

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FROM THE PRESIDENT **Fighting Inflation & Controlling Costs in Desert Ridge**

s an association, we are proud of our track record at maintaining an award winning community, while also controlling costs. While we were forced to raise association fees effective January 1, 2023, it is only the second time in the twelve years since our community has been under homeowner control. We have done everything possible to avoid any increase. Unfortunately, inflation has affected all our of lives and our association is not immune. The good news is the increases have been small and far lower than even the rate of inflation seen in our economy.

We are often asked how we can effectively manage our community, maintain services and keep costs from rising far below the rate of inflation. Here are the top 10 ways we've kept costs down:

1 Set a goal to avoid increases. The first and most important step was to set a goal and policy objective to avoid increases and find creative ways to accomplish the task. Without that commitment, we would not have accomplish that mission.

Bid out every significant contract. We set a L policy to obtain at least 3 competitive bids on every contract, where possible. Multiple bidders allows us to understand the true market price for any project and increases competition to further reduce costs.

 \bigcirc Negotiate for multiple year contracts.

 \supset Once a successful bidder is obtained, we have further reduced our costs by providing multiple-year contracts. This technique has also eliminated increases by locking in our pricing for multiple years.

4 Incentivize vendors with goal bonuses. One of the programs that has been successful is a water bonus program with AAA Landscaping. By setting goals and providing bonuses based on water savings, we have saved hundreds of thousands of dollars. The goal is adjusted each year, based upon the results from the previous year, leading to progressively more efficient uses of water.

5 Limit overhead and be efficient with staffing. Hiring great employees is critical and we've managed to provide great service with only a handful of employees. We've hired the very best and created an environment that retains key employees.

Reduce waste and eliminate duplication. Our sonsite staff is managed by Terrance Smith, one of the most credentialed community managers in Arizona. With many years of experience and a focus on cutting expenses, we've eliminated waste and duplication within our staff. There are few, if any, associations of the size of Desert Ridge that are run more efficiently.

7 Use technology to reduce costs. We are / constantly seek new opportunities to reduce costs. Voting electronically has saved our association nearly \$60,000 in the past three years. Upgrading our water system and its controllers has also saved tens of thousands of dollars. There are many more examples that have allowed us to save tremendous amounts of money over past years.

Recruit volunteers. Instead of paying Ö employees to fill every role, we run our community using seven different committees that are filled with volunteers. This accomplishes a great deal of work without incurring additional expense to the association.

Ask for sponsorship from vendors. Many of our events are held at no to minimum cost to the community and funded by key community partners and vendors. Expenses for such things as Coffee Club, Veteran's Day and other events are provided by vendors. Additionally, the costs for our website and magazine are also heavily subsidized by the companies advertising their services in support our community.

Partner for buying power. First Service Residential is the largest community management company in Arizona. Partnering with FirstService has allowed us to negotiate for the best pricing on services and the highest returns on investment products. Key partnerships like this provide us with cost savings, increased income and experience to help guide our decision making.

There are many other ways we've found to reduce costs, but these top 10 illustrate how effective and creative our team has been. We're providing this information so you can feel good about how your assessments are used and know that we focus on keeping both our community and our bottom line both looking great!

The 2023 Phoenix Open returns Feb. 6—12 he 2023 WM Phoenix Open Presented by Taylor Morrison returns to Scottsdale February 6-12 for what should amount to be one of the most highly anticipated events in the history of the Valley. This year, the traditionally warm Phoenix-area winter will play host to not only the best-attended golf tournament in the world, but also another world-class event – that big, end-of-the-year football game – you know what one we mean. With the added attention, Valley residents can expect even more "snowbirds" and sports nuts this year, and the added excitement of the NFL's biggest game means fans of the ever-popular Annexus Pro-Am on Wednesday of tournament week can expect some pretty big names to be participating.

The buzz surrounding the Valley of the Sun has never been more palpable, and for the 88th playing of "The People's Open," the stakes have never been higher. Earlier in 2022, the PGA TOUR announced the 2023 WM Phoenix Open was named as one of the TOUR's "Elevated Status Events" which brings with it a \$20 million purse (increased from \$8 million just one year ago) and



guaranteed participation from the TOUR's biggest stars. Eventual Hall-of-Fame players like Rory McIlroy, Jon Rahm, Justin Thomas and Jordan Spieth are expected to tee it up at TPC Scottsdale this February, with a full list of player commitments to be released leading up to the tournament in February.

"We traditionally showcase top-notch fields with the world's best, but this will ensure the participation of the top golfers in the world at the WM Phoenix Open in 2023," said WM Phoenix Open Tournament Chairman Pat Williams. "This is a huge win for our fans, they



can know with certainty that their favorite PGA TOUR players will be competing at TPC Scottsdale in February."


The purse and players aren't the only big-time changes for the 2023 tournament. This year, the Thunderbirds – hosts of the WM Phoenix Open - completely reimagined the Talking Stick Resort Fan Zone to provide a more expansive and comfortable area for fans. Additional shaded areas, more room to walk or hang with friends, better views of the 10th tee, and two giant LED screens to watch the golf action while enjoying tasty food and drinks from local restaurants are just some of the notable changes to the popular area. The expansion of the Fan Zone will also include the new merchandise tent, a 25,000-squarefoot shopping area where fans can pick up anything from logoed golf balls and hats to framed prints, gifts, and nearly every kind of apparel imaginable.

"Our goal for this year's tournament is to make it better, not necessarily bigger," said 2023 WM Phoenix Open Tournament Chairman Pat Williams. "There is a lot to look forward to as an average fan with more space, better views, more water stations where you can bring your own water bottle and more food options at general concessions throughout the golf course. It is important for us to take care of our fans because this tournament wouldn't be possible without their tremendous support every year."

New venues and higher stakes are fairly standard for the tournament host Thunderbirds, and for that civic organization founded in 1937, so is charitable giving. To date, The Thunderbirds have raised more than \$176 million for Arizona charities over the lifetime of the event and granted more than \$10 million to local nonprofits just last year.

"Putting on this world-class event is an incredibly satisfying endeavor, but it pales in comparison to the charitable work we do in our communities through proceeds raised from the tournament," said Williams. "Seeing that big check at the end of the year and knowing the incredible positive influence it will have on young people and families in our communities is, without a doubt, the most rewarding part of belonging to this incredible organization."

Whether you're a golf fanatic, prolific partier or concert connoisseur, the Waste Management Phoenix Open has something for everyone and is definitely the place to be in early February.



Spiced Pomegranate Glazed Ham

Ingredients

Ham 1 8 to 10-pound fully cooked ham 1/4 cup canola oil 3 tablespoons kosher salt 1/4 cup garlic, minced 1 cup fresh dill, minced 1 tablespoon black pepper, ground

Glaze


- **2** cups pomegranate juice
- 1 cup honey
- 1 cup chicken stock
- 2 tablespoons sherry vinegar
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 cinnamon stick2 whole star anise

Pomegranate seeds (garnish) Fresh mint (garnish)

Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 325 degrees.
- 2. Score the ham by cutting a series of parallel lines 1" apart just through the skin, approximately 1/2" deep. Then score another set of line across the first to form a diamond pattern.
- 3. Place the ham in a roasting pan, add 1 cup of water and roast for 60 minutes.
- 4. While the ham is baking combine all of the glaze ingredients in a saucepan on medium heat and cook until reduced by half. The glaze will have a thickened syrupy consistency.
- 5. Brush a thin layer of the pomegranate glaze and continue glazing the ham every 5 minutes, for the next 30 minutes. Roast the ham until the internal temperature is 140F.
- 6. Allow ham to rest for 15 minutes before slicing.
- 7. Serve the ham garnished with pomegranate seeds and torn mint leaves.

loes make beautiful additions to gardens due to their bold architectural forms, vibrantly colored flowers, and ability to attract hummingbirds. They offer some of the best colors for Arizona gardens with their impressive and long-lasting flowers shown during late winter and spring

ALOES ARE POPULAR PLANTS WITH OVER 500

SPECIES identified and four species known for medicinal

properties. Unlike agaves which are New World plants,

aloes are Old World plants originating in Africa. The

center of diversity for aloes is South Africa, which hosts more than 120 species. The range of sizes of the species varies widely from small grass-like aloes to large tree-like




Aloes may be confused with agaves. Differences in the leaf margin and marginal teeth make a clear vegetative distinction between the two. In agaves, the marginal teeth are always of a different and distinct tissue with a fine line

of demarcation. In aloes, there is no such border; what look like teeth on closer examination are just elongations of the leaf. In all agaves, the vascular system

elongates through the leaf, creating fibers that run the entire length of the leaf. Aloe leaves are gelatinous in the interior, never with the fibers present in agaves.





Aloes have fleshy spiny leaves arranged in rosettes and flowers clustered in groups on candle-like or cone-shaped stalks. The flowers are tubular and come in many colors. Fruits are dry capsules containing black seeds.

Aloes require little care but do best with good drainage and plenty of sunlight. Fertilize only lightly in mid-spring and late summer. Pests are rarely a problem. Propagate aloes by using seeds or offsets produced at the base of the plants. They are long-lived plants, especially larger species.

Increased Visitors = Increased Vigilance

he return of winter residents at this time of year increases the population of our community by up to 15%. It is also a time when we see a lot of people come to the valley to attend big events. This year we expect to see the highest number of visitors since 2015. That is because in addition to the Waste Management Open, Barrett Jackson car auction, Russo Steele car auction, and normal seasonal convention activity, we will play host to Super Bowl LVII.

Unfortunately, events this large tend to result in increased crime as well. There are criminals who travel to locations of big events where large groups of tourists are found. Unlike the welcomed, law-abiding visitors, these individuals are responsible for increases in most types of crime with the biggest increases being in thefts and burglaries. This is a time when we all need to practice increased vigilance. It only takes an extra moment to prevent yourself or loved ones from becoming a victim. Double check when you leave the house to make sure that you have closed and locked all your windows and doors. If you have a screened security door, make sure it's locked when you have the front door open, even when you are home. When you get out of your car don't leave valuables in plain sight, windows down, or car doors unlocked.

Keep an eye out and report suspicious or unusual activity to the appropriate authorities.

Pool Water Discharge Requirements

ou cannot drain a pool/spa from your property into the street or washes? Not only is this a violation of the governing documents for the community, but it is also against the law.

It is an environmental hazard for high salinity or highly chlorinated water such as pool water to go into the storm drain system. Draining or discharging pool/spa water into the street is against City Code Sec. 32C-103., and anyone who violates the ordinance is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor and it is punishable with up to a \$2,500 fine. As with any illegal activity, if you see something, say and do something. Report improper pool/spa drainage to the City of Phoenix Environmental Services Stormwater Hotline at 602-256-3190. You can also submit a complaint form to the Desert Ridge Community Association (DRCA).

So how are you supposed to legally drain a pool and/or spa? When draining large amounts of water, or completely draining your pool/spa you must discharge it through your home's sewer clean out. The clean-out is usually located outside at the point closest to the city sewer line, typically outside a bathroom or the kitchen. On some older homes, the clean-out might be located in the wall. On other homes, it is at ground level, but may be obscured by landscaping. Older homes usually have only one opening, while newer ones have two clean-out pipes leading to the sewer line. A threaded cap, usually black and 3 to 4 inches in diameter, covers the opening. If you cannot locate the clean out, or a sidewalk or a patio has covered it, consult a plumber about installing one.


The maximum recommended discharge rate is 12 gallons per minute (720 gal/hr). However, the safe flow rate may be less, depending on the size of the drain line, distance to the sewer main, and the condition of the pipe. Most pool filter pumps will discharge too much water too fast and may cause water to backup into the yard or the house. The safest approach is to rent a submersible pump, connect it to a garden hose and slowly empty the pool. A pump that operates at 700 gallons per hour is about the right size.

Procedure for using the sewer clean-out


- 1. Locate the clean-out. If there are two, use the one closest to the home.
- 2. Remove the cap and insert the drain hose a few inches into the pipe.
- 3. Secure the drain hose so it won't pop out.
- 4. Turn on the pump.
- 5. Immediately check to ensure no water is backing up into the house. Drains in showers and tubs are the first places to check.
- If the water backs up, turn off the pump immediately. You may have a blockage, or the flow rate is too high.

Note: Do not install the pool drain line as a permanent fixture. This may violate the city plumbing code or county health regulations and could contaminate the water when you refill the pool.



he qualifications established by the Desert Ridge Community Association's ("Association") Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, Restrictions and Easements for Desert Ridge as recorded and amended (CC&R's) and the Association's Nominating Committee per Section 3.8 of the Association's Bylaws for being nominated to serve on the Board are listed below. Please review each item closely before submitting your candidate application for consideration.

All Candidates Must:

Comply with the following requirements per the CC&R's, and must remain in compliance through the Annual Meeting:

 Must be an owner of record in the Association or an entity owner of record in the Association.
 If you are a representative of a confirmed entity owner of record you must provide a signed, notarized letter from the owner of record, appointing you as its' representative
 Must be a member in good standing, with all assessments current (no more than 30 days delinquent) and no outstanding violation(s) of the CC&R's.

- → Must not have member rights suspended by the Board of Directors for any violations of the Association's governing documents.
- → Must not be involved in current litigation regarding compliance or dispute with Association's governing documents.
- Must commit to attend regularly scheduled board meetings (at least once a month), as well as the additional time that may be required in order to participate at the committee level.

Additional Qualifications

Established by the Association's Nominating Committee:

→Must attend the Annual Meeting – 6:00pm, Thursday, April 20, 2023. (Note: Due to potential Covid/Flu/RSV, all related meetings may to be scheduled and conducted via Zoom teleconference as opposed to in person meetings. Should a majority voted member be unable to attend due to an extenuating circumstance the Nominating Committee may determine if said circumstance warrants consideration).

- Must attend the Organizational Meeting scheduled within 5 business days following the Annual Meeting.
- Must attend new Board Member training, scheduled within 5 business days following the Annual Meeting.
- Attendance at a Board of Directors Meeting, prior to the election, is strongly suggested. Board meetings are the 4th Wednesday of each month (except April, July, November, and December) presently in person meetings starting at 6:00pm.
- Must comply with all governing documents and provide all information on candidate form.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Board of Directors

Considering running for election? Read on to learn more about the Desert Ridge Association Board of Directors

Q What does the Nominating Committee do? Answer: The Nominating Committee's primary function is to ensure that the community has qualified candidates nominated from the Desert Ridge community to serve as Members of the Community Master Association Board of Directors.

What does the Nominating Committee have planned for the upcoming board election year?

Answer: This issue contains both the board candidate interest announcement and the requirements and qualifications and email address for the application forms. There will be a "Meet the Candidates" night at 6:00 PM on Wednesday, February 22nd at the DRCA Board of Directors Meeting.

Q How many positions are available this year and how long will my term be? Answer: Out of the seven member seats on the Board of Directors, there are four (4) seats on the Board of Directors that are available for election in 2023. Directors are elected to serve two year terms. In 2023, these four positions will be elected for a two-year term since the two-year term for these four seats will have expired in April 2024. Therefore, all four positions will serve two year terms.

What is the process for running for a position on the Board? Answer: Contact the Association office at: 480-551-4550 or email to: desertridge.az@ fsresidential.com or stop by the Association's office (5415 E. High Street, Suite 220, Phoenix 85054) to obtain the candidate application form. Return all candidate application forms to the Association office no later than 5:00pm on Friday, February 10th.

In addition, candidates are required to attend the "Meet the Candidates" Meet & Greet / Q&A Night to be held during the DRCA Board of Director Meeting on Wednesday, February 22nd at 6:00pm.

Candidates must also attend the Desert Ridge Community Association Annual Membership Meeting on Thursday, April 20th. Candidate attendance at this meeting is mandatory!

What are the Directors' responsibilities? Answer: The Desert Ridge Community Association is an Arizona-chartered, 501(c) (4) nonprofit social welfare organization. Directors are responsible for operating and maintaining the "common area" property of the community, reviewing and approving all site plans and improvements within the community, and providing coordination and oversight of the community subsidiary associations and subdivisions. Luckily, we have a management company that handles most of the day-to-day operations.

What is the time commitment needed while serving on the Board? Answer: The Board typically holds one Open Session and one Executive Session per month, which takes approximately 2-4 hours, combined. There are presently seven standing committees that each have varying meeting schedules determined by their respective committee charter. Depending on which committee you would like to be involved with, an additional 1-2 hours per week may be required. Typically, the time commitment averages about 8 hours a month.

When and where is the Board of Directors Meetings? Answer: The meeting schedule is actually determined by the Board of Directors. Our current meeting schedule is the 4th Wednesday of each month at 6:00pm (except for the months of April, July, November and December), via inperson meetings.

O by you incur personal liability by serving on the Board? Answer: Generally, as long as a Director act in good faith with the best interests of the community first, doesn't break any laws, or have any personal benefit, the Association indemnifies the Directors. The Association's Articles of Incorporation provide the most comprehensive explanation of liability. Please read and understand them fully for yourself. The Articles of Incorporation can be found on FirstService Connect, the community information website.

O How does the election actually work? Answer: There is a one vote per lot for each available position on the board. A qualified Owner will be able to cast one vote for up to 4 candidates. No cumulative voting permitted.

Q Do developers and commercial entities get to vote?

Yes, qualified developers and commercial entities are members and get to vote. The Desert Ridge Board is not a Homeowners Association, it is a Community Association. One of the great things about Desert Ridge is that it is still a relatively young development, and only about 45% of the total parceled land have homes built on them. Since the voting is determined per lot, there is still significant involvement by private and commercial developers.

TIPS FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE RUNNING:

Get out there and talk to your neighbors - ask them what their concerns are for the community. Let them know you're running. Candidates may speak with developers as well as the commercial interests. And thank you for getting involved!
