From the President

Our Successful Accomplishments in 2018

As a new year arrives, I like to reflect upon the accomplishments we've enjoyed in the past 12 months. It's been another incredibly productive year – and another year without an

increase in the fees to the members of our Association.

To be efficient, I'll focus on the highlights:

- The DRCA Board of Directors finalized and approved the 2019 annual budget.
 This represents the 14th consecutive year that the Master Association annual assessment of \$372.00 was not increased.
- The Desert Ridge Community Association (Master Association) assumed the responsibility for maintenance in the Fireside Community. As part of this action, the DRCA Board of Directors approved a loan to the Fireside HOA (sub-association) of \$440,000 to assist the sub-association in bringing the Fireside neighborhood up to the Desert Ridge Community Association standards. Two major areas of work included the replenishment of common area decomposed granite at a cost of \$370,000 and replacing \$70,000 in missing plants. The DRCA loan enabled the DRCA to avert a potential special assessment to the 914 Fireside HOA residents, which the Fireside HOA Board of Directors agreed to repay the DRCA from future home resales via their neighborhood enhancement fund.
- The DRCA transferred an additional \$500,000 from the operating account to the DRCA reserves, which are fully funded at 112% as of the 2018 fiscal year end.
- The DRCA engaged Rick Engineering Company to perform an extensive assessment of the Yavapai and Coconino washes to develop plans for future erosion remediation.
- The DRCA worked with AAA Landscape to perform the 2018 Tree Trimming based on their certified arborist recommendation

- to trim 1,608 trees and remove 17 trees throughout the Community.
- DRCA Board of Directors approved an extensive paint project of the common area walls, monuments, light poles, utility boxes, bridges and arterial intersections street traffic signal poles to the new updated and approved colors proposed by the Design Review Committee.
- The DRCA secured a new office lease on High Street for a lease term of 65 months. The new office lease resulted in a reduced office footprint and an annual savings to the association of \$26,000.
- The 2018 Monsoon storms caused widespread community damage and uprooted trees throughout the Desert Ridge (Master Association) common areas and to private residences. AAA landscape and our management team had to perform several site inspections with the claim adjuster(s) to document the claim damage for insurance purposes (for each claim occurrence); before storm damage clean-up and maintenance could be performed. There were several claims filed by the association during the monsoon season amassing to about \$75,000-\$80,000 in storm damage claims.
- A total of 17 sidewalk slabs throughout the community were identified and addressed due to uprooted trees, with a total 51 root barriers installed to prevent future damage to the adjacent walkways.
- The DRCA commenced the formation of a 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization. This corporate entity is being organized for future charitable, educational and cultural purposes, including, for such purposes, charitable fundraising.
- The Desert Ridge Community Association Design Review Committee is finalizing proposed updates to the Residential Design Guidelines that will be drafted and sent to all community members for their review and input in 1st quarter 2019.
- The Desert Ridge Community Association commenced online electronic voting in



2018, which enabled the association to generate savings of \$9,000 due to reduced mailings, postage and other related administrative expenses. Members are encouraged to use online e-voting to cast their annual ballots in the future.

- The DRCA partnered with High Street Buildings, LLC to facilitate the return of the Desert Ridge Farmers Market to High Street. The Farmers Market on High Street is now a weekly market during the months of October through April.
- The DRCA also partnered with the City of Phoenix Parks and Recreation to advance community lifestyles event at Reach 11 including the Easter Egg Scramble, Teen Battle of the Bands and the Holiday Snow Blast Signature Events.
- The DRCA advanced the community Strategic Community Plan and its involvement with the City of Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department relative to the development and recent opening of Pinnacle Park (Dog Park).

I feel extremely good about the work the DRCA has accomplished in the past 12 months. Our reserve fund is at 112% funding, our communities are being well managed, and our common areas have never looked better. We will keep raising the bar and raising our expectations as we move forward.

On behalf of the Desert Ridge Community Association Board, I thank you for your support and look forward to seeing you in the neighborhood!

The Celebration of Fine Art, the West's premiere art show and working studio, will open in Scottsdale, Ariz. on Saturday, Jan. 12 with 100 acclaimed and emerging artists selected from Arizona and throughout the country. The show, where art lovers and artists connect, will be open daily through Sunday, March 24 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Nearly 30 years ago, the Celebration of Fine Art transformed the way people experience art when it debuted in downtown Scottsdale. Now a linchpin in Arizona's art, culture and tourism scene, the Celebration of Fine Art hosts 100 of the country's top artists and sees nearly 50,000 visitors from around the globe on average each year.

The Celebration of Fine Art takes place in north Scottsdale under the signature "big white tents" and features 40,000-square-feet of working artist studios and works of art. The juried, invitational show has come to be recognized not only for its exceptional art, but also its welcoming experience and interactive atmosphere.

"Over the course of the past 28 years, the tradition, passion and dedication of connecting people to art has remained a constant focus, sparking conversation and fostering newfound friendships between art lovers and artists," said Susan Morrow Potje, co-owner and show director. "We're incredibly lucky to work with such a wide range of talented artists—from painters, sculptors and jewelry makers, to

photographers, fiber and glass artists, and more. The variety of skills our artists bring to the show only contributes to its energetic atmosphere, making it a true destination for all art lovers."

The popular Art Discovery Series, in which guests get to hear and learn from a panel of artists on various topics, will be held each Friday from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. throughout the 10 weeks. In year's past, each session has brought hundreds of guests face-to-face with artists to learn about topics ranging from metal working to history in art. During the panel discussions and live demos, attendees discover how artists research their works of art for accuracy and intrigue. The conversations will be accompanied by wine and cheese to compliment the topic.

Styles at the show range from realistic to impressionistic, Western realism, abstract to contemporary. The outdoor sculpture garden will return with nearly 100 pieces of life-sized and monumental sculpture as well as shared work space where visitors can see wood turning, welding, kiln firings, and bronze pouring demonstrations weekly.

The show is open to guests of all ages. Tickets are \$10 for adults, \$8 for seniors and military, and children under 12 are admitted for free. Tickets are all-event passes, good for the entire 10-week show during which attendees will have the opportunity to see art transform and meet the artists.

The 2019 Waste Management Phoenix Open Presented by The Ak-Chin Indian Community returns to Scottsdale January 28-February 3 for a week of fun-filled excitement, warm winter weather and world-class golf.

Each year, thousands of visitors come to the Valley of the Sun from all over the globe to see the PGA TOUR's best tee it up at TPC Scottsdale for their shot at golf glory. The winner will take home nearly \$2 million, but it pales in comparison to the extraordinary charitable contributions of The Thunderbirds. As the host, The Thunderbirds raised a record-breaking \$12.2 million just last year alone, and an amazing \$134 million in its 83-year history.

"Each and every year is special when we make this announcement, but this year is extra special and truly a proud moment for The Thunderbirds," said 2018 Tournament Chairman Carlos Sugich. "We knew the number would be high, but to reach a new milestone by breaking our own single-year record and in doing so joining only a handful of tournaments in the history of the PGA TOUR to break the \$12 million barrier is spectacular."

As always, The Thunderbirds spare no expense to improve fan experience at the event. This year, El Rancho, the popular venue overlooking the par-3 12th hole, will expand to more than 18,000 square feet

giving patrons an incredible place to watch golf on three holes. The 18th hole skyboxes have grown upwards and now include 54 corporate skyboxes within the double-decker construction. Growth at The Cove at the drivable par-4 17th continues in 2019 with increased corporate boxes and new general-admission seating options at 10 green have been added to increase the total number of general admission seating across the golf course to 6,700 public seats.

The WM Phoenix Open will be played Thursday-Sunday (January 31-February 3), but there will still be plenty of things to see and do at TPC Scottsdale all week long. Monday is the Kadima. Hoyt Jr. Family Foundation Dream Day activities located across the street at TPC Scottsdale's Champions Course practice range. The festivities include a junior clinic sponsored by PING, motivational speeches from PGA TOUR professionals and a trick-shot golf show. Additionally, the

Friday features two headlining acts, hip-hop star, Snoop Dogg, and pop duo, The Chainsmokers, and Saturday brings electronic dance music stars Martin Garrix and DI Vice.

In addition to the incredible attendance, charitable donations and overall economic impact, the 2018 WM Phoenix Open also received the highest international award for sustainability in golf by becoming a GEO Certified event. The event's title sponsor, Waste Management, is an integral part of the sustainability efforts, and through their combined efforts with The Thunderbirds, achieved zero-waste status for the sixthstraight year. Waste Management diverted 100 percent of all tournament waste away from landfills and into renewable materials and energy, making the WM Phoenix Open the largest verified zero-waste event in the world. To celebrate this remarkable achievement, on Saturday, the tournament invites everyone to participate in the eighthannual GREEN OUT. Scottsdale Preview-Past Success Inspires Big Dreams

The Scottsdale Arabian Horse Show has a rich history in the valley of the sun and will be celebrating its 64th Anniversary this year. Since 1955 the Annual Scottsdale Arabian Horse Show has set the pace in the Arabian horse world. The first show was held at the grounds of the Arizona Biltmore Hotel which was a beautiful setting for a horse show. The Scottsdale Arabian Horse Show was a first class show from the very first day. After the show's beginnings at the Arizona Biltmore, Ann McCormick bought 150 acres in Scottsdale and made it into the horse facility known as Paradise Park which served the needs of the show for many years. Since that time, the show has been held at Westworld in Scottsdale since 1989. It has grown from 50 horses to over 2400 horses bringing top owners, trainers and breeders from around the world competing for a chance at winning. A win at Scottsdale can mean big money in the breeding barns.

The sponsoring organization, the Arabian Horse Association of Arizona, was incorporated in 1955. There were about twelve members when it began and it has grown to over 650 members. The nonprofit board of directors that is anything but lax, from the sensational group of horse and horseman that participate, and from the non-horse and horse community of

Scottsdale making the show an elaborate and exciting event to attend. And beyond all this, there are always new things to look forward to at the Scottsdale Arabian Horse Show. So, as the show quickly approaches, what does the show management have planned for this year?

The show will be held February 14-24, 2019, one of the new components of the show is a new and improved high point program. No longer necessary to enter or pay a fee to take part in the program, the new program is categorized through junior exhibitors, adult amateur exhibitors, and overall horse points. These are further broken down by age and class division, offering many category possibilities for exhibitors. Considering further the prize benefits available, the prize money total reaches well over an incredible \$2,500,000 this year. Nearly \$550,000 of this colossal total comprises the prize winnings for the Scottsdale Signature Stallion classes, an impressive amount and incredible opportunity for the elite group of stallions in the Signature program. The rest of the prize money comes from the divisions of halter, performance, dressage stakes, freestyle liberty, the Gambler's Choice class, youth scholarship classes, and in the prominent reining classes of the show.

More than these substantial prizes for exhibitors, Scottsdale is a nonprofit organization that donates much of its gate proceeds to charity. Executive Director of the Arabian Horse Association of Arizona. 

- Use at least one special character (! @ /?)


Banking—The holidays are a prime time for criminals to steal credit and debit card information. It's important to check your bank and charge card accounts for fraudulent activity.

CHECK DETECTORS AND BATTERIES

Three out of five home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes without working smoke detectors. Smoke detector failures usually result from missing, disconnected or dead batteries. A monitored smoke detector is typically hardwired to the alarm box and has continuous power. Whether batteryoperated or hardwired, smoke detectors don't last forever, the devices themselves should be replaced every 10 years. The same goes for Carbon Monoxide detectors. Carbon Monoxide is a byproduct of incomplete combustion. The gas can come from a stove, water heater, furnace, fireplace, etc. Because Carbon Monoxide is odorless and tasteless, it can poison you before you even know it's there. A Carbon Monoxide detector can sound an audible alarm and send an alert the monitoring station, possibly saving you or a loved one. If you have a fireplace or use natural gas in your home, having at least one Carbon Monoxide detector is a must. Let's all strive to be safer in 2019.

Block Watch Success and Community Programs

The Phoenix Police Department has a variety of programs that partner with the community to help prevent crime and the flagship of those programs is Block Watch. There are many times when active Block Watches are involved in the observation and reporting of crimes in progress which lead to an arrest.

Block Watch is basically neighbors watching out for others in their neighborhood to deter crime and using common sense crime prevention methods to reduce crime. During Block Watch you get acquainted with your neighbors, work together to identify problems in the area and help the Phoenix Police Department by being aware and reporting suspicious behavior. The observation and reporting of suspicious behavior is a key component as you know your neighborhood better than anyone else. Block Watch is not a hands on program, there is no apprehending of people for any reason.

Several years ago an active Block Watch was having an issue with packages being stolen from the doorsteps of the neighborhood. This is not an uncommon problem, especially during the holidays. They started out by communicating with their assigned Community Action Officer to validate the stories they had been hearing about the thefts. This information was provided through the Block Watch communication

they had organized which was an email tree of all involved residents in their area. It didn't contain any specific information on suspects as there wasn't but just a general "please be on the lookout" statement. A few days later an observant resident of the Block Watch was working from home and observed a UPS truck deliver a package to her neighbor's door. Right after the UPS truck had left, a truck with two occupants stopped at the neighbor's house and one of the suspects stole the package. The resident called 911 and gave a description as best as she could of the truck and suspects. Responding officers found the suspect truck a short distance away, stopped it and found several stolen UPS packages in it. The suspects were arrested and further follow up resulted in more stolen property being recovered at their house.

This was all accomplished because of an observant neighbor / Block Watch member. The program does work and by both being observant and practicing common sense crime prevention techniques we teach as part of Block Watch, your neighborhood safety can also be improved.

Another program which involves partnering with the Phoenix Police Department and helping to improve your neighborhood is the Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol Program. This program allows residents to become more actively involved as partners in crime prevention. The Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol Program began in 1994 as Block Watchers on Patrol and was associated with the Block Watch McGruff logo. By 2004, they spent over 26,000 hours and traveled 77,490 miles assisting the police officers of the City of Phoenix Police Department by driving through their neighborhoods and



watching for suspicious criminal behavior, fights, traffic problems, stolen vehicles, and missing persons. In 1999 the program adopted the name of Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol and its new logo. We have had the opportunity and privilege of training over 1500 citizens in observation skills, criminal codes, police procedures, and drug recognition through non-confrontational methods. Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol participants are citizens, not police officers or police department volunteers. They have no powers of arrest beyond that of any private citizen. They are trained for observation purposes only and participate for benefit of their community or neighborhood.

After the following qualifications are met, a background check will be completed. This process will include a check for warrants and any criminal record. Persons listed as suspects or investigative leads on police reports will be handled on a case-by-case basis. Final approval for participation in the Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol program will be at the discretion of the Patrol Division Assistant Chief of Police.

QUALIFICATIONS

- Reside in the City of Phoenix
- Be at least 18 years of age
- Possess a valid driver license or Arizona identification card
- Complete mandatory Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol training.

DISQUALIFYING CONDITIONS:

■ Felony convictions within the past 60 months (from time of application)

- Any pending criminal charges
- Conviction for child molestation
- Registered as a sex offender
- Adjudicated by the courts to be mentally incompetent

One last program which showcases our Community Based Policing philosophy is the Citizens Police Academy. The Phoenix Police Department's Citizens Police Academy (CPA) began in April 1986 with the intent to provide business and community leaders an inside look at law enforcement. That concept still stands today with over 75 Citizens Police Academies having been completed and hundreds of citizens having learned "what we do, and why we do it." Applicants must be 21 years of age or older, live and/or work in the City of Phoenix, must pass a required background check, commit to all dates of each academy session, and must be referred by a former CPA participant or member of the Phoenix Police Department. A variety of topics may be offered during each academy experience to include: deadly force encounters, drug enforcement and gangs, firearms and decision-making, tactical training, internet crimes, police ethics and professional

standards, 9-1-1, crime lab, air support and K9 unit, an overview of investigations surrounding homicides, document crimes, robberies, crimes against children, and demonstrations/equipment displays by the department's Special Assignments Unit.

There will be a Board Candidates "Meet and Greet" at the Farmers Market on High Street on Sunday, February 17th at 11:00 AM, a "Meet the Candidate" night at 6:00 PM on Wednesday, February 27th at the DRCA Board of Directors Meeting and another Board Candidates "Meet and Greet" at the DRCA Farmers Market on High Street on Sunday, March 17th at 11:00 AM.

How many positions are available this year and how long will my term be?

Out of the seven member seats on the Board of Directors, there are four (4) seats on the Board of Directors that are available for election in 2019. Directors are elected to serve two year terms. In 2019, these four positions will be elected for a two year term since the two year term for these four seats will expire in April 2018. Therefore, all four positions will serve two year terms.

What is the process for running for a position on the Board?

Return all candidate application forms to the Association office no later than 5:00 PM on Friday, February 8th.

In addition, candidates are required to attend at least one of the three "Meet the Candidate" events. It is strongly recommended that all board candidates attend the Board Candidates Meet &



Greet / Q&A to be held during the DRCA Board of Director Meeting on Wednesday, February 28th at 6:00 PM. Candidates are also encouraged to attend the DRCA Farmers Market on High Street Board Candidates Meet & Greet / Q&A on Sunday, February 18th at 11:00 AM or Sunday, March 18th at 11:00 AM. Candidates must also attend the Desert Ridge Community Association Annual Membership Meeting & Election on Thursday, April 18th. Candidate attendance at this meeting is mandatory!

What are the Directors' responsibilities?

The Desert Ridge Community Association is an Arizona-chartered, 501(c)(4) nonprofit social welfare organization. Directors are responsible for operating and maintaining the "common area" property of the community, reviewing and approving all site plans and improvements within the community, and providing coordination and oversight of the community subsidiary associations and subdivisions. Luckily, we have a management company that handles most of the day-to-day operations.

What is the time commitment needed while serving on the Board?

The Board typically holds one Open Session and one Executive Session per month, which takes approximately 2–4 hours, combined. There are presently seven standing committees that each have varying meeting schedules determined by their respective committee charter. Depending on which committee you would like to be involved

with, an additional 1-2 hours per week may be required. Typically, the time commitment averages about 8 hours a month.

When and where is the Board of Directors Meetings?

The meeting schedule is actually determined by the Board of Directors. Our current meeting schedule is the 4th Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. (except for the months of April, July and December), at Desert Ridge Community Association Office, Conference Room, 5415 E. High Street, Suite 133, Phoenix 85054.

Do you incur personal liability by serving on the Board?

Generally, as long as a Director act in good faith with the best interests of the community first, doesn't break any laws, or have any personal benefit, the Association indemnifies the Directors. The Association's Articles of Incorporation provide the most comprehensive explanation of liability. Please read and understand them fully for yourself. The Articles of Incorporation can be found on FirstService Connect, the community information website, or the CD.

How does the election actually work?

There is a one vote per lot for each available position on the board. A qualified Owner will be able to cast one vote for up to 4 candidates.

Do developers and commercial entities get to vote?

Yes, qualified developers and commercial entities are members and get to vote. The Desert Ridge Board is not a Homeowners Association, it is a Community Association. One of the great things about Desert Ridge is that it is still a relatively young development, and only about 40% of the total parceled land have homes built on them. Since the voting is determined per lot, there is still significant involvement by private and commercial developers and the Master Developer. The Master Developer actually casts votes for all land held by the Arizona State Land Dept.

Tips for people who are running:

Get out there and talk to your neighbors – ask them what their concerns are for the community. Let them know you're running. Candidates may speak with developers as well as the commercial interests. And thank you for getting involved!
