Desert Ridge is a city within a city. With less than 40% of the planned development completed, about 6,000 homes, our population now is larger than two-thirds

of the 91 incorporated cities in Arizona. Having already surpassed Paradise Valley, Sedona and Cottonwood, we are roughly the size of Payson. At buildout, our specific plan will have 19,240 dwelling units or over 55,000 residents. When completed, Desert Ridge will become the 13th largest "city" in Arizona. Our population will be slightly larger than today's Flagstaff.

While facts like these can be fun, preparing for this growth is a serious issue. In the years ahead, our community will be one of the fastest growing in Arizona. As an Association, we must proactively prepare for the future and insure that our quality of life does not suffer. Our roads, schools and parks are already at capacity; it's time to chart a course for the future.

It's time to focus on our roads:

- 1. Completing Deer Valley Rd. East to Scottsdale Rd.
- 2. Connecting Deer Valley Rd. South to 64th St.
- 3. Completing 56th St. North to Pinnacle Peak Rd.
- 4. Completing Mayo Blvd. and constructing the freeway flyover

It's time to build our parks:

- 1. The large regional park planned South of Deer Valley Rd., West of Tatum Blvd.
- 2. The Desert Ridge Dog Park on Black Mountain Blvd., South of Pinnacle H.S.
- Constructing the first sports fields in Desert Ridge

It's time to build another school, our first library and other educational assets other communities already have in place.

To this end, our DRCA Board is creating a strategic plan for Desert Ridge. Our Ad Hoc Committee has already held several meetings in the past few months and we'd love to have you participate. Come out and share your vision for the future of Desert Ridge.

Thanks again for all of your support. I look forward to seeing you in the neighborhood.



# A Desert Holiday Tradition

Winter months in the Sonoran Desert are the envy of families and friends in colder climates. They bundle up in wool while we don light cotton sweaters and open windows and enjoy being outside. As the holidays approach, locals like to celebrate in unique ways and take advantage of the mild weather. One way is to attend what many consider the Valley's best holiday event, Las Noches de las Luminarias at Desert Botanical Garden. The Garden is transformed by the glow of 8,000 hand-lit luminarias that line the trails and by the sounds of talented musicians that perform throughout the Garden trails.

"We plan all year for Las Noches de las Luminarias," said Marcia Flynn, director of event services. "The goal is to have an enchanting and welcoming evening for guests. We see whole families, people on date nights and it has also been the setting for many engagement proposals."

Las Noches de las Luminarias started in 1978 as a one-night, member only event and has grown to 24 nights this year. It is a massive undertaking involving volunteers and staff who set up the event, serve as hosts and work behind the scenes. Each night a crew of about 20 people light the 8,000 candles in about one hour using a butane torch attached to a PVC pipe. At the end of the night, they are able to snuff out the candles in about 30 minutes with

a special device – a turkey baster extended with a plastic tube that is attached to a length of wood.

This year, a special exhibition, Bruce Munro: Sonoran Light at Desert Botanical Garden will

enhance your Luminarias experience. The exhibit showcases eight large-scale, light-based installations using an inventive array of materials, and hundreds of miles of glowing fiber optics. Located throughout the Garden, Munro's site-specific exhibition will reflect his personal interpretation the Sonoran Desert. Musical groups perform every night of Las Noches de las Luminarias. Performers this year include Mariachi Pasión, Sahnas Borthers, Traveler, Salt River Brass Quintet and Yellow Bird. Of course, it would not be complete without the Valley's best Handbell Ensembles taking up residence in historic Webster Auditorium. The Phoenix Astronomical Society will also be stationed on the Harriet K. Maxwell Desert Wildflower Trail for stargazing.

If you come hungry, a sumptuous buffet dinner is available at an additional cost from Fabulous Food Fine Catering and Events and the Garden's Patio Café will also be open for ala carte items. Meal tickets for the buffet are \$22 for adults and \$12 for children (12 and under). Gertrude's, the Garden's restaurant will be open and reservations are highly recommended and can be made by calling 480-719-8600 or visiting gertrudesrestaurant.com.

# Crème Brûlée - Serves 6

**CUSTARD** 

2 cups heavy whipping cream

1/2 cup of sugar

2 tablespoons of finely chopped, peeled fresh ginger

2 vanilla beans, split lengthwise

5 large egg yolks (separated from egg whites)

1 pinch salt

# CRÈME BRÛLÉE

18 Teaspoons of sugar

### **GARNISH**

Fresh raspberries

12 Fresh mint leaves

Preparation

### **MAKE CUSTARD:**

Whisk yolks in a medium bowl until well blended. Set aside.

Preheat oven to 325°F. Place three 4-inch-diameter fluted ramekins in each of two 13" x 9" x 2" baking pans. Mix cream, sugar, ginger and salt in heavy medium saucepan. Using a small knife, cut the vanilla bean in half lengthwise and scrape seeds from the inside. Add seeds and remaining bean to saucepan. Stir over medium heat until sugar dissolves and mixture comes to simmer. Cover pan, reduce heat to very low and simmer gently 15 minutes to infuse flavors. Strain mixture into large measuring cup or medium pitcher.

Slowly pour hot cream mixture into the set aside yolks and gently whisk to just blend. Divide the combined mixture among the six ramekins in the pans. Pour enough hot tap water into pans to a level halfway up sides of ramekins. Carefully transfer pans

Bake custards about 35 minutes or until almost set in center when pans are gently shaken. Using a metal spatula, transfer ramekins to work surface; cool 45 minutes. Chill at least three hours and covered up to two days.

### MAKE CRÈME BRÛLÉE:

Sprinkle three teaspoons sugar evenly over each custard. Working with one custard at a time, hold kitchen torch so that flame is two inches above surface. Direct flame so that sugar melts and browns, about two minutes. Refrigerate until custards are firm again but topping is still brittle, at least 2 hours but no longer than four hours so that topping doesn't soften.

### **ALTERNATIVE WITHOUT TORCH:**

After refrigerating the ramekins for at least one hour, carefully dab the tops with a paper towel to remove all moisture. Sprinkle a thick layer of baker's sugar (superfine sugar) until you can barely still see the custard. Place in the over on the highest rack and broil for five to 10 minutes. Watch carefully and rotate them to broil evenly. Remove when golden brown and bubbling. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes, but no longer than four hours so that topping doesn't soften. Garnish crème brûlées with fruit and mint leaves if desired.





# **ALL CANDIDATES MUST:**

Comply with the following requirements per the CC&R's, and must remain in compliance through the Annual Meeting:

Must be an owner of record in the Association or an entity owner of record in the Association. If you are a representative of a confirmed entity owner of record you must provide a signed, notarized letter from the owner of record, appointing you as its' representative.

Must be a member in good standing, with all assessments current (no more than 30 days delinquent) and no outstanding violation(s) of the CC&R's.

Must not have member rights suspended by the Board of Directors for any violations of the Association's governing documents.

Must not be involved in current litigation regarding compliance or dispute with Association's governing documents.

Must commit to attend regularly scheduled board meetings (at least once a month), as well as the additional time that may be required in order to participate at the committee level.

# **ADDITIONAL QUALIFICATIONS ESTABLISHED BY THE ASSOCIATION'S** NOMINATING COMMITTEE:

Must attend at least one of the three scheduled Board Candidates Meet & Greet meetings.

# **Board Candidate FAQ's**

# What does the Nominating Committee do?

The Nominating Committee's primary function is to ensure that the community has qualified candidates nominated from the Desert Ridge community to serve as Members of the Community Master Association Board of Directors.

# What does the Nominating Committee have planned for the upcoming board election year?

This issue contains both the board candidate interest announcement and the requirements and qualifications and email address for the application forms. Several "Meet the Candidate" events have been scheduled so that members of the community can meet prospective Board Members. There will be a Board Candidates "Meet and Greet" at the DRCA Farmers Market Cashman Park at Desert Ridge on Sunday, February 14th at 11am, a "Meet the Candidate" night at 6pm on Wednesday, February 24th at the DRCA Board of Directors Meeting and another Board Candidates "Meet and Greet" at the DRCA Farmers Market Cashman Park at Desert Ridge on Sunday, March 13th at 11am.

# How many positions are available this year and how long will my term be?

Out of the seven member seats on the Board of Directors, there are three (3) seats on the Board of Directors that are available for election in 2016. Directors are elected to serve two year terms. In 2016, these three positions will be elected for a two year term since the two year term for these three seats will have expired in April 2016. Therefore, all three positions will serve two year terms.

# What is the process for running for a position on the Board?

Return all candidate application forms to the Association office no later than 5 p.m. on Friday, February 12th.

In addition, candidates are required to attend at least one of the three "Meet the Candidate" events. It is strongly recommended that

all board candidates attend the Board Candidates Meet & Greet / O&A to be held during the DRCA Board of Director Meeting on Wednesday, February 24th at 6pm. Candidates are also encouraged to attend the DRCA Farmers Market Cashman Park at Desert Ridge Board Candidates Meet & Greet / Q&A on Sunday, February 14th at 11am or Sunday, March 13th at 11am.

Candidates must also attend the Desert Ridge Community Association Annual Membership Meeting on Thursday, April 21st. Candidate attendance at this meeting is mandatory!

# What are the Directors' responsibilities?

The Desert Ridge Community Association is an Arizona-chartered, 501(c)(4) nonprofit social welfare organization. Directors are responsible for operating and maintaining the "common area" property of the community, reviewing and approving all site plans and improvements within the community, and providing coordination and oversight of the community subsidiary associations and subdivisions. Luckily, we have a management company that handles most of the day-to-day operations.

# What is the time commitment needed while serving on the Board?

The Board typically holds one Open Session and one Executive Session per month, which takes approximately 2-4 hours, combined. There are presently seven standing committees that each have varying meeting schedules determined by their respective committee charter. Depending on which committee you would like to be involved with, an additional 1-2 hours per week may be required. Typically, the time commitment averages about 8 hours a month.

# When and where is the Board of **Directors Meetings?**

The meeting schedule is actually determined by the Board of Directors. Our current meeting schedule is the 4th Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m., at Desert Ridge Community Association Office, Conference Room, 5415 E. High Street, Suite 220, Phoenix 85054.

# Do you incur personal liability by serving on the Board?

Generally, as long as a Director acts in good faith with the best interests of the community first, doesn't break any laws, or have any personal benefit, the Association indemnifies the Directors. The Association's Articles of Incorporation provide the most comprehensive explanation of liability. Please read and understand them fully for yourself. The Articles of Incorporation can be found on FirstService Connect, the community information website, or the CD.

# How does the election actually work?

There is a one vote per lot for each available position on the board. A qualified Owner will be able to cast one vote for up to 3 candidates.

# Do developers and commercial entities get to vote?

Yes, qualified developers and commercial entities are members and get to vote. The Desert Ridge Board is not a Homeowners Association, it is a Community Association. One of the great things about Desert Ridge is that it is still a relatively young development, and only about 40% of the total parceled land have homes built on them. Since the voting is determined per lot, there is still significant involvement by private and commercial developers and the Master Developer. The Master Developer actually casts votes for all land held by the Arizona State Land Dept.

# What is the role of the Association?

The Association is intended to be an "umbrella" organization whose primary responsibilities are: (a) the maintenance of all Common Areas; (b) through the Committee, the subdivision, site plan and design review of all improvements within Desert Ridge; and (c) the coordination and oversight of the community subsidiary associations and subdivisions.

# Tips for people who are running:

Get out there and talk to your neighbors - ask them what their concerns are for the community. Let them know you're running. Candidates may speak with developers as well as the commercial interests. And thank you for getting involved!



The Notary acts as an impartial witness to the signing of legally binding documents.


The notary ensures that the signer is actually the person named on the document and that they have not been forced to sign against their will. Documents that create a legally binding agreement usually need to be notarized, although this can vary according to local laws.

Satisfactory Evidence of Identity: In accord with A.R.S. 41-311(11), notaries public may accept the following forms of identification as proof of identity:

- 1. An unexpired driver license that is issued by a state or territory of the United
- 2. An unexpired passport that is issued by the United States Department of State.
- 3. An unexpired identification card that is issued by any branch of the United States Armed Forces.
- 4. Any other unexpired identification card that is issued by the United States government or a state or tribal government, that contains the individual's photograph, signature and physical description that contains the individual's height, weight, color of hair and color of eyes.

What documents need to be notarized?

- Will, Deeds and Trusts
- Medical documents
- Powers of Attorney



Please note below the following conditions/ requirements of the Desert Ridge Notary Services:

- 1. Members must be in "good standing" with the Desert Ridge Community Association.
- 2. Notary will be provided for personal (individual) purposes only. Notaries will not be provided for a member's business or third party purposes.
- 3. Notaries are provided by "appointment only" to ensure that the Notary is available to meet with the member.
- 4. The Desert Ridge Community Association Notary reserves the right to refuse to notarize a document(s) presented to them upon and after review.

# HOLIDAY LIGHTING AND DECORATIONS

It's that time of the year again. Let's all be respectful of our neighbors and community.

Holiday lighting and/or decorations shall not become anuisance to neighbors. Holiday lighting/decorations that directly correspond to specific and generally recognized events may be displayed for a period of

seven days preceding the specific calendar holiday and must be removed within three days following the said holiday.



The only exception is for holiday lighting and/or decorations for the holidays that fall in the month of December. As to such holiday lighting and/or decorations otherwise complying herewith may be put up as early as the immediately preceding Thanksgiving holiday and must be removed no later than January 7th, 2016.

No holiday lighting and/or decorations can be placed by owners on common areas and electricity for such

holiday lighting and/or decorations must be provided from the dwelling unit/lot and may not be derived from any common area facility.



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# **FREEZE WARNING!**


Sub-freezing temperatures are forecasted for the Phoenix Metro areas this coming winter. Make sure to wrap any above ground irrigation piping, and if possible, drain them with the ball valves open 1/8 of a turn (half open). If shut down and drainage is not an option, schedule drip zones to run long cycles over night far from sidewalks, trails, or places of gathering to prevent slips and injuries during the morning hours. The constant movement of water helps to prevent water from freezing since water in under-ground piping stays above 32F. This is also a good practice


for your own system at home whether it's for irrigation, pool, or the water service into your house.

Cover frost sensitive plants like Bougainvillea, Hibiscus, Lantana, and Winter Annuals. Use any paper or cloth-like material (old sheets or towels) to cover the plant. Frost cloths are also available at local nurseries or home improve-ment stores. Make sure to cover the plant all the way to the ground to help trap any heat radiating from the ground. Plants that are dry are more likely to get frost damage,

so water them before the frost.

Delay mowing start times for later into the day, after the frost burns off. Frozen grass is not only a safety issue but heavy equipment and even walking on turf can cause damage.






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

# FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

## **DEADLINE TO DONATE: DECEMBER 31**

Here are some general quidelines about using the Charitable Tax Credit. Should you have further questions, please consult your tax advisor.

### What is the tax credit?

The tax credit—called the Credit for Contributions made to Qualifying Charitable Organizations by the state of Arizona—is a charitable contribution you can give to an eligible nonprofit. With the donation you can receive a dollar-for-dollar credit and/or reduction of up to \$400 for joint filers and \$200 for individual filers on your Arizona state taxes.

### Do I have to itemize deductions to claim the tax credit?

No. Starting in 2013, you do NOT have to itemize deductions to claim the Charitable Tax Credit. To be eligible you simply have to file Arizona State taxes.

### What is the maximum credit and/or reduction I can receive?

\$400 if filing jointly or \$200 if filing as a single. We appreciate donations at any amount.

### When is the deadline to contribute?

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Scottsdale must receive your tax credit donation by December 31st. You will receive a receipt in the mail showing your donation for filing purposes.

### I give to the Public Education and Private Education Tax Credit. Can I do this tax credit as well?

Yes. Each tax credit is independent. Therefore, you can take advantage of all three tax credits if desired.

### How do you utilize these tax credit dollars?

Your tax credit donation will be directly applied to the 18,000 youth served at the Club including:

- Over 100 specialized youth development programs at the Club.
- 70,000 free meals served to youth who need it the most.
- Hundreds of youth who receive free dental care through our Outreach Services.
- Fieldtrips, overnight trips, summer camps & so much more.

# How do I know the organization I support qualifies for the credit under this program?

You can visit www.azdor.gov/TaxCredits.aspx to see a list of all qualifying organizations.

# Can I make contributions to more than one qualifying charitable organization?

Yes, but the total to the Credit for Contributions made to Qualifying Charitable Organizations allowed is still \$200 per individual or \$400 for married couples filing jointly, regardless of the number of organizations you support.

As you have probably learned by now, golf is one of those games that is full of both highs and lows. We are constantly striving for more highs and trying eliminate the lows. In order to play our best golf, we not only need to have an effective swing, but we need a good "mental game." The "mental game" is one of those terms that is loosely thrown around without truly knowing how to develop one. The biggest key to having a strong mental game is your ability to narrow your focus.

When we are preparing to hit a golf shot, there are a tremendous amount of variables that will affect our shot such as distance. wind etc. Narrowing your focus is simply taking all the information about the variables and making decisions until vou're left with just one swing thought. Picture that you are putting all the information about your shot into a funnel and what you are left with on the other side of the funnel is one swing thought. The best way to create this funneling process is to use an effective pre-shot routine. Let's take a look at a simple three step pre-shot routine that will take you through the process of narrowing your focus.

Look at the shot and make your

club selection: First look at your shot and start asking yourself some questions. Some of the questions you may want to ask are: What is my distance? Is there any trouble I need to go over or avoid? Is there any wind that will affect my shot? How is my lie? Once you have answered your questions, select the appropriate club.

Make practice swings: A practice swing is like a rehearsal. If you are acting in a play, you would rehearse your scenes. A practice swing is no different. Rehearse your swing a couple times before opening night. When making your practice swings, either practice the exact swing you are trying to make or practice the swing change you are currently trying to make. This point in the routine is the perfect time to incorporate any changes you are trying to make from a lesson or practice on the driving range.

Line up and swing: When you are lining up, pick a target and be very specific. The more specific you are about your target, the better your shot will typically be. When setting up to the ball, line your club up to the target first and then orient your body to the club. Setting up in this sequence will give you the best chance to line up correctly. Last, make

your swing. Did you notice that I said make your swing rather than hit the ball? If you are lined up correctly and you make a good swing, the ball will go where you want. If you are trying to hit the ball rather than swing the club, you will never be able to develop the consistent golf swing you are working so hard to develop.

Try using this routine. Just like a swing change, a pre-shot routine will require a little practice before it becomes a new habit. Soon you will start to notice that you are able to narrow your focus and

begin to see more consistency on the golf course.







Someone is at your door, but you aren't expecting anyone. You look out and see someone you don't recognize. What do you do? The answer is

to always respond. However, responding doesn't mean you have to open the door. Calling out to ask "How may I help you?" is usually the best way to start. Often times, a criminal will check to see if anyone is home before breaking in. Letting them know someone is home is usually a strong deterrent to the criminal element. If they ask for someone who doesn't live in your home, call the police immediately. That's a trick burglars have been using for years.

What about door-to-door solicitors? We have definitely seen an increase of door-todoor "Reps" claiming to work for various companies. Some of these people may indeed work with or be affiliated with, a particular company, but despite their official looking embroidered shirts, they are not an actual employee of that company. This may not apply to all companies, but when it comes to the utilities, APS, CenturyLink, Cox Communications, and Southwest Gas, their employees will not come to your home unless you call for service. Keep in mind, regardless of the person's intentions; you

have every right to ask them to leave or to respond politely by saying "No thank you", "Now's not a good time", or even "Sorry, I'm on a call right now".

### Why are the police in my neighborhood?

During the Holiday Season, you will notice more Phoenix Police driving around Desert Ridge. This is because the DRCA Board of Directors has authorized an increase in Phoenix Police off-duty patrols. In fact, the amount of patrols will nearly double during the Holiday Season.

### Holiday safety tips

Even with the increased police patrols, you still need to be aware of your surroundings and take appropriate precautions. Below are my annual Holiday safety tips to help get you through the season safely.

#### When Shopping, or Out and About

- Take only the credit cards you need when shopping. Leave the others in a safe place at home.
- When paying with a credit card, make sure that the card is not easily visible to others around you. There are crooks that can memorize your card number in a matter of seconds.
- Keep your purse or wallet close to you at all times.

- Do not carry excessive or unnecessary cash on you.
- Shop in the daylight if possible. When shopping after dark always park in a well-lit area.
- Shop with a friend when possible, because there's safety in numbers.
- Do not leave your purse, wallet, cell phone, or any other valuables in plain
- When you return to your vehicle, scan the interior to be sure no one is hiding inside.
- When placing purchases from the stores in your vehicle, place them out of sight. The best place is in the trunk.



- After putting packages in your vehicle, drive to different row before going to another store. Do this even if you are simply going back to the same store.
- Try not to park next to a larger vehicle, that blocks your vision while you are entering or exiting your vehicle.
- Have your keys out and ready when approaching your vehicle.

#### **When Home**

- To help prevent vandalism, turn off inflatable decorations at a specific time. If convenient, bring them up to the front porch or close to the house.
- Keep the front of the house well lit and make sure that trees and bushes are trimmed so that doors and windows can easily be seen.
- Install an alarm system if possible (see my article from the Spring issue).
- Beware of door-to-door charity scams.
- Keep an eye out for parcel deliveries; packages on porches are big targets.
- Make sure that smoke and carbon monoxide detectors have fresh batteries and are functioning properly (Make sure detectors).

that you have smoke and carbon monoxide

■ Do not leave boxes from your gifts in plain site before or after the holidays. A box from a flat screen TV is advertising to a criminal that you have what they're looking for.

#### When Leaving Town

- Have mail held at the post office while you're away.
- Use timers on lights to give the appearance that someone is home.
- Let a loved one or someone else that you trust know the route that you're taking.

This goes especially if you will be traveling in snowy or icy conditions.

■ Register for Vacation Watch with the City of Phoenix Police department.

By utilizing these tips, having heightened awareness, and by using some common sense, we can all have a safer and more joyous holiday season.

Then stir in eggs and vanilla then blend the flour mixture in. Stir in the apples and walnuts into the mixture and spread into a 9×9 inch greased pan. Sprinkle the rest of the cinnamon and sugar on top. Bake for 20–25 minutes.

While some kids wouldn't dream of going to school where their parents teach, it's no big deal to Paradise Valley Community College Honors student Becca Clark, whose mom, Lynn, has been an adjunct accounting professor at PVCC since 2011. "I love the students!" says Lynn. "They inspire me to be the best professor that I can. Also, our professors, administrators and staff are amazing. They are dedicated to making PVCC the best place for students to begin their college career. "

Clark's 20-year old daughter Becca is a member of Phi Theta Kappa (national two-year honorary society) and recipient of a Presidents' Scholarship that covers tuition for four consecutive semesters. 
