Community members feedback is crucial to the strategic community plan. We may ask for your input via surveys and town hall zoom or in-person meetings to determine needs and interests. Through these opportunities, you can indicate priorities and suggest projects.

We'll review your comments then develop and prioritize short-term projects, long-range projects, and how and when to fund them.

What a waste of time and money.

Speaking of time and money, I started to track how many hours I spent running to the big box stores and the gas expense. So, I'm tacking on another 10 hours a month in needless trips.

I can go on and on, but I think you get the point. In fact, I'm thinking you already started tallying up your hours and expenses. Time and money that I know could be better spent on hobbies, pets, loved ones, or binge watching shows.

Overall, 2020 was not a year I want to revisit as a whole. However, wise people say if you can find some good out of the bad, then you are better off. Or something like that. So, here's my 2021 resolutions based on 2020 changes: Just find something to appreciate each day. Some days that may be more difficult than others, but you know what? That's ok. Because each day is a new day and at my age - allocating some time for naps sounds very appealing.





Artists discuss topics such as metal-working, jewelry making, abstract art, sculpture, and much more.

The Celebration of Fine Art is a juried, invitational show that has come to be recognized for its diverse array of exceptional art, but more importantly for its inviting and interactive atmosphere that encourages connection between art lovers and artists. It's because of this atmosphere and the ability to interact with artists and learn about their process that the Celebration of Fine Art has become a true destination for art lovers from all

backgrounds. In fact, over the course of its 31-year legacy, the show has welcomed more than 1.5 million visitors from around the world, many of whom have made the show an annual tradition.

"Over the course of our 30-year history, the Celebration of Fine Art has remained a place for artists and art lovers to connect in a meaningful way," said Susan Morrow Potje, co-owner and show director. "Though this year we'll have measures in place for distancing to protect the health and safety

of our artists and guests, the Celebration of Fine Art will continue to be a place where people from all walks of life can engage with artists and see their work come to life in front of their eyes. We're looking forward to what 2021 has in store and can't wait to showcase the talents of the amazing artists we have at the show this year."

Throughout the 10 weeks, guests can also catch artist demonstrations of their process, attend an Art Discovery Series, which is held each Friday from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m., walk the outdoor sculpture garden, which features nearly 100 pieces of life-sized and monumental sculpture, and enjoy lunch or wine in the cafe. In the outdoor sculpture garden also guests can also see woodturning, welding, kiln firings, and bronze pouring demonstrations weekly.

The show is open to guests of all ages. Tickets are \$10 for adults, \$8 for seniors and military, and children under 12 are admitted for free. Tickets are all-event passes, good for the entire 10-week show during which attendees will have the opportunity to see art transform and meet the artists. 
Scottsdale Arizona Sun Circuit Offers Much For Any Horse Enthusiast

I know everyone is familiar with the old saying "it takes a village" when referring to raising children. The same quote can be applied to maintaining a safe and healthy community. The great City of Phoenix has many entities working together, as "helping hands", to help ensure your community remains an amazing place to live. The police department utilizes some of these entities regularly to help alleviate some of the non-crime issues we may be having in your community. The most commonly used resources include The Neighborhood Services Department (NSD), The Streets Department, The Parks department and the PHX C.A.R.E.S program. All these departments and programs can also be utilized by you to maintain your community long term.

HELPING HANDS

NEIGHBORHOOD SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Neighborhood Services Department (NSD) is an amazing asset for the City of Phoenix. I jokingly refer to them as the city's HOA. NSD's main function is to address any blight type problems you may be experiencing in your area. This includes residential and commercial properties. There are eight common blight violations that NSD can help alleviate. They include: overgrown vegetation, junk litter and debris, outside storage, inoperable vehicles, vacant structures, fences in disrepair, on property parking issues, and finally graffiti. NSD has a team of individuals who inspect every blight related complaint they receive. When a complaint is called into NSD, these inspectors will work with the owner of the property to fix the problem. If the owner does not show an effort to fix the violation the inspectors can eventually issue a citation. Within the Black Mountain Precinct, we utilize their services for a large majority of the long-term community complaints we receive. We also have a monthly meeting to discuss properties we have in common and long-term solutions. The greatest thing about The Neighborhood Services Dept. is the complaints do not have to be police initiated. Anyone can contact NSD to make a complaint by calling 602-534-4444.

STREETS DEPARTMENT

Another amazing tool for any community in the city of Phoenix is the Streets
Department. The Streets Department handles a multitude of different issues pertaining to, you guessed it, the city streets. The Streets Department has inspectors who regularly vet complaints and do inspections of our city streets, ensuring safe travels for members of our communities. They handle problems which include speed limits, traffic control devices, abandonment of alleys, flooding, street sweeping, crosswalk maintenance and improvement, road grading

and improvement, and everyone's favorite... the speed hump program. Whether it be impatient drivers using your street as a cut through or an inconsiderate neighbor. every community has its challenges when it comes to traffic. The speed hump program was designed with the purpose of slowing traffic in residential areas. According to the program, listed on the City of Phoenix website, speed humps can reduce vehicle speed on a residential street by 7mph. As the City of Phoenix rapidly grows, we will continue to have our challenges with traffic related issues. It is vitally important to have the Streets Department to help maintain our busy streets. Being in contact with this department regarding street related issues is imperative to maintain a safe community. Questions regarding the speed hump program and other programs maintained by the Streets Department can be answered by calling 602-262-4659.

PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

The Parks and Recreation Department may be one of the most underrated divisions within the City of Phoenix. They maintain a multitude of recreational areas such as city parks, community centers, mountain preserves, several golf courses, public pools, the Phoenix Center of the Arts, and many other recreational areas and programs. No matter where you live in this large city, I would venture to say you are within walking distance of an amazing park of some sort. In the Black Mountain Precinct alone we have multiple mountain preserves, a city run golf course and too many parks to count. All are being run and maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department. Every district has Park Rangers who work tirelessly to keep the parks and preserves clean and safe for members of our community to use every day. They open gates to hiking trails, open parking lots to parks, and deal with trespassers and other issues that may arise in these areas. They also enforce the Park



Code of Conduct set forth by the city. Parks and Recreation also has numerous employees who work at community centers across the city. These community centers give programs like block-watch and other community groups a safe place to have meetings and events. The Park Rangers can be reached at 602-495-5458 and community centers can be reached at 602-262-6862.

PHX C.A.R.E.S.

The PHX C.A.R.E.S. program is relatively new to the City of Phoenix. The acronym PHX C.A.R.E.S. stand for Community Action Response Engagement Services. The leadership in this great city identified the necessity for a program to identify needs and solutions of homeless or transient individuals. This program is a coordinated response to work with communities

and specific individuals experiencing homelessness to educate and come up with long term solutions. The program utilizes many of the Cities departments in the goal of making life better for everyone involved. The program leads with Human Services assessing individual's specific needs to get them off the streets with counseling, substance abuse and many other programs. The Phoenix Police Department assists by providing security for councilors when needed and addressing any criminal activities involved such as trespassing. The Neighborhood Services Department takes all the calls to the CARES program and routs them to the appropriate entities to take action. The Parks and Recreation Department conducts clean ups and engagement or enforcement in all our city parks. Public works will also respond to all

complaints of encampments to clean the area of left over debris when individuals agree to take services offered to them. Last but not least the Streets Department offers services and keeps roadways, sidewalks and city easements clean of debris. PHX CARES is a great new program helping to make our communities stronger. This is just a small sample of the many different departments and programs throughout the city helping our communities flourish. The "helping hands" created by the City of Phoenix, makes this one of the best cities to live in this great country. RESERVING FOR THE FUTURE

As Board Treasurer of the Desert Ridge Community Association, I am sometimes asked about the reserves on the association's balance sheet and what they are based on. Balance sheet reserves are funds set aside to pay for future maintenance, repairs, and replacement of common area components in the community.

The DRCA reserves are based on annual reserve studies done by a third-party company that specializes in estimating the usable life of each common area component. These estimates are typically very accurate, but there are some instances where a component may last a little longer than predicted. There are also times where a component may not reach the predicted lifespan due to changes in technology or vandalism.

These reserves pay for a wide range of things such as the repair of irrigation systems, painting walls, wash repair/fortification, replenishment of the decomposed granite throughout the community, and much more. This month we began a project to refresh a large portion of decomposed granite throughout the community. The \$615,000 cost of this project is something for which we have been reserving over eight years.

The DRCA Board of Directors is continuously keeping an eye on the reserves to ensure that the association does not fall behind on its maintenance obligations. We understand that when Community and/ or Homeowner Associations don't properly reserve funds, they really start to show their age. Once a community starts to fall behind on maintenance, property values can drop

rapidly. Therefore, we will continue to rely on our reserve analysts and experience to keep our reserves at the correct levels.

HOUSEHOLD RESERVES

Reserves aren't something that are restricted to the DRCA and its sub associations, they are also a great practice for an individual household budget. I have heard different financial experts talk about putting a percentage of your income aside for retirement, and another percentage aside for emergency use. However, homeowners should also put money aside to replace components which have very established usable life expectancies. Here are just a few examples:

- Painting your home (Exterior)–7 to 10 years
- Painting your home (Interior)–10 years
- Water heater–8 to 10 years
- Air conditioner–7 to 15 years
- Tile roof underlayment–Every 20 years

The numbers are general estimates. The life expectancy of any component varies with usage, weather, quality of materials, proper installation and maintenance.

GET PERMISSION FIRST

Prior to beginning any exterior work on your home and/or yard an Architectural Approval Request Form must be completed and submitted for approval by the Design Review Committee. This form can be found on the community website, https://desertridgelifestyles.com under the tab titled "Forms & Docs"

By planning in advance and reserving for the bigger components you can avoid both the surprise and stress that people who don't prepare experience.

Virtual Block Watch is one of the Phoenix Police Department's contemporary crime prevention and investigation tools that showcase our partnership with the community.



Virtual Block Watch (VBW) utilizes your security cameras to help solve crime. This exciting new program is now live and like all new programs, there are questions.

- Q: How will Virtual Block Watch assist the Phoenix Police Department?
- A: VBW will assist detectives by collaborating with the virtual community who may have captured digital evidence of a crime for prosecution.
- Q: Do you recommended any specific security camera system?
- A: This will be completely up to the owner's discretion. It is recommended that cameras are at a resolution of 1080p for a clear picture, but a 720p system can be registered with VBW. A DVR with a 30-day retention is preferred.

- Q: Does the Police Department have remote access to my security camera system?
- A: No. Virtual Block Watch will not have any type of streaming capabilities or live feed from your CCTV system. The Police Department will have the address of the registered system along with the directions of the camera views.
- Q: If my security camera system captures a criminal or crime, will I be required to testify in court?
- A: No. Once the Police Department copies the portion of video needed for prosecution, the Police Department will testify on the digital evidence collected from your security camera system.

Spring Tips: Preparing for the Heat Spring Color

This is the time of year we spend a lot of time in our yards enjoying the weather. Why not add some spring color to your home by displaying colorful annuals in decorative pots. A simple pot of brightly colored flowers by your front entrance or several around your patio area makes your time outdoors even more enjoyable. Now is also the time to add color to your landscape. With many new varieties of plants on the market, it's easy to end up with a garden full of mismatched plants. So, before you start digging, learn what you can do to get your garden blooming at its best.

HERE ARE A FEW TIPS FOR YOUR SPRING LANDSCAPE PLANTING:

- Pick a color scheme. Choose colors you like that also look good with your house. Red may be your favorite color, but it will clash against a rust-colored brick. Popular schemes include hot or cool color borders (reds, oranges, and yellows or blues, violets, and greens) or an all white garden (sometimes called moon gardens because the flowers seen to glow in the moonlight).
- Find balance. Keep vertical elements (such as tall shrubs or flowers) in check with horizontal ones (ground cover or low, clumping shrubs). Create a sense of continuity in the garden by repeating similar groupings of plants, colors, or flower shapes in different pots.
- Keep it in proportion. When buying young plants, be sure to check their mature height and spread. Graduate the heights of your plants so there isn't a huge gap between the tallest (usually planted at the back) and the shortest.

DEADHEADING

Deadheading is the term used for removing spent blossoms. Cutting or pinching off the dead flowers prolongs the blooming period. A plants job is to produce seed. If you remove the old blooms with the seeds, the plant has to make new flowers to make new seeds.

FERTILIZATION

Flowers are heavy eaters and will require both nitrogen and phosphorus. Nitrogen will promote vegetative growth while phosphorus is for healthy roots and reproduction (which includes flowers).



Removing Frost Damage

Frost damage is easy to recognize on most plants. There is dieback of leaves, stems and shoots; there is also the drying, blackening and death of fruit, flowers and dormant flower buds. It's not pretty; the damage may affect from small portions to the entire plant.

The temptation can be to prune out the damage right away. Pruning too early can stimulate new growth; these tender new shoots are particularly susceptible to frost and can move the frost damage further into the main part of a plant. Leaving the frost damaged leaves and stems on the outer parts of the plant can actually help to insulate the plant by helping to trap warm air around the plant. it isn't attractive but, this mass of leaves continues to protect your plant.

The danger of further damage is not the only reason to hold off on removing frost-damaged plant parts. Frost damage can be deceptive. New growth can sprout from stems that looked dead. Don't prune until new growth begins and you can see for sure what parts of your plant survived. Otherwise, you might prune too severely and ruin the shape or vigor of your plant.

Hard and Natural Pruning

Selective, natural pruning can extend the life of a plant for many years. During natural pruning shrubs are cut down to about 18" in height. This removes most of the foliage and may leave the plant looking bare but this rejuvenates the plant to encourage new growth on the fewer part of the plant. Secondary buds located on the lower part of the plant are activated to create new growth.

As the shrub begins to grow back, more selective pruning is done to thin out the center of the shrub so more energy is put into producing flowers. Plants are designed to produce flowers and this process encourages more flower production. It also gives the shrub a more natural look white keeping the shrub in its allotted space without having to shear it.

In general, most shrubs will grow into their natural shapes without any pruning at all. However, they can become overgrown and crowded making them a nuisance. Natural pruning helps them maintain their natural shape. Plants carefully pruned will retain growth from this year, last year and the year before, which allows for the widest range of flowering wood.

There will be a Board Candidates "Meet and Greet" at the Farmers Market on High Street on Sunday, February 21st at 11:00 AM, a "Meet the Candidate" night at 6:00 PM on Wednesday, February 24th at the DRCA Board of Directors Meeting and another Board Candidates "Meet and Greet" at the Farmers Market on High Street on Sunday, March 14th at 11:00 AM.

How many positions are available this year and how long will my term be?

Out of the seven member seats on the Board of Directors, there are four (4) seats on the Board of Directors that are available for election in 2021. Directors are elected to serve two year terms. In 2021, these four positions will be elected for a two year term since the two year term for these four seats will expire in April 2021. Therefore, all four positions will serve two year term until April 2023.

What is the process for running for a position on the Board?

Contact the Association office at: 480-551-4550 or email to: desertridge.az@fsresidential. com to obtain the candidate application form. Return all candidate application forms to the Association office no later than 5:00 PM on, February 12th.

In addition, candidates are required to attend at least one of the three "Meet the Candidate" events. It is strongly recommended that all board candidates attend the Board Candidates Meet & Greet /Q&A to be held during the DRCA Board of Director Meeting on Wednesday, February

24th at 6:00 PM. Candidates are also encouraged to attend the Farmers Market on High Street Board Candidates Meet & Greet /Q&A on Sunday, February 21st at 11:00 AM or Sunday, March 14th at 11:00 AM. Candidates must also attend the Desert Ridge Community Association Annual Membership Meeting & Election on Thursday, April 22nd. Candidate attendance at this meeting is mandatory (contingent upon prevailing COVID-19 guidelines and restrictions regarding group gathering).

What are the Directors' responsibilities?

The Desert Ridge Community Association is an Arizona-chartered, 501(c)(4) nonprofit social welfare organization. Directors are responsible for operating and maintaining the "common area" property of the community, reviewing and approving all site plans and improvements within the community, and providing coordination and oversight of the community subsidiary associations and subdivisions. Fortunately, we have a management company that handles most of the day-to-day operations.

What is the time commitment needed while serving on the Board?

The Board typically holds one Open Session and one Executive Session per month, which takes approximately 2-4 hours, combined. There are presently seven standing committees that each have varying meeting schedules determined by their respective committee charter. Depending on which committee you would like to be involved

with, an additional 1-2 hours per week may be required. Typically, the time commitment averages about 8 hours a month.

When and where is the Board of Directors Meetings?

The meeting schedule is actually determined by the Board of Directors. Our current meeting schedule is the 4th Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. (except for the months of April, July, November and December), via Zoom Online Teleconference due to ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Do you incur personal liability by serving on the Board?

Generally, as long as a Director act in good faith with the best interests of the community first, doesn't break any laws, or have any personal benefit, the Association indemnifies the Directors. The Association's Articles of Incorporation provide the most comprehensive explanation of liability. Please read and understand them fully for vourself. The Articles of Incorporation and other governing documents can be found on FirstService Connect, the community information website, or via the CD.

How does the election actually work?

There is a one vote per lot for each available position on the board. A qualified Owner will be able to cast one vote for up to four (4) candidates.

Do developers and commercial entities get to vote?

Yes, qualified developers and commercial entities are members and get to vote. The Desert Ridge Board is not a Homeowners Association, it is a Community Association. One of the great things about Desert Ridge is that it is still a relatively young development, and only about 40% of the total parceled land have homes built on them. Since the voting is determined per lot, there is still significant involvement by private and commercial developers and the Master Developer. The Master Developer actually casts votes for all land held by the Arizona State Land Dept.

Tips for people who are running

Get out there and talk to your neighbors —ask them what their concerns are for the community. Let them know you're running. Candidates may speak with developers as well as the commercial interests. And thank you for getting involved!




