

From the President

The Budget for 2017 was a Challenge!

As Desert Ridge residents, we have high expectations for our community. We want safe, highly

desirable neighborhoods that are well maintained; lifestyle activities that build a spirit of community, and the enforcement of our governing documents to protect and increase our property values.

Achieving these objectives without raising association fees has been difficult, but we have successfully avoided any increase since 2003. The budget for 2017 was especially challenging. When we started our public budget working sessions, we were faced with a shortfall of nearly \$250,000. A deficit of that size would require increasing fees by nearly \$50 per member, annually. Fortunately, each of our board and committee members worked together to cut costs, realign expectations and eliminate the shortfall.

Due to their efforts, there will be no increase in association fees in 2017.

As we move forward to 2018 and beyond, the pressure on our budget will increase every year due to ever-rising costs. While an increase in assessments can't be avoided forever, know that our board and committee members will remain vigilant and continue to focus on minimizing costs while maintaining the high standards expected for Desert Ridge.

As we look toward the future, it's helpful to examine our past.

ASSOCIATION FEES 2004 - 2016

From 1995 – 2004, our Association was under the control of the master developer and Association fees increased five times. Since 2004, our Association has been under homeowner control and fees have never increased since that time.

The table illustrates our fees if they had been raised each year for inflation. As you can see, if our assessments had increased at the rate of inflation, our yearly fee would have risen to \$485. Fortunately, the DRCA Board and



HISTORY

From the beginning MacDonald's Ranch was a horse and cattle ranch in the late 1950's. The Richardson Family is still working that land to this day. Initially the spread consisted of 36,000 acres in the desert that is now North Scottsdale. In the spring of 1970, on Easter Sunday, Old Mac Donald's Farm opened to the public. The Richardson Family realized a dream of an operation that allows the public the hands on approach to the ranch experience. A place where kids from the city could watch a cow being milked, see live ranch animals and be in a natural surrounding as you ride in the Sonoran Desert. This became Old MacDonald's Farm and is in operation today.

Years passed, the Valley grew and with the exception of Old MacDonald's Farms' 1300 acres, the land surrounding became a few shopping centers and housing developments. In 1994 Old MacDonald's Farm was updated to MacDonald's Ranch and our services changed to offer an atmosphere where you can relax and take a step back in time to an overview in ranch life. In our fourth decade of operation MacDonald's Ranch is one of Scottsdale's oldest and most experienced horseback riding stables making it the premier Western Adventure in the Valley of the Sun.



This amazing gourd is also an effective anti-oxidant. With our constant exposure to pollutants in the environment, sun, stress and poor diet, our skin needs the pumpkin's anti-oxidant qualities to neutralize these free radicals that abound. That means, less wrinkles and healthier skin structures for all.

Pumpkin, Sugar, and Spice Scrub

1/2 cup cooked or canned pumpkin, pureed 1/2 cup brown sugar

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

- 1. Combine ingredients in a bowl.
- 2. Stand in a tub or shower stall and use a damp washcloth to scoop some of the mixture up. Apply to body, starting with your feet and working your way up, but avoiding your face. Scrub gently using circular motions.

- 1. Combine ingredients and apply to a clean face with gentle circular motions, avoiding the area around your eyes.
- 2. Allow mask to remain on skin for 10 to 15 minutes, then rinse with warm water, pat dry, and apply your usual moisturizer.

Halloween is a fun time in Desert Ridge. I've compiled these seven tips to help you and your kids stay safe when out in the community, or wherever your Halloween plans may take you.

1. Plan Your Route Before You Go.

Know the route your kids are going to take before they leave the house. With younger children that you are accompanying, be sure to stick to a route that you and your child are familiar with.

2. Stay on the Sidewalks.

Always stay on paths, sidewalks, or on the far edge of the road where there is no path or sidewalk. Walk facing traffic whenever possible

3. Wear Comfortable Shoes.

Make sure to wear well-fitting shoes. Moms and girls in long costumes should stay away from heels, to avoid tripping in the dark.

4. Be Sure You're Seen.

Add reflective tape to your child's costume to increase visibility. Also, carry a glow stick or flashlight with you to keep your child's path lit at all times.

5. Don't Go Alone

Try to go in groups or with at least one adult. Never send younger children out alone – they should be with a parent, guardian, or another trusted adult.

6. Choose the Houses Where You Stop

While trick-or-treating, only stop at well-lit houses. Try not to go past the front porch, and never enter a home without a trusted adult.

7. Wait Until the Candy is Examined **Before Eating it**

Only Eat Factory-wrapped Items. Avoid homemade treats or questionable items. Have an adult go through the candy before you eat any of it.



As a resident of Desert Ridge Community Association (Master Association), we want you to know what is covered by your master association annual assessment of \$372.00 (paid semi-annually in the amount of \$186.00 each January and July).

The following expense allocations illustrate how the Desert Ridge Community Association 2017 Budget Annual Assessment of \$372.00 is typically applied:

Landscape Maintenance	\$99.46 (26.74%)	For the contracted landscape services related to the common areas, streetscape, maintenance services, irrigation repairs, tree trimming, weed control, etc.	
Administration	\$103.40 (27.80%)	For expenses related to the annual audit, taxes, licenses, insurance, legal services, consulting, postage, statements, reserve study, meetings, bad debt, collection costs, office lease and contracted management services.	
On-Site Expenses	\$49.37 (13.27%)	Contracted staffing costs for the five (5) on-site staff working for the master association and office rent.	
Landscape Revenue Share	\$51.47 (13.84%)	For the landscape maintenance assessments paid to both Aviano and Fireside HOA from the Master Association to maintain the common area within these two neighborhoods that is the maintenance responsibility of the Desert Ridge Community Association.	
Reserve Funding	\$13.11 (3.52%)	For capital reserves that includes future replacement of capital items in the master association common area for monuments, bollard light fixtures, decomposed granite, Central Irrigation Controller System, walls/fencing, etc.	
Community Lifestyles	\$17.66 (4.74%)	For expenses related to Desert Ridge Lifestyles events, programs, socials, sponsorships, outreach, magazine, website, promotion and advertising, and recreational activities.	
Community Patrols	\$22.28 (5.99%)	For common area community Off-Duty Phoenix Police Patrol, overnight parking enforcement, vandalism, etc.	
Utilities	\$15.25 (4.10%)	For water, sewer and electric expenses related to the common area streetscape, medians, washes and monuments.

It seems just like yesterday it was January of 2016 and we were facing another year ahead of us full of family, school, work, vacations, triumphs and tragedies. 
This past year has been an active one for law enforcement and Phoenix PD in many ways, between the Presidential election,

- 2. Park in a well lit area, do not park in dark or faraway places. I know it is difficult to find good parking, but do the best you can. If you go in at daylight hours and think you might be inside until it is dark, park as if it were dark.
- 3. Roll the windows on your car all the way up and LOCK your car. Do not leave valuables, packages, or even gym bags, in plain view inside the car; put them all in the trunk. Gym bags or other bags in view may not have but a few items of clothes in them but the thieves do not know that and will try anyways.
- 4. When parking your cars at home, get them in the garage if you can. If you must park in the driveway or street, remove all valuables, garage door openers and lock the car. Many thieves will break into a car just to

take the garage opener and then use it to take items from the garage or enter the house at a later time.

- 5. Do not keep large amounts of cash with you or display cash when shopping. Take with you only what you need for the day. Be on guard while at ATM's.
- 6. Keep a constant eye on your children and ALWAYS know where they are. Children are easily distracted by the decorations and excitement of the holidays and may wander off in only a couple seconds.
- 7. Do not drink and drive, please use a designated driver, call a taxi or Uber. This time of the year many people have holiday functions from work or family and drink when they usually don't and make a bad decision to drive which could end up having tragic consequences. Please enjoy the season but drive responsibly and patiently.
- 8. Make sure the doors and windows to your home are locked, the front lights are on all night and keep a watchful eye for suspicious activity. If you are expecting deliveries and you will not be home, ask a trusted neighbor to pick them up when they arrive. Please

- call Crime Stop at 602-262-6151 if you see suspicious activity.
- 9. Please drive carefully, schools will be out on winter break and many kids will be out in the neighborhoods trying out new bikes, toys, and you need to be aware of their presence.
- 10. If you are going to be out of town for a winter vacation, tell a trusted neighbor to watch over your house, do not post on social media that you will be gone and call the Black Mountain Precinct at 602-495-5002 and ask for a Vacation Watch. Officers can check on your house while you are gone, if the radio calls allow them to.

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
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A Most Memorable Story

As the holidays approach and another year comes a close, it's easy to get caught up in the hustle and bustle. I challenge you to sit down, relax and take five minutes to reflect upon some of your favorite memories from the past twelve months.






At Maricopa County Animal Care & Control (MCACC), we care for nearly 35,000 homeless and unwanted pets. With an average of 100 animals entering our shelters every day, it can be difficult to find time to be grateful.

I hope you'll allow me some time to tell you about one of my happy shelter memories from 2016 ...

In March, a petite, solid white American Pit Bull Terrier mix was brought to our West Valley Animal Care Center as a stray. The dog arrived with a puncture wound to the back of her head and a horrific injury to her eye. The injury was so severe; the eye had to be removed by our veterinary team. The dog was placed in one of our clinic kennels to recover.

I often walk past these kennels and try to make a point to say "good morning" or "hello" to as many dogs as possible. With her stitches, drainage tubes and big plastic Elizabethan collar (e-collar), the Pittie mix's appearance was a bit shocking. I went to her kennel, kneeled down and was immediately greeted by a rapidly wagging tail. The dog leaned into the kennel and tried to give me kisses. I grabbed a pen and wrote on the dog's kennel card, "My name is Lizzy."

The next day I brought a leash with me to visit Lizzy so that she could spend some time out of her kennel. It took us several minutes




my co-workers who stopped by to say hello.

Over the next few weeks, Lizzy continued to recuperate and spend time in my office. It became her home and as soon as we approached the door, I'd drop her leash and she'd go right in to curl up on her bed. She had a stash of stuffed dog toys which she would groom, lick and care for. She'd delicately pick them up and carry them to her bed. It was the cutest thing ever.

Another one of Lizzy's favorite things was our regular lunch outings. She'd hop into the front seat of my car and sit quietly; never trying to interfere or jump from front seat to back. We always got the same thing – a diet soda for me and a plain hamburger for Lizzy. The staff at the drive-thru began to recognize us and Lizzy would always wag a happy hello.

As I prepared to head out on a week-long vacation, I found myself worrying about Lizzy.



When I came back from vacation, I knew it was time for Lizzy to find a home. She'd fully recovered from her injuries and was adjusting well to life with one eye. She was such a sweet dog; surely she'd get adopted in two seconds! And then we tried introducing her to another dog.

She didn't like dogs. Any of them. We introduced her to male dogs, female dogs, calm dogs, playful dogs. Lizzy wanted nothing to do with them. We began to wonder if perhaps her injuries were the result of a dog fight. Was that why she didn't like other dogs? Whatever the reason, her behavior drastically reduced her chances for adoption.

We featured Lizzy on social media. She made multiple trips to TV stations and was in the newspaper but no one came for her. Lizzy was such a great dog with people. It wasn't fair. I began to get angry. What could

we do for her? And then we had an idea ...

Why not stage a Pit-In? A nod to the 60s sit-in, our event would bring attention to Lizzy and other dogs like her. Shelter pets who are overlooked due to their special guirks or behavior. One week later, Camp Lizzy was created. Lizzy and I would "occupy" one of the small play yards at our West Valley Animal Care Center. Thanks to wonderful volunteers, we had a tent, sleeping bag, air mattress, camping chairs and ice chest filled with treats. Camp Lizzy was decorated with peace symbols, streamers, signs ("Give Pits a Chance") photos of other long-time shelter residents in need of



loving homes. My plan was to stay until Lizzy was adopted.

I thought the shelter would grow quiet after dark, but there was always a dog barking somewhere. Lizzy never made a sound. I zipped us into the tent, fired up my Kindle and prepared for a restless night. Lizzy however, slept like a log and took up most of the bed space. I couldn't believe how cold it was and at one point I wrapped my arms around Lizzy. She nuzzled into me and snored softly.

The next day, media came out to share Lizzy's story. We did interviews from our tent. We posted updates on Facebook and Lizzy's fans were extremely supportive. We worked from Camp Lizzy and co-workers came to visit throughout the day. I was dreading the thought of another sleepless night.

And they came. A wonderful couple who had seen Lizzy on television that morning. They had two children and a home without pets. Their son had special needs and they were in

search of a dog that would be gentle but not afraid of his wheelchair. Upon meeting the little boy, Lizzy immediately licked his hand and sat down next to him.

When the adoption paperwork was complete, I packed up Lizzy's favorite toys and walked her out to the front parking lot. In the past few weeks the thought of Lizzy getting adopted was bittersweet - I wanted her to find a wonderful home but I knew I'd be devastated to not have her with me anymore. However, as she jumped into the car of her new family with her wagging tail and happy smile, I didn't feel sad. I didn't cry. I felt pure joy. This was the family Lizzy was supposed to have and they loved her as much as I did.

It's funny how you can see 35,000 animals each year and find one who has such an impact on your life. This happens every day. Our staff and volunteers each have their favorites. They work diligently to make sure they find loving homes. I can't wait to see what wonderful dogs and cats I'll meet in 2017!

DON'T GET FINED. DON'T POST SIGNS.

You've seen the signs... Signs mounted on a utility pole announcing weight loss services or legal aid; Signs on sidewalks advertising easy credit card memberships; Signs on the shoulder of the road or on bike paths noting a new business around the corner; Signs advertising a garage sale; Signs giving directions to an apartment complex or a new housing development.

ALL THESE SIGNS ARE VERY COMMON AND HAVE ALWAYS BEEN ILLEGAL.

The City of Phoenix signs in the right-of-way ordinance includes severe penalties for anyone violating the ordinance. Posting your signs isn't just illegal, it's dangerous. Anyone posting signs on a pole is subject to a \$2,500 fine (sec, 3-6; 8).

Why Does Phoenix Have a Sign Ordinance and Prohibit Signs Placed in the Right-of-Way?

The purpose of the sign ordinance is to provide for safe and well-maintained environments in communities throughout the city. Illegal signs can be dangerous if they become loose and fall into the street or hit a pedestrian. Signs are a hazard if they block the view of motorists or the view of pedestrians. Signs can damage the integrity of poles and create a hazard to utility workers. Signs on sidewalks or bike paths can force pedestrians into traffic. Signs on corners make it difficult for drivers to see into intersections.

Signs are an eyesore; they can become paper graffiti or litter, adding to the blight in many areas. Additionally, residents can be held financially liable for any damage resulting from posting signs in the common area and/or to the common area element assets owned and/or maintained by the Desert Ridge Community Association.

What is a Right-of-Way?

The right-of-way varies widely throughout the city of Phoenix. As a rule of thumb, it includes streets, curbs, medians, traffic light, utility poles, and unimproved shoulders of streets up to private property and generally 2 1/2 feet beyond sidewalks. Placing signs in these areas is always illegal. A-frame signs are also illegal in the right-of-way—which includes sidewalks and private property—throughout Phoenix. Business owners do have the right to attract



customers and advertise by posting signs on his/her property as long as the owner has received the necessary sign permit from the Development Services Department. Permit applications are available by calling 602-495-0301.

What Are the Penalties for Posting Signs in the Right-of-Way?

The fine for placing signs in the right-of-way ranges from \$250 to \$2,500. These fines are imposed PER VIOLATION.

Who Will be Cited for Violations?

The sign ordinance allows police officers to cite businesses or individuals that might benefit from the illegally posted signs, even though they may not have actually placed the signs themselves. As always, individuals caught placing the signs in the right-of-way will be cited.

How Can Private Citizens Advertise in Their Neighborhoods?

Perhaps the safest and best way to spread the word about your garage sale, lost dog or other personal message is to advertise in one of the many newspapers and publications available around the Valley. You can also seek to advertise on neighborhood grocery store bulletin boards or on the internet.

What About Signs That Are Up Right Now, But Have Yet to be Reported?

The city of Phoenix highly encourages businesses and individuals that currently have signs illegally in the right-of-way to remove them before costly citations are issued. The city also strongly discourages individuals or groups from attempting to remove other peoples' signs.

There are several potential safety hazards by working in the right-of-way; not to mention possible legal ramifications if damage is done to another individuals's sign or what it is attached to.





DOG WASTE STATIONS

Did you know.... the Desert Ridge Community Association Board (DRCA) of Directors has increased the number of dog waste stations along common areas over the past 3 years?

In 2013, the DRCA Board approved the addition of 32 dog waste stations to be installed along areas where dog waste was accumulating without collection by some pet owners. In 2016, the management team along with the help of AAA Landscape located additional locations in the community that were lacking dog waste stations. These locations were presented to the DRCA board of directors for their review and consideration and 10 additional stations were installed

along these locations. There are now a total of 52 dog waste stations in the DRCA common areas and additional stations located within the sub-association communities.

These dog waste stations have been added to provide dog waste bags and trash cans throughout the common area of the community for residents that walk their pets.

If you plan to walk in areas where there are no dog waste stations, please be reminded to carry bags with you to clean up your pets waste.



With the Holiday Lighting Contest we usually receive several questions in regards to when the lights can be displayed. In the spirit of the holidays and to ensure your holiday lighting/decorations do not become a nuisance to your neighbors and the community, please note holiday lighting/decorations that directly correspond to specific and generally recognized events may be displayed for a period of seven (7) days preceding the specific calendar holiday and must be removed within three (3) days following the holiday.

The only exception to the above pertains to holiday lighting/decorations for holidays in the month of December, which allows holiday lighting/decorations




to be displayed immediately preceding the Thanksgiving holiday and must be removed no later than January 7th.

Holiday lighting/decorations can be displayed only on the dwelling of the owner's lot/unit. Please note that no holiday lighting/decorations shall be installed by a lot/unit owner within or on the common area and/or the common elements. In addition, electricity for holiday lighting/decorations must be provided from the dwelling unit/lot and may not be derived from the common area power source and/or facility.

That Familiar Knock at the Door

As the weather cools off we have a tendency to see an increase in door-to-door solicitors. Typically

these "Reps" claim to work for various companies that you are familiar with. Some of these people may indeed work with or be affiliated with, a particular company, but despite their official looking embroidered shirts, they are not an actual employee of that company. This may not apply to all companies, but when it comes to the utilities, APS, CenturyLink, Cox Communications, and Southwest Gas, their employees will not come to your home unless you call for service. Keep in mind, regardless of the person's intentions; you have every right to ask them to leave or to respond politely by saying "No thank you", "Now's not a good time", or even "Sorry, I'm on a call right now".

Have you Noticed More Police Around the Community?

This past June, the DRCA Board of Directors increased our Phoenix Police

off-duty patrols. The patrols are now more frequent and for longer periods of time. During the Holiday Season, you will notice even more Phoenix Police driving around Desert Ridge. This is to help keep crime as low as possible and to keep our community as safe as possible, especially during the higher crime season of the holidays.

Holiday Safety Tips

Even with the increased police patrols, you still need to be aware of your surroundings and take appropriate precautions. Below are my annual Holiday safety tips to help get you through the season as safely as possible.

When Shopping, or Out and About

- Take only the credit cards you need when shopping. Leave the others in a safe place at home
- When paying with a credit card, make sure that the card is not easily visible to others around you. There are crooks that can memorize your card number in a matter of seconds.
- When talking on your cell phone, be mindful of your surroundings. Distracted people are targets for purse-snatchers.

- Keep your purse or wallet close to you at all times.
- Do not carry excessive or unnecessary cash on you.
- Shop in the daylight if possible. When shopping after dark always park in a well-lit area.
- Shop with a friend when possible, because there's safety in numbers.
- When you park your vehicle, do not leave your purse, wallet, cell phone, or any other valuables in plain view.
- When you return to your vehicle, scan the interior to be sure no one is hiding inside.
- When placing purchases from the stores in your vehicle, place them out of sight. The best place is in the trunk
- After putting packages in your vehicle, drive to different row before going to another store. Do this even if you are simply going back to the same store.
- Try not to park next to a larger vehicle that blocks your vision while you are entering or exiting your vehicle
- Have your keys out and ready when approaching your vehicle



DITCH THE DIZZINESS PHYSICAL THERAPY FOR VERTIGO

Dizziness and vertigo are very common complaints that bring a patient to visit their physician, just as common as back pain and headaches [1][2]. Vertigo can greatly affect many people's daily lives but some do not even know that physical therapy can help! Many times, they are told the common treatment is medication or rest. However, the option of physical therapy to decrease or eliminate dizziness is an alternative and excellent option. This branch of physical therapy is called vestibular rehabilitation. Vestibular rehabilitation has been shown to be effective in improving symptoms associated with dizziness and vertigo.

Vestibular rehabilitation begins with diagnosing the cause of the dizziness. Some of the most common issues are BPPV (Benign Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo), vestibular hypofunction, and cervicogenic (postural) dizziness. BPPV is an inner ear condition that is caused by the formation of crystals within the ear's semi-circular canals. causing moderate to severe dizziness and vertigo while changing positions. Vestibular hypofunction is more of a general diagnosis but relates to dizziness that is caused from weakness or trauma to the vestibular nerve. Patients with vestibular hypofunction typically feel unstable or that the room is spinning. On the other hand, cervicogenic

dizziness is related to neck issues caused by poor posture or significant muscle tightness and can be determined through evaluation by a physical therapist [4]. Some other forms of dizziness can be from poor eye sight, medications, or issues from neurological conditions including strokes, Parkinson's, Multiple Sclerosis.

Adult Orthodontics

Orthodontics for adults is not new

Over 100 years ago Dr. Edward Angle, the father of orthodontics, treated a 38-year-old woman with braces. The number of adult patients receiving orthodontic treatment is increasing worldwide.

A recent survey from the American Association of Orthodontists (AAO) found that adults made up a record high of nearly 1.5 million Orthodontic patients in the U.S. and Canada. Improved appliance esthetics, treatment mechanics and social acceptability are some of the contributing factors involving this increase.

Many adults are seeking orthodontic treatment not only for esthetics but also for functional health, such as TMD (Temporomandibular Joint Dysfunction), sleep apnea, preparation for restorative work (by the general dentist or prosthodontist), gum problems (periodontitis),

dentofacial deformities (orthognathic surgery).

The orthodontist is a specialist who spends an extra 2-3 years in an advanced orthodontic program after he or she becomes a general dentist. The orthodontist works well with all other specialists; oral surgeons, pedodontist, periodontist, prosthodontist, including general dentists, in order to provide the best possible treatment for their patients.

Available treatment options for adults;

Metal Braces: still the most efficient and economical form of treatment.

Clear Braces: (ceramic) are more esthetic but maybe less efficient and tend to stain or break easier with increased cost.


Lingual Braces: are placed behind the teeth on the tongue side and are basically invisible, but may be irritating to the tongue and significantly more expensive.

Clear Plastic Aligners: (i.e. Invisalign). They are almost invisible, but do have limitations on certain treatments. They require very good compliance to wear at least 22 hours a day; otherwise they will not work and will prolong the treatment time. These aligners are also more expensive.



Wilckodontics

Treatments for adults don't necessarily take longer; it is rather the complexity of the case that determines the treatment time. Nowadays, there are techniques available that could significantly reduce the treatment time. "Wilckodontics", or decortication with bone graft, is the most efficient technique to reduce treatment time to about 1/3 of the typical orthodontic treatment and with some extra benefits like an increase in bone volume and stability, avoiding surgery or extractions in some borderline cases. Other techniques that can reduce treatment time include microperforations, vibration or photoactivation.



CONSISTENT WARM-UP... CONSISTE



This holiday season, give yourself a gift that will help you play your best golf. Before each round, give yourself adequate time to warm up correctly. Since you are already investing your time and money to play a round of golf, why not set yourself up to play your best and enjoy your round? A consistent warm-up routine will encourage consistent play. An effective warm-up routine should be around fortyfive minutes and work from small to big.

Begin your warm-up routine with the smallest swing... putting. When putting before your round, the purpose should be more about learning the speed of the greens rather than working on your stroke. When you arrive at the putting green, choose a hole and begin with five foot putts. Practice five foot putts from different locations around the hole, so you will be able to learn the speed of the green for uphill, downhill and side hill putts. Next, repeat the process from ten feet and also fifteen feet. Finally, putt a few lag putts to

check your distance control.

Once you've finished putting, move to chipping. When chipping during your warm-up, you want to be checking the firmness of the green and also the different types of lies around the green. Hopefully the chipping green will be a good representation of the greens on the course, but it's not always the case at some courses. Begin by making easy chip shots and notice the firmness of the greens. Softer greens will cause the ball to "check up" more so your chip shot will have less roll. Firmer greens will allow the ball to "release" and roll out more. Once you have determined the firmness of the green, make some chip shots from lies where the grass has different lengths. When chipping out of different length grass, notice how your club reacts to grass through impact.

After chipping, it's time to go to the driving range. When warming up on the range, try to keep your swing thoughts to a minimum and focus more on loosening up and tempo. Since we want to work from small

to big, begin hitting with your wedge. After warming up with your wedge, begin working through the rest of your irons. You will not need to use every iron during your warm-up, so use either your odd numbered irons or your even numbered irons. After your irons, try a hybrid, fairway wood and driver in that order. Once you are finished hitting your driver, you'll be ready for the course.

Our favorite rounds of golf are usually the rounds we play the best. Taking some time to develop a consistent warm-up routine will help you on your way to better golf. Remember to begin with the smallest swing and work up to the largest swing. Also, by knowing the purpose for each part of your warm-up, you will be setting yourself up for success. Have a great golf season!

Last spring, after learning about the Summit Basecamp personalized learning initiative, we submitted an application to join the Summit training in San Francisco. We were one of two elementary schools chosen in the state of Arizona. With the support of Mark Zuckerberg and a few of his Facebook engineers, the program has blossomed to include 120 schools throughout the country. This partnership provides a platform and a structure to gather those real world lessons and projects and present them in an organized and purposeful way.

There are 4 major elements of the program. The first focuses on content knowledge. This is the part of teaching that is more traditionally known and measured. This is the math, reading, writing, science and social studies. The second is the cognitive skills time or project time where the students collaborate, problem solve and think critically as they dive deeper into learning. The third element is the student mentoring time. Each student is partnered with a teacher who acts as the mentor throughout the year. This mentor becomes the go-to person, helping the

student set and monitor goals and coaching the student on habits of success. The fourth element is real life experiences.

Here are a few things that our teachers have to say about the program

Students feel a sense of empowerment over their own learning. They are able to pick and choose how to learn a skill that best fits their learning style whether it be watching video clip(s), reading instructional notes, and/or games for a particular skill. They are enjoying the fact that they may test out of a skill set if they have already mastered a skill after they had taken the pre-test and post-test. Building time into the week to mentor students is huge as students enjoy the personal time to discuss their personal learning plan, ideas or anything else.

The classroom is set up so students may choose the appropriate seating to meet their goals for the day. There are places to meet in groups and pairs, as well as individual seating.

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
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


