From the Communications Chair

Desert Ridge, becoming the Diamond INTHEDESERT

My wife and I bought our first Desert Ridge home in 2005. We purchased here because the plans for Desert Ridge were robust and exciting, featuring the largest

regional Mall in the Southwest with high level entertainment, the Desert Ridge Marketplace, the JW Marriott Phoenix Desert Ridge Resort & Spa, 16,000 homes, quality schools, The Mayo hospital as well as plans for several iconic corporations to build their headquarters, easy access to points all over the valley on the proposed 101. All built from the desert floor up and carved out of a 5-square mile section of Northeast Phoenix. A blueprint for success that suggested a home purchase in Desert Ridge could be a great investment. We were anxious to get in and ride the wave. Then came 2008.

The economic crash of 2008 put an end to those hopes and dreams. We were left with half-finished sub communities, acres of undeveloped desert land, homes worth half of what we paid, the abandonment of some projects and promises of others to return once the economic crises ended and the economy turned north.

The economy did stabilize and turn north about two years later. However, developers who had previously purchased parcels with plans to build forfeited their land claims back to the state and abandoned plans to build here. No longer were big box retailers interested in adding stores, therefore developers stopped building large regional enclosed malls. The Mall we hoped would bring prominence to the area was deemed no longer viable. Restaurants vacated the area, smaller retailers succumbed to

bankruptcy and closed their doors. The master developer of Desert Ridge filed for bankruptcy twice. Desert Ridge seemed closer to being a ghost town like those portrayed in the old wild west movies than a vibrant city within a city it was envisioned to be.

But like a phoenix rising from the ashes, something is happening here and it is exciting.

Long gone is the dream of Desert Ridge's symbol being a massive high end retail mall visible to all traveling on the 101. Little by little unique restaurant concepts and entertainment venues are opening in Desert Ridge. "For rent" signs are being replaced with "opening soon" and "now open" signs. We are becoming a destination for fun, food, and entertainment. Who needs a big box retailer to be our savior, we are becoming #greatdestinationlocation before our very eyes.

I personally find this metamorphosis exciting. My wife and I are Chicago area transplants. There, we're accustomed to short excursions to find live entertainment, events, and fun places to drop in for food and drink. For years here my wife and I would head out to Cave Creek or downtown Phoenix to seek live entertainment. We thought the 51 extension was the best thing to come to Desert Ridge since the 101, as it gave us easy access to downtown Phoenix. But those days are over. #It'sallhappeninghere.

First we ventured over to the MIM to take in a few concerts. Great music with acoustics about as close to perfect as sound can be. Then we started hanging out at Blue Martini to grab an adult beverage or two while listening to live music. Then Rick Bronson's House of Comedy opened. We started

dropping in to
see some outrageous
stand-up comedians. We
learned about open mic Tuesdays and decided
to give them a try. We figured it's only a
5-minute drive. It became one of our favorite
things as we often leave with sore sides from
laughing. Then just down the street High
and Rye opened and turned their stage into
raucous music venue.

But what solidified the metamorphosis of Desert Ridge from decimated development to entertainment destination for us was a trip to CB Live. Depending on the night, you can see live acts on their stage, then wait for it—the wall goes up and whoa, you're rocking the rest of the night away to some hard driving bands. #DesertRidgehascomealive.

When my wife and I left CB Live and drove the 1.25 miles back home, we talked about the changes we have seen here in just the last couple of years. Toll brothers completed the Villages at Aviano community, Statesman is in mega building mode at Toscana, DR Horton is about to break ground on their new 666 home community plus 260 apartments east of 56th, which will include the development of a 10 acre public park, the MIM awesome exhibits, the medical and research facilities being built in Mayo hospital corridor, The Phoenix Park district is in the middle of their major park complex along Reach 11 which includes the dog park, sports fields and plans for youth activities, developers are in discussion with the DRCA about developing several of the available super blocks, and now we are an entertainment destination featuring downtown quality entertainment. And this is only the

TO HIKE OR NOT TO HIKE that is the question

It seems that on most every profile I have read, people say they "like to hike". Hiking is one of those activities that sounds like a great idea, until the morning. That alarm goes off, it is dark and cold outside, and your blankie is talking you out of getting out of bed to explore the great outdoors. Have you ever heard of the old saying..." if I had a nickel for every time I heard this or that"? Well, let's just say I would be able to quit my day job and live very comfortably if I saved those nickels over the last 20 years of people saying they want to hike.



I have heard, "there are snakes"! Yes, for sure they are out there, but believe me they are not chasing you down to chomp on your ankles and suck your blood. In the 20 years I have been hiking I have seen 4 rattlesnakes, and they were all sleeping, curled up on the side of the trail. This is not to say, it is the case for everyone, nor every trail, I am just saying, do not sit on your couch and miss a great hike, just because you fear there MAY be snakes. Be aware, and alert, watch your step and have a blast!





I think of hiking as a way to find quiet! It feels like an adventure, freedom and a release from all the craziness of the day-to-day work, life schedule. The phones are put away, except to take pictures of the mountain, animals and each other sitting on this rock or that cliff. Conversations with friends are uninterrupted; and life feels good again...and so...

THE JOURNEY BEGINS...

Being a flatlander from Illinois, I really love and appreciate the Arizona landscape. Back in the day, I bought books on Hiking Arizona...nowadays, I use and recommend the app "All Trails". The app allows you to search trails near and far. Each trail is rated Easy, Moderate and Hard. It will give you exact directions to the trailheads, the elevation changes and all the information you need to venture out. The hiking opportunities are endless, there truly is something for everyone within an hour from Desert Ridge.



SOME TIPS

Buy Good Boots

As in any sport, you need equipment. Yes, gym shoes are good enough for smooth, easy trails, however if there are rocks, gravel and elevation, you need hiking boots. They will protect you from rough terrain, support your feet and ankles, and make you look like a hiker (very important).

Get Sun Protection

Hats, glasses, sunscreen, long sleeve shirts, etc...protect yourself so you don't fry!

Stay Hydrated

You don't have to break the bank to hike. A fanny pack type item that hold bottles of water can be found anywhere; or you can splurge and buy a special pack, called a Camelback that holds bladders of water. Buy what you like, just carry plenty of water so you stay hydrated and enjoy being outside.

HERE ARE JUST A FEW OF MY FAVORITE TRAILS....

Pinnacle Peak Trail

Pinnacle Peak Trail in Scottsdale, located within 20 minutes of Desert Ridge is a moderate hike that is 3.5 miles; out and back. The nice thing about this trail is that it is groomed and well maintained. It is a nestled next to Estancia Golf Course, surrounded by beautiful homes and scenery. There are restrooms, rangers and interesting touristy stuff to enjoy. It can be a good hike for a beginner if they stay on the trail before the switchbacks. My recommendation is to start slow, take breaks, and just soak in the scenery.



Gateway Loop Trail


Gateway Loop Trail is located within 20 minutes of Desert Ridge, just South of Legacy, off Thompson Peak Parkway in Scottsdale at the McDowell Sonoran Preserve. There you will find volunteers that hand out maps and are a great source of knowledge about the area. This trail is 4.2 mile loop, with a nice gradual assent. It can be a bit rocky, so boots are recommended. This hike gives you

the beautiful scenery of the McDowell's and helps you appreciate why we need to preserve our desert.

Superstition Mountain

The Superstition Mountain located in the East Valley is about 60 miles east of Desert Ridge. In my opinion this is by far the most beautiful mountain range in the Valley. It is a bit of a drive, but SO worth it. Last weekend my group hiked up to Wave Cave Trail that is 2.6 miles, moderate out and back trail. It was beautiful, actually breathtaking! We met some friendly, free range steers, that posed for some great pictures as they played around. The trail is long and flat with a moderate assent to the cave. The pictures in the cave are fantastic...it was so much fun! And guess what? No snakes or bats either!

I could go on and on, but will stop here, as there is so much to tell. I invite anyone



with a sense of wonder, to seek out a trail that looks good, and lace up those boots and explore Arizona.

Painting Homes

The Desert Ridge Community Association Standards and Compliance team is performing community inspections throughout all neighborhoods within Desert Ridge and notifying homeowners whose homes need paint maintenance. If you have not painted your home in the last 7–10 years, it is probably due for painting because of our harsh desert temperatures and sun exposure throughout the year. Provided below is the link to the Desert Ridge Lifestyles website where you can view and obtain the paint color palette for your neighborhood parcel specific to your home in Desert Ridge. Please note that all residential exterior improvements to your home require prior approval from the Desert Ridge Community Association Design Review Committee (Master Association) and initial approval from your sub-association architectural review committee (if applicable).

Residential Landscape Maintenance

All landscape areas shall be maintained in good condition, including but not limited to weeds, irrigation, mowing, fertilization, shrub and tree pruning (We ask that trees are maintained to an 8' minimum clearance over sidewalks and driveways for pedestrians and vehicles). Please assess your lot if you have mature trees that still have tree stakes or ties are no longer providing support since the tree is established. It is recommended to have the tree stakes/ties removed, if they are no longer needed. More information on these and other rules can be found in the Desert Ridge Community Association Residential Area Design Guidelines. Due to the weather and temperature, weeds are starting to grow rapidly. There are many options available to remove and minimize the growth of weeds and/or unwanted grass in yards. Please help by removing weeds as it is everyone's goal to keep Desert Ridge looking its best!

City of Phoenix Accelerated Pavement Maintenance Program

Through the Accelerated Pavement Maintenance Program, the Street Transportation Department will be accelerating pavement maintenance work on many of the city's major streets during fiscal years 2019 through 2023. The accelerated program will significantly improve the condition of some of the city's most deteriorated major streets and will be accomplished in conjunction with the pavement preservation program for local and collector streets. Vehicles parked on the street overnight will be tagged with a notice by our parking patrol company, Urban Tactical Security. If you are having guests/visitors parking on the street during the forty-eight hours guest parking time frame, please contact Desert Ridge to safe list the vehicle of your guest/visitor and to prevent their vehicle from being tagged during this period. So, come on out, bring your humans. Let them get to know each other. But be careful with





1 PRO- TIPS
for Spring Gardens

We Beautify the World



- 1 Ryegrass should be WATERED once or twice a week through March depending on the daytime temperature. Non over seeded Bermuda needs one good watering per month through March to keep the roots moist.
- 2 You can encourage the Bermuda to come out of dormancy as soon as the night

time temperatures stay in the mid sixty's. Greening usually starts in April and rapid growth starts in May. For over **seeded Bermuda**, switch to a deeper but less frequent Bermuda watering schedule in April to stress the Ryegrass. Mow Ryegrass at an increasingly lower cutting height each week in April to kill the Ryegrass.

3 SPRAY OR HAND PULL weeds as soon as they appear. Pre-emergent herbicides applied in December and late June will aid in year round weed prevention.



- PREPARE YOUR SOIL for a spring/ summer garden. Organic matter, mulch, manure or compost is very important. Fertilize producing vegetable gardens.
- (5) **Cut back old and dead growth** in the herb garden. Herbs to plant are mint, parsley, rosemary, sage and thyme.
- 6 For frost damaged herbs, look for new growth emerging on the lower half of the plant. Use sharp shears to cut the plant back by 1/3 to 1/2 or more, down to healthy new side shoots. Add new compost and water well.



- NOW IS THE TIME FOR SHAPING citrus trees if you must. Try to let the citrus foliage grow to about knee high. The best fruit is produced on the lower two thirds of the tree so raising the skirt reduces the amount of the fruit you will get.
- **8** Fertilize fruit, nut and shade trees, shrubs and vines. Pecan trees and grape vines need a zinc rich fertilizer to help them produce their best.
- 9 As the weather warms, adjust your irrigation timer to water more frequently. Be sure to run your system long enough to wet the top two feet of soil. DEEP, INFREQUENT WATERING IS MUCH BETTER THAN A DAILY SPRINKLE.



- for spring gardens. Add additional planting mix as needed. For each 100 square feet mix in one half pound ammonium phosphate, five pounds of bone meal and two pounds of blood meal.
- 11) **FERTILIZE FLOWERS** initially with a high phosphorus soluble liquid fertilizer weekly for a few weeks and then switch to a high quality granular slow release fertilizer to maintain nutrition through the season.

ALLOW YOUR WILDFLOWERS TO GO TO SEED.

They will produce a natural healthy feast for birds as well as reseeding themselves to come up again next year.

Last summer 22 teens were selected as Leaders in Training and spent their summer gaining important job skills as they volunteered in the youth summer camp. Each week the LITs had to follow specific schedules, practice accurate time keeping, complete assigned tasks, and learn to work cooperatively with a diverse group of people. Over the ten weeks of summer camp, these 22 teens volunteered over 3,000 hours of their time.

The Vestar Branch has a robust summer camp that the LITs play a very meaningful role in. One of the important components of their job is to interact with the members and help make their summer a memorable one. When one prospective L.I.T. was asked why he wanted to be an LIT, he said that he 'wanted to help make sure kids had the best summer and were able to make memories like the ones he has of when he was on the youth side.' The members on the youth side are put into groups based on their grade and then spend most of their day rotating through all of the different program areas, including computers, art, STEM, and gym. Each week has a different theme that activities are planned around and every Friday, the week culminates with a special event and themed dress up day. Throughout the week, each cabin works on a chant to be performed at the chant off Friday morning. Being able to help the youth work on these chants is one of the highlights of a lot of the LITs' summer.

crime prevention and the Quality of Life

The spring season is upon us and many residents are out enjoying the various events and activities that **Phoenix** has to offer. This season is a wonderful example of why so many people are here in Phoenix and are still continuing to move here, some estimates say 4,000 people a month. With Phoenix again one of the faster growing cities and communities in the country we get faced with the many challenges that come from expanding.

CHOOSING A NEIGHBORHOOD

Your neighborhood and community is an important aspect of your life and your family. You choose a neighborhood based on many things; schools, proximity to work or activities, friends or family, the style of the home, sales price, and also figured somewhere in that equation, safety. The safety of neighborhoods and each and every individual in that community is our responsibility at the Phoenix Police Department. We take great pride in serving and protecting you and working to improve the quality of life in your neighborhood.

In building a better community and improving the quality of life, crime prevention plays an important role. I have written many articles on

the various aspects of preventing crime, from burglary, auto theft, identity theft, drug prevention and so on, all in an attempt to help each and every one of you protect yourself and your family as much as possible. We as police officers are your partners in this endeavor, and will be there when you call and also when you don't call, out patrolling the streets of your neighborhood as you sleep, work or enjoy time with your family. We do need your help and your commitment to improve your community because it is a partnership between the police and citizens; we have the same goal and we can achieve it by working together.

How can we do that is a question I get often. Many of you have started a Block Watch in your area, which is a very good way

to learn and practice good crime prevention at your home and get to know your neighbors. Knowing your neighbors is at the top of the list when I teach Block Watch. I am not asking you to know every detail of your neighbors lives but knowing what I call your "primary" neighbors. These are the ones next to you and the three across the street from you and knowing just the minimum amount of information (at least their names and a good way to communicate with them, either phone numbers or email address) will go a long way in preventing some types of neighborhood crime. Knowing what is suspicious activity for your neighborhood. Knowing your children's friends and their parents in the neighborhood also helps in building a better community, this was a staple of many neighborhoods in the past and it does exist today, but to a lesser degree.

There is a common theme in most crime prevention and that is communication and awareness, communicate with your kids, your neighbors, your kids schools and your police department. If you see something suspicious in your neighborhood, call Crime Stop at 602-262-6151 or for crimes in progress, 911. I am contacted numerous times asking if I am aware of something going on in a neighborhood. With a city of 1.6 million and an area of responsibility for me of 85 square miles and 90,000 people, it is



sometimes difficult for me to hear of everything going on but I do keep in contact with all of the communities I serve as much as possible so that I may respond with the needed resources to address whatever issue comes up.

SAFER DRIVING HABITS

Another issue or question that comes up that I am asked to address is the driving habits of residents in their neighborhoods, in particular the speed of vehicles. The speed limits are set by the Streets and Transportation Department of the City of Phoenix and are done in conjunction with the type of roadway it is classified as, such as residential, collector or arterial. These speed limits are set for you and your family's safety and the safety



of other drivers on the road. Poor driving habits can be the result of many things but the disregard for obeying the speed limit usually comes down to inattention, being in a hurry or even the feeling that it's just a suggestion or guideline and that driver knows how fast they feel comfortable driving.

The law enforcement community in January lost an officer from the Salt River Police Department due to a

driver texting and driving on the 101 Freeway. This is not the first fatal accident from a driver texting and driving but just the latest. This tragedy and the others related to texting and driving are completely avoidable. The consequences of those acts have devastating effects on families and cost a police officer his life. Please take the time to drive safely by obeying the traffic laws and by not distracting yourself by texting and driving.

COMMUNICATION TIPS

Let's challenge each other to communicate more effectively with the purpose of improving our community. Let's try and see how we can learn more about the

neighborhoods we live in by watching out for each other and by just looking around when we are out walking or even just driving to and from our homes. Let's challenge each other by obeying the traffic laws and paying attention to our habits on the road. COMMON SENSE MEDIA (CSM)

During the end of the 2016-2017 school year, Fireside began looking at established digital citizenship programs that could be taught across multiple grades and settled upon the Common Sense Media (CSM) program. Being a technology-based school, we wanted to proactively give our students the tools to navigate the digital world and have students learn the impact it has on not only their lives but others as well. The CSM program was diverse in its content and robust enough to span from kindergarten to high school. We knew our teachers were having these conversations with students but saw the potential in teaching the lessons by Common Sense Media with the Nearpod interactive lesson presentation format.

We saw this as an opportunity to involve parents, students and teachers in our belief that we need to educate our students on being good digital citizens. We recognized the success of the parent volunteer programs such as Junior Achievement and Art Masterpiece and thought to model the Digital Citizenship Program in the same way. Another positive factor for the program was that the content could be delivered using the online interactive tool, Nearpod, to engage our students. Our teachers were excited and willing to give time to our parent volunteers to teach Digital Citizenship Lessons on a monthly basis.

Our next step was to reach out to parents who we observed connecting with students, were involved in our community, and we also believed it would be able to deliver the material in a way that empowered our student's and provided a comfort level to the digital world. Our Digital Citizenship (DC) parents are a dedicated group of parents that have children in multiple grade levels. These parents spent the summer of 2017 really digging into the Common Sense Media content and organizing the lessons to scaffolded in grades 3–6.

Fireside began piloting the Digital Citizenship program in the 2017–2018 school year to all the 3rd – 6th grade classes. In September of 2017, Fireside hosted a Technology Night where parents were introduced to the Digital Citizenship program, given an overview of the information available through Common Sense Media, and watched a presentation on internet safety from NotMyKid.

We continue to meet quarterly to discuss the volunteers' experiences teaching the students, continuously update our digital citizenship program by adding new content, seeking feedback and discussing ways to share with our parent community so the conversations that are happening during these lessons can continue at home. We are now in our second year of implementation and recruiting additional parent volunteers to shadow our current DC parents with the hope to sustain the program for many years to come.

"Talking about the subject matter in a safe environment and sharing their stories is so helpful. The students are able to recognize that others share some of their same feelings and experiences. In addition, the class provides opportunities for students to look at those feelings and experiences from a different perspective. Perspectives offered from both presenters and peers."


For Explorer Middle School students, the new year began with hope, inspiration, and motivation.

It's All About Signatural

This year I went to the Waste Management Phoenix Open to watch the Pro-Am. During the round. I heard the amateur asking the pro to read his putt. The amateur asked the pro if the putt would break one cup outside the hole. The pro's response was that it depends on the speed of the putt. The pro was 100% correct. Most amateurs are more concerned with the amount of break and do not consider the speed of the putt. When you're reading a putt, consider the break and the speed. Speed is most important.

Getting the speed of your putt correct is simply putting the ball the correct distance. Going forward, I will refer the speed of the putt as distance and the break of the putt as direction. Think about the consequences of getting the direction wrong versus getting the distance wrong. If your direction is wrong, you typically miss the hole by a foot or so on either side leaving yourself a short second putt. However, if you are wrong on speed, you could be long or short by ten feet leaving yourself a long second putt. If you consistently struggle putting the ball the

right distance, you probably have a lot of three putts on your card.

How do you control **vour distance?**

The size of your backswing of your putting stroke will control your distance. A shorter backswing will hit the ball shorter and a longer backswing will hit the ball further. Here is a good system to use as a starting point. You need four inches of backswing for every ten feet you want to putt. 4 inches = 10 ft, 8 inches = 20 ft, and 12 inches = 30 ft. This is a general basis and may vary due to the speed of the greens and for uphill and downhill putts. This system is a good starting point until you develop feel and touch.

Here is a great drill to use to

implement this system for a tenfoot putt. Refer to photo 1 to set up the drill. Place a tee ten feet away from the hole. Place a second tee four inches behind the first tee. Next, place a third tee 8 inches in front of the first. tee. Place your ball just in front of the first tee so your putter face is in line with the first tee. Your putting stroke should start at the middle tee, go to the back tee and follow through past the front tee. Refer to photos 2 and 3. Your putting stroke should be one motion from beginning to end. Use this drill to practice ten-foot putts and

then move to twenty-foot putts. For a twenty-foot putt repeat the process but place the back tee eight inches behind the middle tee and lengthen the distance for the forward tee.

Make your goals eliminating three putts and making more shorter putts. When you read your next putt, consider both distance and direction with distance being more important. Use the size of your backswing to control your distance. Begin with the 4-inch system as a guideline until you develop feel and touch and watch your scores come down.



THE HISTORY

If you have ever spent 24 hours in Chicago, you know that deep dish pizza is more than just a meal option, it is considered a food group all to its own. Deep dish pizza was invented in Chicago in 1943. It was first served by restauranteur Ike Sewell at his restaurant Uno's. Later reports credit Mr. Sewell's pizza Chef Rudy Malnati for inventing what became a staple of deep dish (Chicago style) pizza lovers.

Rudy and his son Lou left Uno's to create their own pizza restaurants in Chicago in the 1970's. In 1978 Lou passed away and his sons Mark and Rick took over the family business and became a Pizza empire by expanding to multiple locations around Chicago. And now the family has embarked on the Phoenix market.

THE PIZZA

What is different about the deep dish is it is baked in a 3" deep steel baking pan. This allows the chef to load up the pizza with mounds of cheese, tomato sauce and toppings. The crust itself is considered a topic to debate for pizza aficionados as to which pizza joints has the best crust.



While other pizza chains have tried opening locations in Phoenix, none proved to have the staying power. There are many opinions but when Rudy Malnati's grandsons decided to enter the Phoenix market the first thing they did was build a water filtration system to replicate the mineral content of Chicago water. This gives the flavor and texture to the crust that previous pizza operations could not recreate. Based on the number of people waiting for a table when we walked in, I think they succeeded

In our trip to the Lou Malnati's restaurant on Scottsdale Road we found each slice to eat like a meal unto itself. The crust has a little sweetness and with the butter running down the side a little taste of heaven. Each slice is filled with their signature tomato sauce and cheese. If you are a fan of sausage it is layered on to perfection. Pepperoni has just enough of a spice to tickle your taste buds. We also had the veggie which is loaded with mushrooms and green peppers. Any way you like it you are in for a taste treat.

Not interested in Chicago style pizza? Not a problem. Lou's offers a dynamite thin crust pizza too. Lou's water filtration system proves once again why it is so important in the taste and flavor of the crust. It is thin, crispy and the perfect surface for the sauce, cheese, and toppings that explode in your mouth with every bite.

BUT WAIT, THERE IS MORE

If pizza is not your thing, Lou's offers a robust menu of delicious options. For warm ups the minestrone soup is chock full of





vegetables that tastes so fresh you'd think they were just picked.

There are fried calamari, three cheese bread, and wings. All meals unto themselves. If you feel like a salad, the Malnati's salad is a traditional Italian salad packed with tomatoes, black olives, and Italian Salami. It is huge and the dressings are all hand made. We had the sweet vinaigrette dressing. It was everything the name suggests, sweet and tangy.

There are a variety of sandwiches. We have had the meatball sandwich before & found it to be very tasty. The grilled chicken sandwich was ordered without a bun and served on a bed of spinach and mushrooms. An excellent healthy choice.

But let's not forget the array of traditional pasta dishes that taste like they came out of your Italian grandmother's oven, if you have an Italian grandmother. So many choices but you cannot go wrong with any dish.

Because of the popularity, and the fact deep dish pizzas take significantly longer to make than thin crust, the wait can be measured in hours to get seated during peak times. The restaurant does not take reservations. However, you can pre-order by calling ahead to reduce your wait time once seated. Prepare to wait, but it's worth it.


