of us, the holidays are a time of joy and celebration. Criminals however, see the holidays as an opportunity to take advantage of either our lightened mood, or seasonal distractions, when our guard is less likely to be up. So to help prevent any "Grinches" from stealing your holiday joy, here are some tips to keep in mind and help you get through the season safely.

WHEN SHOPPING, OR OUT AND ABOUT

- Take only the credit cards you need when shopping. Leave the others in a safe place at home.
- When paying with a credit card, make sure that the card is not easily visible to others around you. There are crooks that can memorize your card number in a matter of seconds.
- Keep your purse or wallet close to you at all times.
- Do not carry excessive or unnecessary cash
- Shop in the daylight if possible. When shopping after dark always park in a well-lit area.
- Shop with a friend when possible, because there's safety in numbers.
- Do not leave your purse, wallet, cell phone, or any other valuables in plain view.
- When you return to your vehicle, scan the interior to be sure no one is hiding inside.
- When placing purchases from the stores in your vehicle, place them out of sight. The best place is in the trunk.
- After putting packages in your vehicle, drive to different row before going to another store. Do this even if you are simply going back to the same store.
- Try not to park next to a larger vehicle, that blocks your vision while you are entering or exiting your vehicle.



- Have your keys out and ready when approaching your vehicle.
- Hide your garage door opener. Many people leave mail, or other info with their address, in the car. This makes it easy for a thief to get in through your garage.
- Black out your address on your registration. The reason the address is on there is simply for mailing. In the event of a traffic stop, the police do not need to see the address on the paper.

WHEN HOME

- To help prevent vandalism, turn off inflatable decorations at a specific time. If convenient, bring them up to the front porch or close to the house.
- Keep the front of the house well lit and make sure that trees and bushes are trimmed so that doors and windows can easily be seen.
- Install an alarm system if possible (see my article from the Spring issue).
- Beware of door-to-door charity scams.
- Keep an eye out for parcel deliveries; packages on porches are big targets.

 Make sure that smoke and carbon monoxide detectors have fresh batteries and are functioning properly (Make sure that you have smoke and carbon monoxide detectors).

WHEN LEAVING TOWN

- Have mail held at the post office while you're away.
- Use timers on lights to give the appearance that someone is home.
- Let a loved one or someone else that you trust know the route that you're taking. This goes especially if you will be traveling in snowy or icy conditions.
- Register for Vacation Watch with the City of Phoenix Police department.

By utilizing those tips, having heightened awareness, and by using some common sense, we can all have a safer and more joyous holiday season.

Finally, I'm pleased to announce that due to last year's success, your DRCA Board of Directors has once again authorized extra off-duty Phoenix police patrols during the holiday season. Remember, although Phoenix police officers do a fantastic job but they can't be everywhere all the time. That is why it is so important to know and communicate with your neighbors and to keep looking for things that are out of place in your neighborhood. You can help make Desert Ridge a safer and better place to live by starting or participating in a neighborhood block watch program. 

The holidays are a time for family, friends and festivities, but you won't be celebrating if you're spending the night at the emergency vet clinic with a sick pet. Maricopa County Animal Care & Control (MCACC) offers some advice and safety tips to keep you and your pet happy this holiday season.

Food is in abundance during family gatherings but resist the urge to share with your pets.

Human food is too high in fat for our dogs and cats. Most pet owners know that chocolate can be toxic to pets, but beware of other types

of candy. Colorful candy wrappers can be tempting and if swallowed, may create blockages in your pet's intestines. Don't assume all vegetables are safe for your dog or cat -- onions, garlic and scallions can lead to toxic anemia in pets. Be sure to ask your guests not to feed table scraps to your pets and ask them to keep food (and alcohol) out of paws reach!

When decorating your home for the holidays, try to look at things from your pet's perspective. Are those glass ornaments

hanging on low branches? Is that candle's flame too tempting for curious cats? Does the shiny tinsel attract too much attention from furry family members? Glass embedded in pet's paws, burnt fur and tinsel in the intestinal tract are just a few accidents you can avoid if you pet proof your home for the holidays. Consider using ornaments that won't shatter or leave the bottom branches of your tree undecorated. Never leave your pet unattended in a room with lit candles. Avoid using tinsel or other types of décor that can be easily swallowed by a rambunctious pet.

We've all seen the image of the adorable puppy peeking out from under the lid of a gift wrapped box, but MCACC asks that you don't give pets as gifts. Adopting a dog or cat is a very personal choice and is something best done by the person wanting to adopt. Consider presenting your loved one with a gift basket filled with dog or cat toys, bedding, food, and the promise to visit a local shelter. Not only are you giving the purrfect gift – you're also saving a life!

If you plan to host parties or festivities at your home, it's imperative that your dog or cat be wearing identification. The constant opening and closing of the front door makes it easy for pets to slip out unnoticed. If your animal does get out and ends up at the shelter, current ID will help ensure that you are reunited with your four-legged family member.

Finally, this is a busy time of year and humans aren't the only ones who can feel stressed. The hustle and bustle of houseguests and parties can cause our pets to become a bit anxious. If possible, give them a spare room where they can escape the crowd and chill out. Be sure they have some of their favorite toys, bed, food and water. Turn on the television or radio to drown out the sounds of the festivities.

Be thankful for your pets this holiday season. Their unconditional love is one of the greatest gifts we can ever receive.

truck carrying John and three other soldiers, and sent it flying off the edge of a cliff. His brain injury was so severe that at first he was not expected to ever walk or talk again.

After learning to walk and stand with severe pain, John made the difficult decision to have his legs amputated below his knees. He now has prosthetics and his dream is to compete in an off-road marathon involving a run through the desert, a mountain-bike race, and a competitive swim.

In July, Jared Allen's Homes for Wounded Warriors closed on a home in Phoenix, Arizona for John, followed by an official Demolition Ceremony that took place on September 6th, 2014.











This is Nyanhongo's seventh year participating in the event.

"Hidden in the Hills is a great platform for

artists and collectors to meet. It offers a great opportunity for the public to learn more about how all masterpieces are made and provides artists an opportunity to market their work," states Nyanhongo. "It's a family of love, support and happiness!"

Born in Zimbabwe, Nyanhongo was born into an artistic family. He comes from a family of famous sculptors that includes his father, Claude, and sister Agnes. After an apprenticeship with the internationally acclaimed sculptor Joseph Ndandarika, Nyanhongo shot to stardom in the early 1990's. He has been critically acclaimed as one of the top stone sculptors in the world today.

FREEZE WARNING!



Sub-freezing temperatures are forecasted for the Phoenix Metro areas this coming weekend. Make sure to wrap any above ground irrigation piping, and if possible, drain them with the ball valves open 1/8 of a turn (half open). If shut down and drainage is not an option, schedule drip


zones to run long cycles over night far from sidewalks, trails, or places of gathering to prevent slips and injuries during the morning hours. The constant movement of water helps to prevent water from freezing since water in under-ground piping stays above 32F. This is also a good practice for your own system at home whether it's for irrigation, pool, or the water service into your house.

Cover frost sensitive plants like Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, Lantana, and Winter Annuals. Use any paper or cloth-like material (old sheets or towels) to cover the plant. Frost cloths are also available at local

nurseries or home improve-ment stores. Make sure to cover the plant all the way to the ground to help trap any heat radiating from the ground. Plants that are dry are more likely to get frost

damage, so water them before the frost.

Delay mowing start times for later into the day, after the frost burns off. Frozen grass is not only a safety issue but heavy equipment and even walking on turf can cause damage.

When Wildlife Isn't Wild Anymore

Wild animals such as bobcats, coyotes and javelinas are becoming more and more common visitors to Desert Ridge backyards. You've likely heard people say, "Wildlife is being pushed out of the desert because of human development... that's why we're seeing more of it". This is a common myth. You might be surprised at the *real* reason that we are seeing wild animals more frequently in our local neighborhoods.

It is true that because the Desert Ridge Community is surrounded by natural desert and greenways, that wildlife is plentiful. What you might not realize is that we, the human residents, are both the problem and the potential solution to wildlife issues in our own backyards.

Wildlife is content to live on the fringes of human development, but when what we provide is more attractive than the alternative, we are essentially laying out the welcome mat. Animals seek out the same things we do when deciding where to visit or live... basic needs, comfort and safety. In the case of wildlife, this is defined as ample food, water and shelter. Wildlife issues are in fact, a neighborhood and community-wide issue.

Coyotes, javelinas and bobcats have home ranges larger than your cul-de-sac. Yet, each of us has our own threshold of how closely we want to live with wildlife, and we send mixed messages. Are you doing everything you can to discourage coyotes from your backyard, while your neighbor throws table scraps over the fence for wildlife? Is your spouse putting out dishes of food for the neighborhood cats, and javelinas and raccoons are attracted to the leftovers after dark? Maybe you take pictures and quietly

observe a family of bobcats lounging by your pool, though you or your neighbors have small dogs—similar in size to their natural prey items—running around in the walled backyard. An 8 foot wall is no obstacle for these skilled predators. Even if you love seeing wildlife in your yard, if you are not making it uncomfortable to be there, you are inadvertently sending a message of welcome.

Every week in Arizona, Game and Fish gets calls from distraught people who have lost pets when a bobcat or covote found their jackrabbit-sized shih tzu or outdoor cat to be easy prey. A bobcat or covote that becomes used to humans may be a welcome sight to you, but a problem animal to your neighbor... and eventually may be unceremoniously removed. Licensed companies will remove animals at homeowners' expense. Arizona Game & Fish generally does not remove animals from neighborhoods unless it is a human (not pet) health or safety issue, and then will usually remove lethally. As you can see, this can quickly become a costly and unfortunate no-win situation for both people and the wildlife we enjoy keeping "wild".

Animals live their lives based on a risk/ reward situation. When the risk is low (human tolerance), and the reward is high (human-provided food or shelter), animals become habituated. Habituation often ends in removal, a no-win situation. When we make the risks high and the rewards low by removing shelter and food sources, wildlife stays wild, and everyone wins.

What Can I Do?

How can you avoid habituating wildlife



in the first place? Take a look around your backyard. Are you providing one or more of these for wildlife?

- If you feed birds, is extra seed falling on the ground that attracts birds by day, but javelinas and rodents by night? Rodents alone can cause property damage, but once you have rodents, snakes, bobcats and coyotes often follow.
- Do you have slow irrigation leaks that provide a source of water for anything from rabbits to rattlesnakes? Yes, snakes need water, too—and will prey upon the small mammals attracted to it, as well.
- Do you have overgrown bushes near your

When you have Scottsdale in your non-profit's name it can give a preconceived perception that the community we serve is not in need. People would love to provide great statistics about how youth in the Scottsdale and Phoenix areas have no issues, but for many of the youth we serve at the Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Scottsdale that could not be further from the truth.

The community we serve has some startling statistics – 37% of elementary schools in Scottsdale are now categorized as title 1 schools; over 50% of students who attend some of our Club locations are on a free and/or reduced meal program; and 12th grade Scottsdale students have a higher alcohol, tobacco and drug use than their peers statewide.

To combat these statistics we rely on our mission – to provide over 17,800 youth with the skills needed to be successful, responsible young adults and our communities next generation of leaders. We do this through programs taught by professionally trained staff based upon physical, cultural and social needs. Our youth learn how to be productive citizens, achieve academic success, learn healthy living habits, and build positive character skills and have fun! Our programs

help our youth aspire to greater things when they move into adulthood and deter them from negative peer pressures they might be exposed to.

Beyond our mission we provide annual outreach services such as full dental and vision screenings to hundreds of youth in a mobile clinic and local offices and thousands of free meals to our Club members. We are also one of the only organization's that has programming inside a Juvenile Detention Center on Native

American land. Since the program began six years ago the juvenile arrest rate has decreased by more than half. This speaks volumes to our ability to provide strong programs and positive role models to significantly reduce the rate of arrests among teens.

Because of our community impact, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Scottsdale qualifies to receive funds from the Working Poor Tax Credit – a dollar-for-dollar Arizona state tax credit you can receive simply by donating to our organization.

For every dollar you donate to the Clubs, taxpayers can receive a dollar-for-dollar credit and/or reduction of up to \$400 for joint filers and \$200 for individual filers on their Arizona State Tax Return. It is important to note that this credit is separate from the Public and Private Education Tax Credit.

We are proud to have Scottsdale in our name and realize it's not always about what we are saving youth from, but what we are working to inspire them to become. Because every youth should be given the opportunity to reach their full potential no matter the city they reside, and we will not rest until they do.

This year performing arts instructor, Courtney

Bentz led cast members through the script and regularly implemented improve exercises and drama games to keep the program fun and exciting for the cast. "The drama games were my favorite," said Chineza G., age 8. This was Chineza's first year participating in the play and she was elated to have the role of a spider. "I liked that I was the first spider," she said. Participation in the play adds a sense of belonging and responsibility for the actors who must keep each other accountable and attend at least eight weeks of rehearsals in order to put on a successful show.

Members who preferred to stay off stage but still wanted to be part of the play experience took part in stage crew class, designing and painting back drops and building essential props. Many teens also played vital roles in the drama program. Some helped to create costumes, others made the playbill for the show, and others were make-up artists for the performance. A few teens who had performing arts experience helped with daily rehearsals and received producer credits.

The day of the play both cast and crew were elated with anticipation. "This is the best day of my life," said Sierra U, who

- Developed an annual celebrity golf invitational that grew into the Mark Grace Celebrity Golf Invitational, which since its inception has raised \$2.5 million for the Clubs.
- Created an annual wine and food event that grew into what is now Live & Local, one of the premiere events of the fall that raises more than \$250,000 for the Clubs each year.
- Headed the annual giving campaign for the Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Scottsdale which reflects the strong and valuable mentoring members receive from the experienced staff and dedicated volunteers. The campaign, formally known as Angels for Kids, now called GIVE, has raised more than 8 million over the last decade.

"Knowing that you're helping build on the future wellbeing of the Clubs is something I'm very proud of," says Schwanz. "My mom was very involved in nonprofit work, so carrying on her legacy and receiving the Jim Hill Award is very humbling and truly an honor."

According to a recent study funded through a grant by the Virginia G. Holiday Season Crime Prevention

Once again, the year has flown past and we are approaching the holiday season. It seems just like yesterday we were welcoming in 2014 and now we are looking ahead to the end of 2014 and the beginnings of 2015. There are many events to attend, family to visit, traveling, shopping and much more. I know not many think of crime prevention during these festive times but a few simple reminders and tips that can be made part of your daily routine will help reduce the opportunities for you and your family to be a victim. Below are some good reminders on crime prevention for around the house, while out in public and in general.

- When walking to and from stores, mall, etc keep your head up and be aware of your surroundings, Walk with a purpose, do not divert your attention by texting or talking on the phone, digging for car keys or be burdened with too many bags or packages.
- 2. Park in a well lite area, do not park in dark or far away places. I know it is difficult to find good parking, but do the best you can. If you go in at daylight hours and think you might be inside until it is dark, park as if it were dark.
- 3. Roll the windows on your car all the way up and LOCK your car. Do not leave valuables, packages, or even gym bags, etc in plain view inside the car, put them all in the trunk. Gym bags or other bags in view may not have anything but a few items of clothes in them but the thieves do not know that and will try anyways.
- 4. When parking your cars in your driveway or on the street at home, get them in the garage if you can. If not remove all valuables, garage door openers and lock the car. Many thieves will break into a car just to take the garage opener and then use it to take items from the garage or enter the house.
- 5. Do not keep large amounts of cash with you or display cash when shopping. Take with you only what you need for the day. Be on guard while at ATM's.
- 6. Keep a constant eye on your children. ALWAYS know where they are and keep them in sight. Children are easily distracted

by the decorations and excitement of the holidays and may wander off in only a couple seconds.

7. Do not drink and drive, please use a designated driver or call a taxi. This time of the year many people have holiday functions from work or family and drink when they usually don't and make a bad decision and drive. Please enjoy the season but drive responsibly and patiently. Everyone has a lot to do and if we can exercise patience on the roadways we can reduce accidents.

8. Make sure the doors and windows to your home are locked, the front lights are on all night and keep a watchful eye for suspicious activity. If you are expecting deliveries and you will not be home, ask a trusted neighbor to

pick them up when they arrive. Please call Crime Stop at 602-262-6151 if you see suspicious activity.

- 9. Do not respond to any "great deal" or "too good to be true" emails from companies, especially ones you do not know. They are more than likely scams and are trying to get your bank information. Only use secure websites that you know are valid businesses. Do not respond to solicitations over email or phones that sound phony or suspicious.
- 10. Please drive carefully, schools will be out on winter break and many kids will be out in the neighborhoods trying out new bikes, toys, etc and you need to be ever mindful of their presence.
- 11. Lastly, be patient. The crowds are larger, people are rushed and stressed. Many people do not like the holidays and can act out so please exercise patient when out and we all can enjoy the holidays in our own joyful way.
- 12. If you are going to be out of town for a winter vacation, tell a trusted neighbor to watch over your house, do not post on social media that you will be gone and call the Black Mountain Precinct at 602-495-5002, ask for a Vacation Watch and officers can check on your house while you are gone, if the radio calls allow them to.

Thank you again for another year of working together. patio that provide shade from the desert heat and hiding spots for everything from snakes to javelinas?

- Taking a break from feeding the birds (or feeding smaller amounts), fixing your irrigation pipes, and trimming the bottom few inches of bushes in your yard is a great start, however, urban and suburban wildlife is a systemic neighborhood issue.
- How can you be part of the solution? If you see a coyote in your yard, don't condone this behavior by ignoring it. This may cause it to lose its natural fear of people, which can eventually lead to aggressive behavior or it to become considered a 'nuisance animal'.

Arizona Game & Fish recommends that you:

- Make loud noises
- Shout and bang pots and pans or rattle empty soda cans with pennies in it
- Wave your hands or objects like sticks and brooms
- Throw small stones
- Spray the animal with a hose or a super-

These are just a few examples of the wonderful art produced by the talented students at Explorer Middle School.







Desert Ridge community resident Dr. Paul Golisch, who serves as the college's Chief Information Officer and Dean of Information Technology, believes that excellence is due to the emphasis put on student success.



BABIES, LEAKS, AND PAINS: OH MY!

Do you ever feel like you are the only one that sneezes, coughs, or laughs and experiences a bit of urinary leakage? Even worse, do you feel uncomfortable bringing up the subject to your doctor or OBGYN? You are not alone! Urinary leakage or urinary incontinence, as it is more commonly referred to in the medical community, is an extremely common ailment that many women experience during their pregnancies, post-pregnancy, and even years later. The good news though is that urinary incontinence has a cure rate of 80%!

As you go throughout the course of your pregnancy you will find that your body will go through a number of changes from the mental to the emotional to the physical, the latter of the three being one of the biggest parts of your pregnancy that you can take control of, especially in your pelvic floor muscle groups. Stress can become more localized in this area and can cause incontinence due to pelvic floor dysfunction, resulting in urinary incontinence, bowel incontinence, or even organ prolapse.

As your baby continues to grow, their increasing weight will start to push on your bladder, resulting in more frequent trips to the restroom and pain and/or leaking when coughing, sneezing, and walking; however, our baby's weight in not the only cause for these symptoms. During your baby's development and your body's preparation for childbirth, the connective tissue between your belly and pelvic floor muscles becomes more flexible, allowing your belly to grow; with this change, your pelvic floor muscles will adapt to support your baby's passage through the birthing canal. Unfortunately, this change to your pelvic floor muscles also makes it easier for pelvic floor dysfunction issues to develop. Strengthening those pelvic floor muscles before, during, and after your pregnancy will not only help keep pelvic floor dysfunction at bay but will also help decrease the amount of pain that you will experience during and after your pregnancy.

Take on these negative side effects of your pregnancy with pelvic floor exercises that you can do in order to help, not only your pelvic floor, but also your hip, spine, and low back.

Kegels

This exercise is great for really targeting and strengthening your pelvic floor muscles.

Perform this exercise while lying down, sitting, or standing.

How to: As you are sitting at your desk at work, a red light on the road, or even at home watching your favorite show, you will being doing your kegels by squeezing/lifting your pelvic floor muscles up toward your heart, holding for ten seconds, and then releasing. Repeat 10 times. Those muscles that you are contracting are the same ones you use in order to stop urination when you are going to the bathroom, and that action of actively contracting your kegels will help strengthen all of your muscles in that area and make incontinence a thing of the past.



We recommend doing 3 sets of those 10 reps each day in order to strengthen and keep those pelvic floor muscles strong.

Bridges

This exercise is great for those experiencing lower back pain or a weak pelvic floor. Perform this exercise lying down with your knees bent.

How to: As you lay on your back with your knees bent, you will lift your hips to the

ceiling, hold for one second, and then bring them back down again, doing 3 sets of 10 repetitions. Gradually move through this exercise and don't rush in order to really work those muscles. Want to make it a bit harder? Squeeze a pillow between your knees or wrap an elastic loop around your knees and keep your knees spread apart.

Different variations of this exercise that you can do also include:



- Straight Pulses: Hold your hips up and pulse them to the ceiling 10 times and relax. Repeat 10 times.
- Side-to-Side: Hold your hips up and move them like Shakira from side to side 10 times, 5 on each side. Make sure to move slowly in order to stabilize your shoulders and keep your torso strong.
- Rock the Boat: Hold your hips up and make like a belly dancer, dropping one hip toward the floor while pushing the other toward the ceiling. Alternate 10 times, 5 on each side.

Posterior Pelvic Tilt (Transverse Abdominus)

This exercise can help with low back pain during pregnancy and also assists post-partum moms with diastasis recti or separation of the right and left rectus abdominis muscles.

Perform this exercise lying down or while standing against a flat surface.

How to: Think of a belly dancer while you

do this exercise! You'll want to start by tilting the front of your pelvis forward and up toward your chest and then back down again. Be sure to pull your belly button toward your spine, keeping your abs contracted inward to get a nice C shape in your spine and belly. Perform 3 sets of 10 repetitions. Add a kegel while you tilt your pelvis to really target your core and pelvic floor at the same time.



We recommend these exercises, not only for pre-natal, expecting, and post-partum mothers, but also for any woman that has been experiencing urinary incontinence. Minutes after delivery, you can perform your Kegels and Posterior Pelvic Tilts in order to bring more blood flow to your belly and pelvic floor muscles for improved healing and tightening. We know you will be exhausted and maybe just a little too enamored with your little bundle of joy to even consider doing these exercises but we highly recommend doing them when you can after delivery in order to help the overall healing process that your body will be going through and return strength to your pelvic floor muscles. After delivery, refrain from preforming Bridges until you have been cleared from your OBGYN for pelvic rest.*

Your local women's health physical therapist acts as an excellent resource for any challenges you may encounter during your pregnancy or post-partum. They can also develop a pelvic floor program that it most ideal for you to maintain or return you to your ideal activity level during your pregnancy.

Gimmes for the Golfer with Back Pain

The old adage of 'no pain, no gain' has fallen out of fashion in rehabilitative medicine. Granted, there is a time and place for activity related soreness, but, generally speaking, pain is an indicator of tissue damage. That sounds all 'well-and-good,' but what does this mean for you? Contextually, 50% of professional and amateur golfers suffer from lower back pain.^{1,2} Of these, most are associated with abnormal swing mechanics and repeated compensatory movements that lead to tissue strain, failure and eventual break-down. 1,3 The key word here is 'repetitive.' The complex and asymmetric stresses that the golf swing puts on the lower back and associated body parts are astounding. Consequently, areas of limited mobility and strength can lead to compensatory mechanics and, when used frequently, lead to an increase in the risk for injury. Of note, it has been found that golfers with lower back pain tend to practice their full swings twice as much as their asymptomatic counter-parts.1

So, where does this leave you? Hopefully this hasn't caused undo anxiety, because awareness is not fruitless. Activity should be purposeful and each participant of golf should try and high-light the body's incredible

resilience to injury. To do this, you should 'exercise' your capacity to practice and prepare yourself for specific movements, with these 'Gimmes:'

1) Listen to your body: With soreness that goes away after warmup, continue with vour current routine. If you

have soreness that persists after warm-up, take a few days off.3

- 2) Be pro-active: If your soreness develops into sharp or traveling pain, please seek out professional help.3
- 3) Practice what you do: Incorporate partpractice in your stretching and exercise routine (e.g. stretch your hip to improve rotational mobility and strengthen your abdominal and back core to improve rotational control)
- 4) Modify your swing from the modern golf swing to the classic golf swing: Research has shown that 90% of lower back injuries in professional golfers result from repeated use of the modern golf-swing. 1,2

Training should incorporate multi-planar stretches and exercises that optimize movement of the desired activity, in this case the golf-swing. This type of pro-active approach will minimize pain, reduce chances for injury and maximize performance. Additional considerations should be made regarding a golf club fitting and working with either Titleist Performance Institute (TPI) or Nike Golf 360 (NG360) certified trainers or physical therapists.

MAKES 6-8

2 cups whipping cream 5 egg yolks

Southwest Wildlife

½ cup sugar

1 TBS Vanilla (or use any flavoring you like...coffee liquor, green tea, pistachio)

Whisk together cream, egg yolks, sugar and Vanilla. Pour mixture into ramekins (small glass bowls) and place in 13 x 9 pan. Pour hot water into pan about ½ way up the bowls. Bake at 275 degrees for 70 minutes. Cool. Refrigerate 8 hours to set. Before serving: Sprinkle with either brown sugar (or preferably Turbinado Sugar which you can purchase in packets in any grocery). Either place under broiler to brown for a few minutes....or use o small propane torch to crinkle sugar. Top with a bit of whipping cream. Garnish with berries, mint sprigs or whatever you wish.
