
Lifestyles Chair Enhancing the Lifestyles of Desert Ridge Residents

The past year has been exciting as the Desert Ridge Lifestyles Committee embarked on its first year of actively supporting and enhancing the

lifestyles of our Desert Ridge residents.
Since inception just over a year ago, the committee focused on augmenting already successful DRCA events, increasing lifestyles activities through community partnerships, and implementing new programs that encourage



Highlights of the committee's work include the expansion of the Holiday Lights Trolley Tours from 3 to 13 (increasing the number of participants from 90 to 390 people), the addition of a second (Fall) Movie in the Park, the continuation of the Spring Movie in the Park, and the return of the Farmers Market Cashman Park at Desert Ridge.

New programming included Lifestyles sponsorship of the Boys and Girls Club, support for our local schools, increased partnership with the Musical Instrument Museum, social programming, an astronomy night with the Phoenix Astronomical Society, fitness in the park and a community-wide yard sale. All of these events are planned to meet the interest of our Desert Ridge members.

On Saturday, April 18th, Desert Ridge Lifestyles sponsored our inaugural community-wide yard sale. Hundreds of residents benefitted from weeklong community advertising on social media sites, local signage and advertising in the *Arizona Republic*. Residents were

invited to bring their unsold items to Cashman Park at Desert Ridge after the yard sale for donation to the Goodwill of Central Arizona. Altogether Desert Ridge donated 14,000 pounds of used goods to support the 22 Goodwill career centers that provide no-cost job training and educational services to Arizonans. Another community-wide yard sale will be held in the fall.

Membership interest in social gatherings led to the development of a monthly Ladies Night Out, which launched in September. This event has grown from a handful of residents to dozens of local ladies gathering to make new friends. In May, participants enjoyed making crafts at Pinspiration on High Street. The Ladies Night Out will take a break for July, returning in August on the second Monday of the month. Also exceptionally popular is the bi-monthly Community Night Out, which the committee started in November. More than 40 residents enjoyed the May 19th Community Night Out at Modern Margarita. The next Community Night Out will be the 3rd Tuesday of September.

The most significant accomplishment of the committee was the successful return







Pesign Review committee— Helpful Tips & Reminders

The Design Review Committee (DRC) for the Desert Ridge Community Association (DRCA) would like to remind and provide our residents with some helpful tips and reminders regarding the design review submission process that will enable the DRC to expedite their review of your submission. The DRC is recommending the folliwing tips and reminders:

1. Please avoid faxing your architectural submittals to the DRC if your submission has any photos or drawings. Photos and drawings are illegible and cannot be clearly viewed from the fax transmission.

Please scan and email your submission to desertridge.az@fsresidential.com.
Submissions can also be mailed or delivered to the Desert Ridge Community Association Office, located at 5415 E. High Street, Suite 220, Phoenix, AZ 85054.
Please review the DRCA Residential Guidelines prior to finalizing and forwarding your submission to the DRC to ensure that you have fulfilled all the submission requirements. As a reminder, the DRC does require 3 sets of copies for each architectural submission.

2. Please consider when you are making plans

to paint your home that the original paint colors on your home have faded over time from the sun. The current color on your home may not be the exact color as it appears today that was approved when originally painted. The Dunn Edwards website allows for homeowners to view their approved paint colors for their respective neighborhoods and home. To view the Dunn Edward website go to https://www.dunnedwards.com/colors/ achive/color-ark pro/desert-ridge-1/parcel-26. Please note this link defaults to Parcel 26, but you can select or enter your neighborhood parcel to view your neighborhood or home approved paint color schemes. Please do not hesitate to contact the Desert Ridge Community Association office should you have any questions or need further assistance at 480.551.4553. You can also visit a Dunn Edwards store to view and discuss your approved colors with a Dunn-Edwards Representative. Please remember that you may use any paint manufacturer that you

YOU GET WHAT YOU PAY FOR

In the early 90s my wife and I began searching for a house to buy. We looked at a few developments that had associations but didn't understand why we

should live where we would pay dues or have restrictions on what we could do to our home and yard. We ended up purchasing a 16-yearold home in north Phoenix. The house was in a nice neighborhood and the people living there seemed to take real pride of ownership.

As the years passed, many neighbors came and went, and the area started to change dramatically. A new family moved into the house across the street. The man of the house was a former high-end sports car mechanic who had recently made the transition to airline mechanic. They were a nice family, but before long, we started seeing "project" cars up on blocks. Even though some of them were nice sports cars, they still became an eyesore. Some of the neighbors complained to him about the cars, but he simply ignored them.

Not long after the mechanic moved in, a man who owned a small landscaping company purchased a home a few houses down from ours and started parking his landscaping vehicles in the street. He even poured an extra concrete slab next to his driveway and had trucks parked there as well. Another neighbor stated that his house "wasn't bright enough" and painted his house yellow with a purplish trim.

Little by little as more houses changed hands, the neighborhood started to go downhill, as did the selling price of homes in that area. Even the light poles and the fire hydrants looked bad, as the paint became just a faded powdery finish.

Then, one late summer evening, my neighbor's vehicle was stolen out of the driveway 15 minutes after he got home from work. Our family decided it was time to move someplace where we were less likely to experience the kinds of issues we were seeing in our current neighborhood. After an extensive search, we came upon a community that had everything that we were looking for, Desert Ridge.

Here, we found a community with a master association that:

- Makes sure the light poles, common area walls, and even fire hydrants are painted.
- Streets aren't cluttered with trailers and work vehicles.
- People are keeping up their yards and not letting them get overgrown.
- The houses are painted colors within a specific color palette and guidelines.

And those are just a few of the things that the Master Association does. Granted, many of these things can be found in other communities with Master or Homeowner's association, but what makes Desert Ridge truly unique is our commitment to overall increased property values. A staple to increasing and maintaining property values in any community is the reduction and prevention of crime. Our programs here in Desert Ridge are doing just that.

This past year we started new Block Watch programs and bolstered existing Block Watches through the DRCA Block Watch

In this article I am going to focus on two statistical reports. The first chart is a review of 2014 off duty program as far as the basic numbers of what the officers did. This includes things like miles driven, calls for service the officers answered in the Desert Ridge area, citations, reports written, and a few other things. The second report will be the crime stats for the area. 2014 was the third full year of the program and that allowed me to compare the three years prior to implementation and now three full years after.

The Phoenix Police Department reports our official statistics according to the Uniform Reporting Criteria (UCR) which are not equivalent to Arizona Revised Statutes

(ARS) statistics or other types. Under the hierarchy rule of UCR, only the most severe offense of an incident is counted, so if there is a Homicide after a Burglary, only the Homicide is counted. There are 4 Part One Violent Crimes that are counted and they are Homicide, Forcible Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault (counted individually by victim). There are 4 Part One Property

Crimes that are counted and they are Stolen Vehicles, Arson, Theft, and Burglary (which includes residential, commercial and burglary from vehicles).

The statistics shown for the Desert Ridge community as a whole does not include the Desert Ridge Marketplace, JW Marriott Resort or any of the commercial properties

This report is based on Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) criteria which are not equivalent to Arizona Revised Statutes (ARS) statistics and therefore this data cannot be directly compared to ARS reports. Under the hierarchy rule of UCR, only the most severe offense of an incident is counted. Part One property crimes include motor vehicle theft, burglary, arson, and theft/larceny. Part One violent crimes include criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Aggravated assaults are counted by victim. Numbers may differ from other published reports due to case updates/reclassifications and/or to differences associated with unfounded cases incidents. UCR data excludes unfounded cases if the incident and the unfounded cases occurred in the same month. However, if the incident and the unfound occurred in different months, then the removal of the unfounded cases will not be reflected in the data. Any reports with missing or incorrect information would not be properly depicted in this report. Any listed crimes that do not appear in this report had a count of 0 for the time period indicated. New precinct, squad, beat and grid boundaries were implemented on August 23, 2010, and data in this report reflects the new grid boundaries as if they existed for the entire time period.



in the area. This program does not cover the entire community, it excludes Aviano (who has their own patrols) and the Desert Ridge Marketplace, commercial properties and the JW Marriott Resort are also not included in the off duty program area.

The 3-year average comparisons show across the board reductions in all crime categories with a total Violent Crime reduction of 59% and a total Property Crime reduction of 42%. Individually, Burglary was down 47%, Theft 39% and Auto Theft 32% and a total crime reduction of 43%. It is important to remember that these numbers are 3-year average comparisons and not a comparison of 2014 to any of the previous years or the percentages would be higher when compared to say 2008 or 2009 which were busy years in the area.

These statistics are not accomplished just by the Police Department; this is in partnership with you and the residents of your community. You are aware and call in suspicious activity, practice good crime prevention strategies and form Block Watches. All of this together along with the efforts of on and off duty personnel are what make improvements like this occur. You should thank yourselves for a job well done. Keep up the good work on your end and we will do our best and together we will continue to make the Desert Ridge Community a safe place to be.

The Desert Ridge Community Association (DRCA) contracted Urban Tactical Security in September 2014 to enforce the parking rules and regulations of the DRCA. Please see the DRCA parking guidelines below to help keep the streets of Desert Ridge looking great.



- Please be reminded that on-street parking by residents and tenants is prohibited. Temporary guest parking in the immediate vicinity of the hosts' home for up to forty-eight (48) hours is permitted.
- Please make sure all Commercial Vehicles belonging to residents or tenants are parked so that they are not visible from the street or neighboring properties.
- Please keep Recreational Vehicles (boats, RV's, Trailers, etc.) parked in the garage or behind the RV gate at all times, so they are not visible from neighboring properties or any street.

STATE TRUST LANDS

The trails and parks owned and operated by the City of Phoenix are separate from State Trust Land and have different rules. Hiking trails in the City of Phoenix are for pedestrians, bicycles and horses. There are no motorized vehicles allowed on any trails in city parks and dogs are required to be on a leash. Users are also



in the city, I had many opportunities to go out and enjoy the many recreational activities of the Arizona desert and the natural resources that are in abundance. The City of Phoenix has integrated the responsible preservation and use of these lands in many mountain preserves, hiking trails, recreational and city parks and has helped many neighborhoods and master planned communities have recreational land access built into them. The City of Phoenix Parks Department is responsible for managing the hiking trails and parks that are owned and operated by the City of Phoenix.

required to stay on the trails and not go off into the open areas around the trails. Most trails and parks have these and any other specific uses posted at the entrances or in the parking lots if there is one. Please review them prior to using the trail system. It is also very important to observe some basic safety rules like always tell someone where you went hiking, bring plenty of water, a cell phone, wear appropriate clothes, hats, sun block and shoes for hiking and know your limitations. Many of the open land in and surrounding the City of Phoenix is State Trust Land managed by the State of Arizona State Land Department. It is important to know that Arizona Trust Land is not public land. A recreational permit is required to be on State Trust land that is designated as open for recreation and not all State Trust land is open for recreational purposes. The recreational permit allows hiking, bicycling, horseback riding, picnicking, photography, bird watching, sightseeing, and camping (up to 14 days per year). The permit does not allow you to target shoot, paintball, air soft, recreational flying (ultra lights), fireworks, sand railing, rock hopping or operate any type of motorized vehicle on the land. Many new laws have been adopted across the City of Phoenix and other metropolitan areas in Maricopa County in response to air quality concerns. These restrictions include the operation of any motorized vehicles, which includes dirt bikes, ATV's, sand rails, 4 wheel drive or any other type of vehicle on any unpaved road or vacant lot. There is limited bird hunting allowed on State Trust lands. There are many historic cultural or prehistoric ruins and archaeological sites in our State Trust lands which are not to be disturbed as well as removing rocks, cacti, saguaro or cholla skeletons, plants or firewood. 



RRIG

During the hot summer months we adjust our habits, activities, and how much water we consume. We should also be changing how we care for our landscape plants during these hot summer months.

Cacti native to Arizona need almost no supplemental irrigation. When frequently watered, the roots of cacti can rot, killing the entire plant. Also, a saguaro that is watered will be constantly bloated which causes fissures to develop in its accordion like folds. These injuries can lead to disease that may eventually kill the plant.

If there has been a month of temperatures exceeding 105 degrees with no rain then a cactus will need some water. A thirsty cactus can be easily identified because it gets very skinny. In this case, give the plant a good, deep soak with the hose and it will be ready for another month of the same weather. Sprinkler heads that attach to the end of a hose work will for cactus patches. Cacti not native to Arizona might need more watering.

Native shrubs need to be watered weekly during the summer. To achieve maximum growth, give native plants fertilizer in the spring. You may choose to feed monthly from May to September with an allpurpose, water-soluble fertilizer diluted to half-strength. Established native trees should

not have a need to be watered when surrounded by shrubs with irrigation. They will be able to get the needed moisture from the surrounding irrigation.

Ornamental trees will need to have a regular schedule of watering. With all plants, make sure they are being irrigated out where the feeder roots are, not by the trunk.

Citrus like to dry out between watering. In the hottest part of summer citrus trees need to be watered once every one to two weeks depending on soil type. When watering citrus it is best to flood them. for a deep soaking. Water frequency should be reduced as temperatures drop over the winter. Give the tree time to adjust to the new water schedule by lowering the water frequency over time.

Newly planted trees need more frequent watering. For the

first two week after planting, water every one to three days depending on soil drainage. Then slowly cut back on the water frequency to establish deep, strong roots. Examples of other plants that fall under this schedule are Bougainvilleas and Oleanders. Interestingly, established oleanders need even less water. They are almost as tough as cactus, which is surprising considering how lush they look.

And of course don't forget the monsoon season is arriving soon. It is notorious for its high winds ripping branches off trees or completely

uprooting them altogether. Protect your trees by removing weak and crossing branches. Thin up to 25 percent of the canopy so wind can move through the branches. Chilean Mesquites are particularly susceptible to monsoon damage. Don't water them any more than they absolutely need. High winds and wet soils result in fallen trees.

Triple digit temperatures have hit the Valley and Maricopa County Animal Care & Control (MCACC) is reminding pet owners to keep a close eye on pets during the extreme heat. Did you know that some dogs can't swim? Does the big shade tree in your yard only provide shade during the cooler morning hours? Did you realize that your dogs paw pads can burn on hot pavement? Here are a few simple tips to keep in mind as we head into the dog days of summer ...



Keep pets indoors.

On extremely hot days, MCACC urges pet owners to keep pets indoors. If you absolutely cannot bring your animal inside. be sure he has access to shade throughout the entire day. While a dog house may provide shade, it does not allow air to circulate and provides no relief from the heat. Shady trees and covered patios provide the best relief from the glaring sun.

Provide plenty of fresh, clean water.

Just like us, pets can get dehydrated. Provide plenty of water in a spill proof, non-metal bowl out of direct sunlight. Be sure to change the water daily and remember that many pets won't drink if the water is too hot.

Limit exercise on hot days.

While your dog's paw pads may be tough, they are still sensitive and can be burned when walking on hot pavement. Limit your dog's exercise on hot days and walk him during the early morning or late evening hours. If it's too hot for your bare feet, chances are it is too hot for your dog's paws!

Don't leave pets in parked cars.

Even with the windows cracked, the temperature inside a car can soar within

minutes. On an 85-degree day, the temperature inside a parked car can reach 102 degrees within 10 minutes. Keep pets at home while you run errands.

Watch your pets around water.

Not every dog knows how to swim and most dogs won't know how to get out of the swimming pool. Teach your dog where the steps are located and ensure he knows how to find his way out should he accidentally (or purposely) land in the pool. Don't allow pets to be unsupervised during water play. If you plan on taking your dog to the lake or on a boat ride, consider purchasing a dog life jacket at a local pet supply store or online.

Recognize the signs of heat stress.

Dogs and cats pant to regulate their body temperature but this method can be easily overwhelmed during extreme heat. As pet owners, it's up to us to make sure we know the signs of heat stress and how to deal with it should a situation arise. Lethargy, extreme panting, excessive salivation, weakness and collapse are just a few of the signs of heat related illness in pets. If your animal exhibits any of these symptoms, apply cool (not cold) compresses and get your pet to the veterinarian immediately. Heat stress is a very serious condition that could result in death.

wish, Dunn Edwards has worked with Desert Ridge to provide a location that allows homeowners to view these colors. If a homeowner wishes to submit for a paint color other than the approved Dunn Edwards colors, please include a color swatch for the DRC to review along with the light reflective value (LRV) of the paint color(s).

3. All landscape submittals are required to be accompanied by a drawing, including a plant legend showing both the botanical and common names of the plants and trees that are being submitted for review. Plants and trees may have one botanical name but also may have different common names. This allows for the DRC to accurately determine that the species of plants and trees desired are on the association's approved plant and tree list and to expedite their approval consideration of your submission in a timely manner.

4. For submissions that require setbacks, please be reminded to clearly show and delineate the setbacks on your plans. Setbacks are typically required for Fireplace/ fire pits, pools, ancillary

structures, building additions, trees, BBQs, pergola / gazebos, patio extensions and walkways. The DRC encourages all homeowners to submit as much information as they can with their submittal as the many different neighborhoods may have different requirements for specific items.

Pitch shots seem to be the most dreaded and difficult shots for many golfers. Golfers tend to fear leaving the pitch short of the green or overcompensate and hit the ball over the green. The good news is that the pitch shot is not as difficult as we make it out to be. In this article we'll look at several reasons why golfers have difficulty in their distance control and how to gain more consistency.

Typically I see several reasons why golfers have trouble controlling the distance of their pitch shots. The first two reasons pertain to a mismatch between the length of the back swing and the length of the through swing. Some golfers will take too long of a backswing causing their through swing to be much shorter. The result of this swing is the club head will be decelerating at impact causing a short shot. I also see golfers with a short backswing and nearly a full finish. Causing too much club head

speed resulting in the shot being too long. The size of the backswing should match the size of your through swing. A third reason is that golfers will swing harder for farther distances and softer for shorter distances. The result from this swing will be inconsistency in your distance control. You will be more consistent if you make the same effort in your swing, but vary the size of your swing to control your distance.

Now, let's discuss how to gain more consistency in your distance. Starting with you sand wedge, first make sure your back swing and through swings are equal lengths. Next, vary the size your swing size to create different length shots. Since your distance is controlled by the size of your swing, learn three different swing sizes to cover three distances. Figure 1 and figure 2 show the back swing and through swing for a one quarter swing. Figure 3 and figure 4 show a half swing. Figures 5 and 6 show a three quarter swing.

Your job is to practice each size swing to determine what distance each swing creates for you. The distance can vary from golfer to golfer, but the key is to learn how far YOU hit the ball with each swing. Once you learn each distance, then you can apply it on the golf course. For instance if your half swing hits the ball 30 yards, you'll know exactly what swing to create when you have that distance on the golf course. Once you have confidence with your sand wedge, try the same system with other wedges to add even more shots to your bag.

The pitch shot is a simple shot and can be improved with some practice. By keeping you swing equal length back and through and varying the overall size of your swing, you will start to see better pitch shots in a short period of time. Once you see the improvement, your confidence on the course will increase as well.

TENSION-TYPE HEADACHES: A PAIN IN THE NECK



Jeffrey Foucrier PT, DPT, OCS, CMTPT Spooner Physical Therapy Insidious and blunting: the two words I would use to describe headaches. If we look at the most disabling disorders in the world, the World Health Organization (WHO) would

rank headaches in the top ten (top five for women) with a staggering global prevalence of 47%. 1,2,3 Of these headaches, studies indicate that tension-type headaches (TTHs) are the most debilitating, with a lifetime prevalence that ranges as high as 78%. 1,4,5,6 If headaches weren't bad enough, it's been reported that individuals with TTHs have an extremely high prevalence of neck pain; approximately 89%.² What's the connection, and could this be 'key' in finding effective non-pharmaceutical treatments to manage headaches?

The tension-type headache can be described as 'general head pain.' Symptoms could present on both sides of the head

and are commonly not affected by physical activity. However, it is distinguished from other primary types of headaches, like migraines, in that it shouldn't cause you severe nausea, vomiting and/or an aura.⁷ The actual cause(s) of tension-type headaches are unknown, but it is thought to be primarily neurological in nature. 3,5,6 This isn't to say that TTHs aren't affected by other factors such as musculoskeletal dysfunction, psychological stress and genetic predisposition.^{3,5,6} With the extremely high prevalence of neck pain in an individual with TTHs (remember the 89%?), treatment of these musculoskeletal factors, in addition to more traditional methods of treatment, may offer a more comprehensive approach to care.

The customary management of TTHs has primarily relied on pharmaceuticals, but there is a growing body of evidence which shows that non-drug therapies, including treatment of muscle tissue, can be just as effective in the reduction of headache



frequency, intensity and duration.^{8,9,10} Furthermore, the uses of similar therapeutic strategies have also been very successful in the management of neck pain. 11 Having a professional that appreciates this relationship is pivotal in restoring function and giving you your life back.

Headaches are multi-factorial in nature and are greatly under-appreciated both in scope and treatment. By working with your primary-care-provider and pursuing 'active' treatment of your neck, I believe that you can better manage your headaches. Physical therapy is one such avenue that can help decrease this disabling disorder. I have added a few exercises that may help you better manage one of the greatest 'pains in the neck,' tension-type headaches.



Wind up a towel or sheet and sit on the end (with the end under the hip opposite to the side you want to stretch). Wrap the sheet around your opposite shoulder close to the base of the neck. Pull the sheet down towards your opposite leg (right) and gently bring your left ear to your left shoulder. You will feel this stretch above the placement of the sheet at the neck.



Switch positions and complete on the right side. Repeat 2-3x while holding for 10-15"; 1-2x/day.

Look straightforward and hold your hands in front of your body. Reach across your body and slightly up to the ceiling while keeping your head stationary. You will feel this stretch at the bottom of your neck, the backside of your shoulders and at your



upper back. Repeat 8x; 1-2x/day.

Roll a towel up and place it at the base of your skull. Gently pull your chin towards the back of your neck (chin-tuck). Be sure to avoid aggressive contractions; you should feel this stretch just below the placement of the towel (at the top of the neck). Repeat 2-3x while holding for 10-15"; 1-2x/day.

Posture Makes Perfect

Have you ever been told by your parents to sit or stand up straight? For most of us, we can answer yes to this question. However, what we were told in childhood does not always carry over into adulthood. Posture is a vital part of our everyday lives in the workplace no matter if you sit or stand during the day. According to the Occupational Safety & Health Administration (2015), the best posture to practice is by keeping your body in a neutral position. In other words, it is important to make sure your chest and back muscles are well balanced, no slouching!

FOR SITTING:

- Feet are resting on the floor or on a stable surface
- Ankles, knees, & hips are at 90 degrees
- Sit all the way back in the chair
- Shoulders are relaxed, elbows are bent at 90 degrees and keep your wrists straight
- Monitor is within arm's reach



and neck is in neutral

- Eyes should be looking at the top of the monitor screen
- And do not overreach when using the keyboard or mouse

FOR STANDING:

- Feet are hip width apart and are resting on the floor
- Hips & knees are in line with your feet & stand up nice and tall
- Relax your shoulders, bend your elbows at 90 degrees & keep your wrists straight
- Monitor is within arm's reach and neck is in neutral
- Eyes should be looking at the top of the monitor screen
- And do not overreaching when using the keyboard or mouse

It is essential to make sure that you do not reposition yourself to fit the equipment. Instead, your equipment should be fit to you when you are in a neutral body position when sitting or standing at work. Good posture


STEM, or science, technology, engineering and mathematics, emphasizes the interdisciplinary approach to teaching students about these areas that is critical to society both now and in the future. Explorer Middle School is unique in its approach to meeting the educational needs in this area through its pioneering approach and reputation as a school leading the way in technology. From its diverse elective course offerings to its extracurricular STEM club, it is a unique place for middle school students to explore in a hands-on, minds-on way areas that interest them.

ELECTIVES

In its signature Project Lead the Way program, Explorer Middle School students learn about engineering firsthand by designing and testing windmills, robots and more. Offered at both the introductory and advanced levels, students have the opportunity to develop their ability to design and prototype using Computer Aided-Design (CAD).

In Computer Applications, students create unique and personalized digital creations using Google Apps for Education and other web-based productivity tools. The coding class has App Inventor and website-making as just a few of the exciting options.

Tech Lab is an elective focused on all things STEM. Students are immersed in a project-based learning environment where they explore and learn about topics such



as aeronautics, forensic science, computer science, 3D printing, and robotics.

STEM CLUB

Meeting twice a month, Explorer's STEM Club offers students the opportunity to tinker, make and code using Scratch, VEX robotics, and Arduino. They also have access to supplies and tools to create Rube Goldberg machines and other innovations. Through grants from Science Foundation Arizona, Arizona State University's STEAM Machines Club, APS, SRP, and Robotics Education and Competition Foundation, students have access to a myriad of STEM supplies and equipment.

CHIEF SCIENCE OFFICER

Explorer Middle School is one of more than 50 middle and high schools to pilot the Chief Science Officers (CSO) initiative. Charlie Keenen, a rising 8th grader who was student body vice-president in 2014-15 will be the CSO for the coming school year. "I look forward to representing my school and learning more about science and technology," says Charlie. In this role, he will work on raising campus-wide engagement in STEM by serving as the "voice" for Explorer. He will work on identifying science opportunities such as speakers, field trips, science nights and ensure that these opportunities reflect the interests of his peers. He will be the contact and streamline the ability for STEM-based organizations throughout the state to meaningfully connect with Explorer. In addition, as CSO, Charlie will participate as a member of a

state-wide "cabinet" of other CSOs to engage in Arizona's conversation about STEM, education and the workforce. To prepare for his coming responsibilities, Charlie will be attending a summer leadership institute, fall and summer cabinet meetings and have on-site mentorship during the academic year, all supported by the AZ SciTech Festival.

COMPETITIONS AND MORE

Explorer students represented the school and district at several STEM competitions this vear. A team created an app concept and video as part of an application in the Verizon App Challenge. Other students competed at the Honeywell Aerospace Challenge and the VEX IQ robotics regional competitions. More than 20 students also participated in Arizona State University's Mars Student Imaging Program where they conducted scientific research and spent two days with a planetary geologist analyzing data and presenting their findings. Explorer students have also participated in district pilot initiatives where they have taken MOOCs (online courses) from higher education institutions such as Stanford University.

ENGAGE, EMPOWER, EXPERIENCE, **EXPLORE**

Explorer's motto is engage, empower, experience, and explore. Its diverse curricular program and additional offerings provide students with the opportunity to engage in STEM content and skills, empower them to be STEM-literate citizens, provide them with experiences and avenues through which they can explore their STEM interests.



Grant Program. We renewed our matching grant with Silent Witness, and increased our off-duty Phoenix Police Patrol. As you can see from the statistics in the adjacent article, the three-year average shows a total crime reduction of over 43%. In 2014 there were 329 shifts done by the off-duty patrol, paid for by the master association. To compliment those patrols, we have the addition of our new parking enforcement provider, Urban Tactical

Security giving us even more sets of eyes and ears patrolling the community.

Remember, Phoenix police officers work hard at their job, but they can't be everywhere all of the time. That is why it is so important to know and communicate with your neighbors and to keep looking for things that are out of place in your neighborhood. You can help make Desert Ridge a safer and better place to live by starting or participating in a neighborhood block watch program.






