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From the President

Survey Results

In this edition of the Desert Ridge Lifestyles Magazine, we present the outcome of our most recent survey. The survey polled Desert Ridge residents on important questions

about our community. It's an interesting article, so I encourage you to read it.

Among the most important answers we received was a concern for improving landscape maintenance. Over 20% of the respondents requested an improvement to the maintenance of our community. This theme has been repeated in several of our monthly board meetings, as well as from personal communications we have received as a board.

After studying this issue, the DRCA board voted to increase funding in this area. To fund this increase in services, we also increased our semi-annual assessment to \$222.00. Starting in January 2020, you will see your assessment increase by \$6.00 per month. This is the only increase we have had since 2003, about 16 years ago. The

increase was caused by inflation, increases to the minimum wage, as well as the aging of our community as a whole.

In 2016, I published a comparison of our Assessments to inflation. I've updated the chart below to reflect the changes we've seen from 2003-2019.

As you can see, if our assessments had increased with inflation, they would currently be \$512 per year. At \$444.00, we are \$68.00 dollars below that number, a difference of 15.3%.

The additional funding for landscaping will be used to reduce our landscape rotation from 12 weeks per cycle, down to only 8 weeks. This will substantially improve the look of our community and raise the maintenance level to a level our community has requested.

It is a pleasure to serve our Desert Ridge Board. We appreciate your support and look forward to seeing you in the neighborhood.





- Please make an appointment so that we can be prepared for your visit.
- Bring a valid, government-issued photo ID with you.
- Some documents may require a witness in addition to the notarization. In most cases, there will be additional staff on site that would be able to sign as a witness. However, that may not always be the case, so please call and check first if you'll need an additional witness. ✓

Holiday Lighting and P

With the Holiday Lighting Contest we usually receive several questions in regards to when the lights can be displayed. In the spirit of the holidays and to ensure your holiday lighting/decorations do not become a nuisance to your neighbors and the community, please note holiday lighting/ decorations that directly correspond to specific and generally recognized events may be displayed for a period of seven (7) days preceding the specific calendar holiday and must be removed within three (3) days following the holiday.

The only exception to the above pertains to holiday lighting/decorations for holidays in the month of December, which allows holiday lighting/decorations to be displayed immediately preceding the Thanksgiving



holiday and must be removed no later than January 7th.

Holiday lighting/decorations can be displayed only on the dwelling of the owner's lot/unit. Please note that no holiday lighting/ decorations shall be installed by a lot/unit owner within or on the common area and/ or the common elements. In addition, electricity for holiday lighting/decorations must be provided from the dwelling unit/lot and may not be derived from the common area power source and/or facility.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Halloween is an exciting time of year for kids. Here are some tips from the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) to help ensure they have a safe holiday.

All Dressed Up

- Plan costumes that are bright and reflective. Make sure that shoes fit well and that costumes are short enough to prevent tripping, entanglement or contact with flame.
- Consider adding reflective tape or striping to costumes and Trick-or-Treat bags for greater visibility.
- Because masks can limit or block eyesight, consider non-toxic makeup and decorative hats as safer alternatives. Hats should fit properly to prevent them from sliding over eyes. Makeup should be tested ahead of time on a small patch of skin to ensure there are no unpleasant surprises on the big day.
- When shopping for costumes, wigs and accessories look for and purchase those with a label clearly indicating they are flame resistant.
- If a sword, cane, or stick is a part of your child's costume, make sure it is not sharp or long. A child may be easily hurt by these accessories if he stumbles or trips.
- Do not use decorative contact lenses without an eye examination and a prescription from an eye care professional. While the packaging on decorative lenses will often make claims such as "one size fits all," or "no need to see an eye specialist," obtaining decorative contact lenses without a prescription is both dangerous and illegal. This can cause pain, inflammation, and serious eye disorders and infections, which may lead to permanent vision loss.
- Review with children how to call 9-1-1 (or their local emergency number) if they ever have an emergency or become lost.

Carving a Niche

- Small children should never carve pumpkins. Children can draw a face with markers. Then parents can do the cutting.
- Consider using a flashlight or glow stick instead of a candle to light your pumpkin. If you do use a candle, a votive candle is safest.
- Candlelit pumpkins should be placed on a sturdy table, away from curtains and other flammable objects, and not on a porch or any path where visitors may pass close by. They should never be left unattended.

Home Safe Home

- To keep homes safe for visiting trick-ortreaters, parents should remove from the porch and front yard anything a child could trip over such as garden hoses, toys, bikes and lawn decorations.
- Parents should check outdoor lights and replace burned-out bulbs.
- Wet leaves should be swept from sidewalks and steps.
- Restrain pets so they do not inadvertently jump on or bite a trick-or-treater.

On the Trick-or-Treat Trail

- A parent or responsible adult should always accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds.
- Obtain flashlights with fresh batteries for all children and their escorts.
- If your older children are going alone, plan and review the route that is acceptable to you. Agree on a specific time when they should return home.

- Only go to homes with a porch light on and never enter a home or car for a treat.
- Because pedestrian injuries are the most common injuries to children on Halloween, remind trick-or-treaters:
 - Stay in a group and communicate where they will be going.
 - Remember reflective tape for costumes and trick-or-treat bags.
 - Carry a cell phone for quick communication.
 - Remain on well-lit streets and always use the sidewalk.
 - If no sidewalk is available, walk at the far edge of the roadway facing traffic.
 - Never cut across yards or use alleys.
 - Only cross the street as a group in established crosswalks (as recognized by local custom). Never cross between parked cars or out of driveways.
 - Don't assume the right of way. Motorists may have trouble seeing trick-ortreaters. Just because one car stops, doesn't mean others will!
- Law enforcement authorities should be notified immediately of any suspicious or unlawful activity.

Healthy Halloween

- A good meal prior to parties and trick-ortreating will discourage youngsters from filling up on Halloween treats.
- Consider purchasing non-food treats for those who visit your home, such as coloring books or pens and pencils.
- Wait until children are home to sort and check treats. Though tampering is rare, a responsible adult should closely examine all treats and throw away any spoiled, unwrapped or suspicious items.
- Try to ration treats for the days and weeks following Halloween.

Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays to everyone. Another year is coming to a close in rapid fashion and soon we will be rushing headlong into another decade. During the busy holiday season, it is a time for reflection, celebration and renewal and as we do these things, let us remember the less fortunate or those having difficulties, temporary or permanent. There are many people in crisis all the time but the holidays ramp that up in many ways so reach out for help, it is out there.

of time, money or gifts to even the small things like being courteous or polite during this hectic season. With all the issues facing the world and this country, let's take some time to remember what the season is all about.

The officers who work in the Black Mountain Precinct do appreciate and are very thankful for the continued gestures and words of support that we get from everyone. It means a lot to the officers to know that they are supported in their jobs in these hectic times.

As always, I am going to suggest some Holiday Crime Prevention Tips during the season and the tips are usually the same, but it helps to have reminders. This time of year brings along many events to attend, family to visit, traveling, shopping and much more. These reminders will help reduce the opportunities for you and your family to be a victim.

- 1. When walking to and from stores, keep your head up and be aware of your surroundings. Walk with a purpose, do not divert your attention by texting or talking on the phone, digging for car keys or being burdened with too many bags.
- **2.** Park in a well-lit area, do not park in dark or faraway places. I know it is difficult to find good parking, but do the best you can. If you go in during daylight hours and think you might be inside until it is dark, park as if it were dark.
- **3.** Roll the windows on your car all the way up and LOCK your car. Do not leave valuables, packages, or even gym bags in plain view inside the car. Put them all in the trunk. Gym bags or other bags in view may only have a few items of

- clothes in them but the thieves do not know that and will try anyway.
- **4.** When parking your cars at home, get them in the garage if you can. If you must park in the driveway or street, remove all valuables and garage door openers, and lock the car. Many thieves will break into a car just to take the garage opener and then use it to take items from the garage or enter the house at a later time.
- **5.** Do not keep large amounts of cash with you or display cash when shopping. Take with you only what you need for the day. Be on guard while at ATMs.
- **6.** Keep a constant eye on your children and ALWAYS know where they are. Children are easily distracted by the decorations and excitement of the holidays and may wander off in only a couple seconds.
- **7.** Do NOT drink and drive. Please use a designated driver, call a taxi, Lyft or Uber. This time of year, many people have holiday functions from work or family and drink when they usually



- don't, then make a bad decision to drive which could end up having tragic consequences. Please enjoy the season but drive responsibly and patiently.
- **8.** Make sure the doors and windows to your home are locked, the front lights are on all night, and keep a watchful eye for suspicious activity. If you are expecting deliveries and you will not be home, ask a trusted neighbor to pick them up when they arrive. Please call Crime Stop at 602-262-6151 if you see suspicious activity.
- **9.** Please drive carefully. Schools will be out on winter break and many kids will be out in the neighborhoods trying out new bikes and toys, and you need to be aware of their presence.
- **10.** If you are going to be out of town for a winter vacation, tell a trusted neighbor to watch over your house. Do not post on social media that you will be gone and call the Black Mountain Precinct at 602-495-5002 to ask for a Vacation Watch. Officers can check on your house while you are gone, if the radio calls allow them the time.
- 11. Lastly, be patient. The crowds are larger, people are rushed and stressed. Some people do not like the holidays and can act out so please exercise patience and we all can enjoy the holidays in our own way.

Thank you again for another year of working together and the partnership your community has with the Phoenix Police Department. I am truly blessed by the partnerships I have in my assigned area and I thank you for your continued support. 

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STAYING VIGILANT DURING THE HOLIDAYS

For most people, the holidays are "the most wonderful time of the year." Unfortunately, for criminals, the holidays are the most opportunistic time of the year. Knowing what to watch out for and staying vigilant will give you and your family the best chance to enjoy a holiday season free of crime.

Protecting Yourself Online

When shopping online, make sure you check the HTTP (Hypertext Transfer Protocol) to make sure there is an "s" on the end (https). The "s" stands for secure, and when there isn't one on the end of the http, the data is not encrypted and vulnerable to third parties. To ensure that your information is safe, never enter personal (especially payment) information on a site that doesn't have the https prefix.

Even if you're not shopping online, it's still possible to fall for one or more of the many scams out there. Here are some of the most common online scams to watch out for:

■ FAKE ALERTS – Scammers use email

alerts that look as if they are coming from a major retailer, utility company, or even your bank. Though the email appears to be legitimate, the links may lead to convincing-looking fake websites enticing you to reset your password, enter personal or payment information. Many (but not all) of these emails contain misspellings throughout the text.

- FAKE "FREE" GIFT CARDS —
 Phishing emails and pop-up ads offering
 gift cards from name-brand retailers like
 Amazon, Wal-Mart and others may show
 up on your screen or in your emails. Do
 not open the email or click the links, but
 rather delete it instead. Scammers can use
 the information provided to "receive" the
 card to steal your identity later.
- FAKE E-CARDS Over 500 million holiday ecards were sent last year. These can be fun to receive but beware of any e-card that requires you to enter ANY personal information, it's probably a fake. Just because the card says it's from someone you know, that doesn't make it safe. Hackers can get into a contact list and send the contacts e-cards that appear to be from the person who was hacked. If the receiver clicks on a link, or enters personal information, the hacker can put malware, or spyware, on their computer.

- FAKE DELIVERY ATTEMPT **NOTIFICATIONS** – Delivery notifications can often be expected throughout the holiday season as many consumers go online to purchase gifts, but some of these announcements may be phishing scams. False attempted delivery notification emails using names and logos from FedEx, UPS, DHL, and others try to trick you into clicking a link in the email thus allowing scammers access to your computer and/or personal information. Legitimate delivery services will provide tracking numbers in the body of their emails, which DO NOT require you to click on a link. To track a package, you should go directly to the carrier's website and enter the tracking numbers.
- FAKE CHARITIES Charities see their best donations during the holidays and at year's end. Scammers know that this is the best time for giving and will pose as legitimate charities or needy individuals soliciting donations.

Protecting Yourself When Shopping in Person

We have so many great retailers and restaurants in Desert Ridge where you can purchase merchandise and gift cards. When shopping in person, here are a few safety tips to keep in mind:

- Take only the credit cards you need when shopping. Leave the others in a safe place at home.
- Make sure your credit card is not easily visible to others around you. This is especially true for older cards with numbers on the front. Some crooks can memorize your card number with a simple glance.
- When talking on your cell phone, be mindful of your surroundings. Distracted people are targets.
- Always keep your purse or wallet close to you.
- Do not carry excessive or unnecessary cash on you.
- Shop in the daylight if possible. When shopping after dark, always park in a well-lit area.



- Shop with a friend when possible, because there's safety in numbers.
- When you park your vehicle, do not leave your purse, wallet, cell phone, or any other valuables in plain view.
- When you return to your vehicle, scan the interior to be sure no one is hiding inside.
- When placing purchases from the stores in your vehicle, place them out of sight. The best place is in the trunk.
- After putting packages in your vehicle, drive to a different row before going to another store. Do this even if you are simply going back to the same store.
- Try not to park next to a larger vehicle that blocks your vision while you are entering or exiting your vehicle.
- Have your keys out and ready when approaching your vehicle.

Protecting Yourself at Home

We all tend to feel safer and let our guard down a little more while at home. During the holidays, however, there are a few extra things to consider in order to better protect your family and possessions:

- Make sure you have properly functioning smoke and carbon monoxide detectors with fresh batteries.
- To help prevent vandalism, turn off inflatable decorations at a specific time. If convenient, bring them up to the front porch or close to the house.
- Keep the front of the house well-lit and make sure that trees and bushes are trimmed so that doors and windows can easily be seen.
- Beware of door-to-door charity scams.

- Keep an eye out for parcel deliveries; packages on porches are big targets.
- Do not leave the boxes from your gifts

curbside or in plain site before or after the holidays. A box from a flat screen television, computer system, or other valuable purchase is advertising to a criminal that you have what they're looking for.

History

Five years ago, The Santa Paws Project was conceived by Desert Ridge residents Marcie and Rob Reichstein. The Reichstein's, long time pet lovers who help raise funds for accredited 501(c)(3) rescues, realized there was no organized program to collect items for shelter pets during the holiday season.


Marcie explained that shelter pets do feel the excitement in the shelters around the holiday season. They feed off the vibe by visitors and volunteers. But for the dogs and cats housed in a shelter, it ends with just another night on a cold hard floor. But what if, on one night, they received a toy to cherish and call their own? It's a simple inexpensive gesture for pets that find themselves hoping for a family of their own.

Just after Thanksgiving of 2014, the Reichstein's contacted Melissa Gable, then with Maricopa County Animal Care and Control, to see if MCCACC would be interested in accepting toy donations. Melissa's response was a decisive, "that would be incredible!" And so, The Santa Paws Project was launched.

Toy Donations

In that first year, SPP collected about 400 toys. Everything was turned over to Melissa at MCCACC. The toys are handed out to the pets in residence as part of the MCCACC holiday party celebration. Over the next three years, The Desert Ridge Community Association, Aviano, Fireside, Toscana, The Pet Club, Pet\$ense, and Phoenix Dog magazine came to their rescue (pun intended), offering collection locations, promotions, and emotional support. Last year collections exceeded 3,500 new dog and cat toys, all turned over to Maricopa County Animal Care and Control.

"What we have come to learn from the MCCACC staff is that the toys are extremely important to the shelter pets on



several levels," said Marcie. They provide comfort for anxious pets on intake, help in the emotional evaluation process, provide security for lonely pets, as well as provide a mental stimulus for pets that would otherwise suffer the ill effects of little to no mental stimulation. Realizing just how much an inexpensive toy means to these pets awaiting adoptions gives us the impetus to collect more each year. We thank everyone in Desert Ridge who donates a new pet toy at this time. We make sure MCCACC knows how much Desert Ridge residents care.

Collection Schedule

This year, the collection season will be November 18th through December 16th. Collection boxes will be in place at Aviano, Toscana, and Fireside community centers and the Desert Ridge Community Association office. 



understanding DRCA 2020 BUDGET ASSESSMENT INCREASE

On the following page, you will find a detailed summary illustrating the Desert Ridge Community Association (DRCA) 2020 Assessment Increase Allocation.

As noted in the Board President's article on page 4 of this issue, the DRCA (Master Association) took a community survey this summer and increasing the frequency and overall maintenance of the common area landscape was one of the major factors in the assessment increase. Additionally, the increase in the minimum wage rate and mandatory sick leave laws passed by Arizona have resulted in increased labor costs that are passed on to the association.

The DRCA also approved an \$810,750 erosion remediation project to address the erosion in both the Coconino and Yavapai washes that the DRCA is responsible for maintaining. This project will get underway in October and go through the end of the year. Due to extensive vandalism of the wash walkways and tunnels plastic light covers, the association will incur over \$50,000 to design and install 300 vandal

proof light covers in the Coconino and Yavapai washes before year end. The costs for the erosion remediation and vandal proof light covers in both of these washes will require the DRCA to increase reserve funding in 2020 and forward.

The DRCA also sustained a loss of \$500,000 in annual assessment income due to the Desert Ridge real estate market downturn in 2008/2009 when the builders reverted the land they had purchased back to the state, which the association has yet to recoup but was able to absorb for many years due to the sound financial management of the board members. The community is now over 25 years into its development progression and has many aging components that will need to be replaced. Reserve funding has been contemplated accordingly for these aging components in the 2020 budget planning.

As you are well aware, the DRCA has not increased assessments in 16 years. This noteworthy achievement is entirely attributed to the DRCA Board of Directors prudent fiscal management as responsible and diligent community fiduciaries. The 2020 assessment increase will be \$6 monthly or \$72 annually, due semi-annually at \$222 on January 1st and July 1st.

During discussion at the open monthly board meeting, Board President, Doug Dickson, posed the following question to the members in attendance: "What other bill do you have that has not increased in 16 years?"

A \$72 increase over a period of 16 years amounts to just \$4.50 per year. It is the goal of the association board and management team to keep the community maintained to the highest standards; keeping the community beautiful and property values high. The 2020 assessment increase will enable the DRCA to continue to deliver on this goal relative to common area maintenance and a multitude of other services the association provides to the community residents.

It's worth noting that the DRCA (Master Association) common area maintenance does not include or extend to maintenance in residential gated or sub-associations common area deeded neighborhoods.

Thank you for your continued support and involvement in helping us to make Desert Ridge one of the premier designation communities in all of Phoenix. We recognize that none of this would be possible without our valued members' participation!



SEASONAL LANDSCAPE-TIPS

We Beautify the World

for the holidays



Bermuda should be watered with one inch of water each week. Bermuda will become dormant as temperatures drop to below 50 degrees.

Over seeding should have been done by now.

Winter ryegrass should be mowed to 1-1/2 to 2 inches. Keep watering until established, and then water only about once a week.

If your winter lawn turns yellowish, fertilize. An application of Ironite will bring back the dark green color.

Water every 5-7 days, or more often if you notice a drying-out of the soil. Light or sandy soils dry out faster.





Now is the time to plant seeds for beets, bok choy, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, chard, collards, endive, kale, lettuce, mustard, onions, parsley, peas, radishes, rutabaga, spinach, and turnips.


Plant transplants: asparagus, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, chard, and lettuce.

When you plant any of the many varieties of leaf lettuce you can harvest and the

plant will keep growing new leaves. You don't have to pick the whole head of lettuce.

Plant strawberries now to get berries next spring.

If you planted vegetables in October, thin out seedlings about three to four weeks after germination. **Snip them, don't pull them**.



CUT BACK WATERING OF ALL TREES and shrubs, but continue to water deep. Don't over water or fungus will grow.

Clean dead branches out trees and shrubs. Trim unwanted sprouts from the interior of your citrus trees. This makes it easier to harvest fruit.

Keep the skirt of your citrus trees pruned and trimmed to about two or three feet from the ground.

Wrap the trunks of young citrus and other cold-tender trees with cloth, cardboard or several layers of newspaper (no plastic) to protect them from frost. Leave them wrapped until the threat of frost has passed.

Sweet oranges, navels, lemons, tangerines and tangelos may now be picked now but pick only as needed. As the season wears on, the fruits will continue to sweeten. **Citrus fruit stores best on the tree**.

Frost-tolerant trees and shrubs may be planted this month. Dig holes three to five times the size of the root ball but not any deeper. Set the plant so the top of the root ball is ground level and then backfill.



Plant in full sun: petunias, calendulas, dianthus and snapdragons. Plant in part sun or shade: dianthus, geraniums, impatients, and primrose

Plant bulbs in well-drained soil that is also high in compost or organic matter. Plant Amaryllis, Anemone, Calla and Easter Lily, Dutch Crocus, Daffodil, Freesia, Gladiolus, Iris, and Ranunculus. Bulbs should be given a good soaking immediately after

planting, and every seven to ten days after growth begins.


You can still plant bulbs. Plant them in well-drained soil that is also high in compost or organic matter. Your bulbs should be planted with about two inches of sand beneath them.

Cut back dead or dying foliage and add a bit of nitrogen fertilizer.

PREPARE FOR FROSTS NOW.

If you don't care for your sensitive trees, bushes, flowers and vegetables before the first frost, it's probably too late, since the first frost will permanently damage them.

Be prepared to cover those frost-tender plants.



The 2019 Desert Ridge Community Survey

Your voice matters to the Desert Ridge Community Association, so this past summer we sent out a survey to get your feedback on how satisfied you are living in Desert Ridge and, most importantly, what we could be doing to make life here even better for our residents. And you responded! We were thrilled with the number of you who took the time to answer the questions we posed. Your answers were very insightful, and we promised to share the results with the community. Below is what you had to say.

How would you rate your overall experience living in Desert Ridge?

The great news is that you gave Desert Ridge an overall approval rating of 4.1 out of 5! With a community this large, that's a very good number. But yes, there's still some room for improvement. So, we asked for specifics and here's what you shared with us.

What do you like most about living in Desert Ridge?

By an overwhelming majority, 81.6% of you felt that the location was the best thing about living in Desert Ridge. Not only are we centrally located and close to so much in the Valley, but there's an abundance that Desert Ridge offers without having to go outside the community. You cited the Marketplace and convenient retail areas, schools, parks, trails, golf, entertainment, and other social amenities that contribute to making this a desirable community. The majority of respondents felt that the community was consistently well cared for and a safe place to live, which makes for stability in housing values.

What's the one thing you would like to see changed or improved?

There were a few issues that definitely stood out. Safety is still a major concern and 27% of you felt that crime monitoring and enforcement could be improved. Next on your list of concerns was compliance, with 25.4% who would like to see a greater and more consistent enforcement of the community rules and guidelines. Overnight, on-street parking was, by far, the most-often mentioned violation you felt should be addressed. Another big issue was common area landscape maintenance and 21.6% would like to see an improvement in the frequency and quality of the maintenance of the common areas. Other areas that you felt could be improved upon were more events, more communication, and architectural approvals.

Since one of the association's primary objectives involves maintenance of the common areas throughout the community that are maintained by the master association, we asked specifically about this topic with a separate question.

How would you rate the maintenance of the common greas on a scale of 1 to 5?

We were pleased to receive an approval rating of 3.78 out of 5 on your satisfaction with the maintenance. But clearly, there is room for improvement, and you shared your thoughts on how we could do better in this area.

Improved landscaping and tree trimming were common themes with more frequency of the landscape maintenance cycle suggested as one of the possible solutions. Along with the frequency of maintenance, many also suggested better clean-up after landscaping and addressing overgrown areas.

In addition to maintenance, there were a few other issues mentioned that are definitely being looked at by management. Many of you would like to see the guidelines enforced consistently, especially in some of the aging residential neighborhoods of Desert Ridge. Most felt that the management team was doing a great job, but some mentioned there could still be more communication and responsiveness to residents.

With communication being an important area of interest to the management team, we wanted to know how we were doing in that area.

What you would like to see added or changed in the Desert Ridge Lifestyles magazine and the website?

We were delighted that 53.3% of you enjoyed the magazine and wouldn't change anything, and 35.5% thought the website was good as is. There were many great suggestions, though, on what you'd like to see. Desert Ridge development news, resident-owned



businesses, events, articles highlighting the community, and coupons were just a few of the multitude of ideas you mentioned. Look for many of them to be implemented in future issues of the magazine and on the community

website (desertridgelifestyles.com).

Finally, we wanted to obtain your feedback regarding the master association's current assessments, which are \$31 per month (paid semi-annually at \$186).

Do you think the \$31 monthly assessment (paid semi-annually at \$186) is too much, too little, or about right for the overall services provided by your master association?

Since these assessments are used to cover such services as landscape maintenance, administration, community patrols, lifestyle events, along with many other things, it was gratifying to learn that 75% of you felt that amount was about right for the current services being provided by the association.

Your participation in the survey was outstanding and for that we say "Thank You" to everyone in the community who took a few minutes to share your thoughts and ideas! Your voice is what helps make Desert Ridge the best place to live, work, visit, and play!

Donations made through Arizona Tax Credits either lower the amount owed or increase the taxpayer's refund.

Boys & Girls Club programs focus on academics, leadership, creativity, and healthy habits—helping kids avoid risky behaviors, overcome obstacles and achieve their goals.

The holidays can be a joyous time for many, but there are things that you should be aware of as a pet parent to make sure all the members of your family are happy and safe.

There are certain types of food that you enjoy around the holiday season but that doesn't mean that all the members in your family should be partaking in them. One of the first ones to be mindful of are those 'delicious' holiday chocolates. Chocolate can be toxic to both dogs and

cats. A lot of times we want to leave chocolate on display or within reach for our guest, but our four-legged friends cannot make the decision to not partake in the 'treat.' Chocolate can either make your pet very sick and in some cases may even cause death. The level of toxicity that your pet

experiences is determined by the size of your pet, the amount they ate and how soon you discovered it. If you believe your pet has ingested any taking them to the vet is your safest bet.

Savory snacks such as a holiday turkey, gravy and meat fat may cause pancreatitus in your animals. That's why it is best to keep table food away from your animals. Also, instructing your guests to ignore those "begging" eyes would be best as well.

If you have an animal that is prone to this, tying your tree to the ceiling or a doorframe may prevent it from toppling over. Ornaments may also be quite hazardous to your pets. 
People also tend to entertain more around the holidays. Those guests can be an added stress to your pet. Make sure there is a
















ABOUT

We are a scratch made Indian Kitchen serving food in a fun, casual, and laid back manner. Our mission is to make Indian food approachable and fun for all with our traditional and time tested recipes. We craft all of our curries in-house every day with whole spices and whole vegetables. All of our Kabobs are marinated for at least 24 hours and then grilled to perfection. Our Naan is hand rolled and baked as you order it. We want everyone to be as excited about food as we are!

RESTAURANT REVIEW

Tikka Shack, located in the Desert Ridge Marketplace, is open daily from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. and is a Masala Wok concept with both in-store dining and online ordering options. The term "masala" simply means a varying blend of spices used in Indian cooking. While virtually all of their menu items could be ordered with varying degrees of "hotness," as in mild, medium and hot, we opted to take the milder route so as to concentrate on the innate flavors of entrees. Their menu featured a combination of traditional Indian dishes perfect for the curry connoisseur; and lighter, build-your-own options that provided clarity in selection for the beginner. They offer numerous street-food starters, slow-crafted Indian staples, and a full offering of sides, drinks, and desserts.

Our team of six found the Tikka Shack to offer exceptional service in terms of friendliness, timeliness of placing an order and food delivery to our table as well in menu knowledgeability. Their staff exercised patience in "explaining menu choices" which were easier to figure out by viewing the "behind the order counter" colorful, picture-laden wall menu. The place was spotlessly clean, prices were quite reasonable considering portion size, and it was easy to get around inside. They had outside seating available as well and appeared to do a healthy take-out business the night we were there.









From their list of five appetizers (Starters), we went with the Masala Fries (loaded fries doused with tikka masala, onions, scallions, tomatoes, and cilantro covered in sweet and spicy secret spices) plus an order of Samosas (crispy pastries stuffed with potatoes, peas, and secret spices, served with a tamarind + chutney). The Masala Fries were a terrific (as in "let's order more") hit given their taste and appearance but we found the Samosas not as tasty as hoped. We tried the serveyourself beverage bar and found the Mandarin Cardamom Drink (cinnamon flavor) to be a great compliment to many of the sampled entrees.

The Kabob Bowl with Chicken looked great, was tasty, and ample for a single serving. The Butter Masala with Chicken was our unanimous favorite entrée as it lived up to its billing as "Indian Comfort Food." Our close second favorite entrée was Chicken Tikka Masala followed by the Spinach Masala. We were disappointed by the Korma Masala with Lamb and our orders of Naan (Traditional Indian flatbread) seemed overly bland and soggy. We'd probably been better off with their "signature" Shack Naan featuring added garlic, cilantro, and cheese.

We did try both of the desserts and all preferred the taste of the Ulab Jamun (milk-based pastry balls with honey-flavored syrup) to the Ras Malai (fresh cheese patties served cold in sweetened milk).

When we finished, all agreed they would visit again!


