One of the amenities most requested by Desert Ridge residents has been a dog park. As an association, we've shared this feedback with city officials and

worked hard on behalf of our membership. Thanks to the efforts of the DRCA board, members of our association, Councilman Jim Waring, and the Parks and Recreation Director Inger Erickson, we will soon have a dog park in our community.

Dog parks are listed among the most popular recreational amenities in the Valley, and the City of Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department has built nine such facilities in recent years. The tenth is scheduled to open this spring and another is being planned for inclusion in the Reach 11 Sports Complex, located near the intersection of Deer Valley and Cave Creek roads. It will be part of the larger master plan for that area.

The Parks and Recreation Department process for developing and constructing a dog park takes approximately nine months, which includes a three month design phase followed by a six month



construction period.

The design phase begins with the Parks and Recreation Department's Development staff working to create a steering committee of community members, which will guide the design and concept phase and present those ideas to the community for feedback and approval. Once those components are finalized the construction project will begin.

Phoenix dog parks generally are two acres in size, with separate fenced-in one-acre

areas for large and small dogs. Features also include drinking fountains for dogs, shade trees, trash receptacles, concrete seating areas, lighting, and turf and decomposed granite surfaces.


of Phoenix for the ongoing support of the Farmers Market Cashman Park at Desert Ridge.

I grew up in a Community just north of Chicago. The Community was incorporated almost 100 years before I was born. My friends and I played in parks

that were built to entertain people of generations and times long before us. We drove down several streets that were built to accommodate horse drawn carriages. The high school we attended was steeped in tradition. We had a trophy case featuring trophies, awards, and pictures from sports I barely recognized. We had a hall of fame featuring all the celebrities and world renown's that had called the community their childhood home. We had civic pride and our goal was simply to fit in.

We all tried to find our way to fit into the mold when growing up in established communities. To add our name to the voluminous book of community achievements and follow in the footsteps of our predecessors. Yes, our goal was to be part of the rich past and tradition. We knew of no other way. I certainly did not until my wife and I took a trip to Arizona.

Almost immediately we fell in love with the sunshine (it was early March – felt good coming from Chicago), the kind hearted people, the expanse, and the stars, we could actually see stars! We traveled way north from our Scottsdale hotel to a place called "Rawhide" to experience an old western town. That was only about 20 years ago. The ride from Scottsdale Road and Shea to Rawhide seemed endless, dark, and desolate. We fell in love with it. The allure was that there was no past to bind us, no footsteps to follow, and no lines to tow. This was different from anything we experienced. Fresh with the feeling of an opportunity to create a new life rather than live in someone else's shadow.

About 9 years ago we started our migration west. Rawhide, was moved to Chandler. But that long desolate ride from Scottsdale and Shea was amazingly now populated with vibrant buildings, home developments, car dealerships, and resorts. We drove past the 101 to a new community called Desert Ridge. I remember seeing the placard. My wife and I both remarked the typeface reminded us of Disneyland, the self-proclaimed "happiest place on earth." But seeing the meteoric growth, we knew we had to be part of it. This would be our "happy place".

The point is virtually all of us came from somewhere else. Desert Ridge is young by community standards, about 21 years old. Not old enough to produce generations of Desert Ridgeians, steeped in a time honored and out of touch cultures or traditions dating back a century or indoctrinated with an antiquated mindset.

No, this is our turn to build a community. Our turn to write chapter one in the history books. To set the standards by which all future Desert Ridgeans wish to aspire to. It is more than an opportunity it is our responsibility.

Desert Ridge is only at about 40% of its total planned population. That means there will be significant growth over the coming years. We hope to attract people who will care about our community. Well, Punxsutawney Phil failed to see his shadow this year on Groundhog Day, so it looks like the forecast is calling for an early Spring. That means it's almost time for Spring Cleaning!

It's a great time of year for cleaning house, simplifying your life, and starting the year fresh! Here are 15 statistics gathered by Joshua Becker for "Becoming Minimalist" that confirm the suspicion that Americans simply own too much stuff:

- 1. There are 300,000 items in the average American home (LA Times).
- 2. The average size of the American home has nearly tripled in size over the past 50 years (NPR).
- 3. And still, 1 out of every 10 Americans rent offsite storage—the fastest growing segment of the commercial real estate industry over the past four decades. (New York Times Magazine).

- 4. While 25% of people with two-car garages don't have room to park cars inside them and 32% only have room for one vehicle. (U.S. Department of Energy).
- 5. The United States has upward of 50,000 storage facilities, more than five times the number of Starbucks. Currently, there is 7.3 square feet of self-storage space for every man, woman and child in the nation. Thus, it is physically possible that every American could stand—all at the same time—under the total canopy of self storage roofing (SSA).
- 6. British research found that the average 10-year-old owns 238 toys but plays with just 12 daily (The Telegraph).
- 7. 3.1% of the world's children live in America, but they own 40% of the toys consumed globally (UCLA).
- 8. The average American woman owns 30 outfits—one for every day of the month. In 1930, that figure was nine (Forbes).
- 9. The average American family spends \$1,700 on clothes annually (Forbes).

- 10. While the average American throws away 65 pounds of clothing per year (Huffington Post).
- 11. Some reports indicate we consume twice as many material goods today as we did 50 years ago (The Story of Stuff).
- 12. Currently, the 12 percent of the world's population that lives in North America and Western Europe account for 60 percent of private consumption spending, while the one-third living in South Asia and sub-Saharan Africa accounts for only 3.2 percent (Worldwatch Institute).
- 13. Americans spend more on shoes, jewelry, and watches (\$100 billion) than on higher education (Psychology Today).
- 14. Over the course of our lifetime, we will spend a total of 3,680 hours or 153 days searching for misplaced items. The research found we lose up to nine items every day—or 198,743 in a lifetime. Phones, keys, sunglasses, and paperwork top the list (The Daily Mail).
- 15. Americans spend \$1.2 trillion annually on nonessential goods—in other words, items they do not need (The Wall Street Journal).

So, join us this Spring as we go through our closets, drawers, and garages. Our best tip...if you don't love it – don't buy it! If you already bought it and don't love it – get rid of it!

Yard sales are a great way to kick off spring cleaning. You'll clear clutter from your home and get paid to have someone else haul away your old stuff! But along with rewards, yard sales also come with some risks. Keep these tips in mind to host a safe and successful sale:

- Review your homeowners or renters insurance. You could be liable if a bargain hunter is injured on your property. Contact your insurance representative to be sure you are adequately covered.
- Have helpers. Arrange for family and friends to help, and assign everyone to specific jobs. That way, you'll have extra sets of eyes on your merchandise and money, as well as someone to oversee the sale when you step away.
- Hire a babysitter. Let someone else watch your young children and pets while you're working. Do not let your pets roam the sale unattended, no matter how wellbehaved, yard sales get hectic.
- Restrict access to your house. Lock doors and windows, and close the curtains.

Don't allow strangers to enter to try on clothes or use the restroom. If weather and space allows, close your garage door and host the sale on your driveway or lawn.

- Organize the merchandise to deter accidents and theft. Place higher-priced items near the checkout, keep aisles clear and display hazardous wares out of children's reach. And don't forget about things that aren't for sale: Cover items stored in the garage, check to make sure storage shelves are secure and look for hazards in your lawn and sidewalks that could cause injury.
- Protect your money. Keep all money in a zippered wallet attached to your belt. Periodically bring extra cash into the house—keeping just enough to make change. If you choose to use a cashbox ensure that it is guarded and not accessible to everybody. Decide before the sale if you will be accepting larger bills, if you chose to do so there is a greater chance of counterfeiting. Sellers may want to make a small investment in a counterfeit pen, they can be picked up at any office

supply store. Twenty-dollar bills are the most counterfeited bills and do not accept checks. Do not place the monies received in cashbox before counting back their change. This will ensure there is no miscommunication on the amount of cash received for items.

- Keep shoppers safety in mind. Before selling an item, make sure it hasn't made the Consumer Product Safety Commission's list of recalls. Don't sell children's safety equipment, furniture or toys that are outdated or damaged.
- Control traffic. Insist that shoppers park in legal areas, and never in your driveway.
- Keep your phone close an emergency can happen at any time. You may have an overall aggressive customer who refuses to leave or you may have someone who decides to steal some of your items. Therefore, you should always keep your cell phone in your pocket during the garage sale. Be sure that the battery is fully charged before the sale starts.

THE LEGEND AND LEGACY OF NICHOLAS MERIS


The Desert Ridge Community Association Board of Directors would like to convey their respects and appreciation on behalf our community in remembrance of Nicholas Meris, who passed away on December 13, 2015.

Nick Meris was one of Desert Ridge's founding residents, a visionary and dedicated community volunteer and advocate of Desert Ridge who served initially as Board President of the Glen Eagle HOA and later progressed to becoming a member of the Desert Ridge Homeowners Network (i.e., an organized group of about 15 community residents that united to work with the community developer and builders in the interest of helping to shape their new community) that provided input to the Desert Ridge Community Association Board of Directors during the Master Developer control period of the Master Association. Nick had a strong sense of responsibility of giving back to the community through his service to the community. This conviction led Nick to many years of service within local neighborhood groups, networks and eventually the Desert Ridge Community Association Board of Directors. Nick would later become one of the first community residents elected to serve on the Desert Ridge Community Association (Master Association) Board of Directors and was instrumental in the transition of the Desert Ridge Community Association Board of Directors from the Master Developer control to the community homeowners. After the Desert Ridge Homeowners Network was replaced by an elected Board of Directors, Nick continued to volunteer at the Mayo Hospital for a period of 16 years. He was also honored with numerous awards for his contributions and dedication for his extraordinary community service, which included the "Friends of Phoenix" award and "Front Porch Bench Award", both awarded to him by the Mayor of Phoenix.

Nick was an inspiration to a number of people throughout the Desert Ridge Community. As the Community General Manager for Desert

Ridge, I did not have the good fortune to work with Nick Meris, but I did have the opportunity to meet and present him with a service recognition award on behalf of the community in 2013. I was very impressed with his continued interest in the affairs and particularly the future of Desert Ridge. He espoused the importance of residents being actively involved so they can have a voice in the progress and improvement of Desert Ridge by attending meetings, volunteering to serve on a committee or even running for a seat on the board of directors.

Nick was once quoted as saying in the summer of 2010, "I see great things for the future of Desert Ridge. While the housing situation won't correct itself overnight, if we keep alert and keep doing the right things, we'll get the stable growth we need". Nick will be truly missed in the community and our hearts...but his legend and legacy will endure for generations to come. Nick's imprint shall continue as a lasting reminder in our community with the Desert Ridge Community Association dedicating and placing a memorial brick paver in Nick

Nick is survived by his devoted wife and life love of 59 years, Joanne, three dearly-loved children, Kathy, Valerie and William. He is also survived by his six wonderful grandchildren; three great-grandchildren, two godsons and seven nephews and nieces...and a community of thousands that are grateful to have been blessed by his leadership and vision!

Medals Finally Presented



Loren Mellendorf, age 90 and resident of Sagewood, was a medic in WWII in the Rainbow Division which landed in France in late 1944. He was captured in early 1945 and held as a Prisoner of War for six months. As the war ended he was liberated but never received the medals he earned

due to spending six months in a hospital. Seventy years later, he was recently presented with the medals by the Arizona National Guard and Senator John McCain at a ceremony held at Sagewood.

Loren's wife, Pat, took up the task of putting in the request and with the help of Senator John McCain's staff he was recently presented with the Prisoner of War Medal, the Good Conduct Medal, the American Theater Campaign Medal, the European, African and Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with two bronze service stars and the World War II Victory Medal.


These items can be disposed properly at the upcoming Household Hazardous Waste and **Electronics Collection Event:**

Friday, April 15, 2016

To ensure containers are placed out on time, containers may be placed at the curb after 6:00 p.m. on the day preceding collection. Containers for street collection must be placed at the curb for service no later than 5:30 a.m. on the day of collection. They must be removed prior to 5:30 a.m. of the day after collection. It is unlawful to place or permit containers to remain adjacent to the curb except upon regular collection days. Containers must be stored, between collection days, on the user's property so as not to interfere with pedestrian or vehicular traffic.

CITY CODE CHAPTER 27-19 STATES:



- Containers must not interfere with pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
- Containers must be 15 feet away from any obstruction, such as cars, light posts and mailboxes
- and securely tie any trash that goes into the green trash container.

BLUE RECYCLING CONTAINER RULES

All items in the blue recycle container should be loose (not

bagged), clean and dry. https://www.phoenix. gov/publicworks/recycling

The only exception to the "no bags" rule is for shredded paper. It should be placed in a CLEAR plastic bag.

Acceptable items are:

- All hard plastic containers including buckets, plastic jugs and bottles with or without caps.
- Cardboard, food boxes, frozen food boxes, junk mail, wet strength chipboard, paper board, 6/12-pack holders, newspaper, magazines, phone books and juice boxes.
- Glass bottles, jars and any food grade glass containers.
- Aluminum cans, metal cans, small metal appliances and empty aerosol cans, (No paint, pesticides or oven cleaners).

The following items cannot be placed in your blue recycling container:

- Plastic bags (instead take plastic bags your local grocery store and place in a "Bag Central Station" container to be recycled)
- Diapers
- Clothing
- Grass
- Yard waste
- Food waste
- #6 foam

2016 and 2017 WATER RATES INCREASE

On January 6, 2016 the Phoenix City Council approved a 3% rate increase for water rates and a 2% rate increase for sewer rates, which results in a combined 2.6% increase for 2016. Phoenix City Council also approved a 2% increase for water and 2% increase for wastewater, a combined 2% increase for 2017. The 2016 rates will go into effect on March 1, 2016. The 2017 rates will go into effect on March 1, 2017.

The approved 2016 and 2017 rate increases will provide funding for resources needed to invest in rehabilitation and replacement of the pipes, treatment plants, pumps, reservoirs, and that ensure reliable delivery of the city's drinking

The 2016 rates increase roughly translates into a monthly increase of \$1.59 for the average water customer. With the new rates in place, the average single-family residential water customer will pay \$30.00 per month, and the average single-family

residential sewer customer will pay \$24.68 per month. These rates are still among the lowest in the nation.



The holiday season may be over, but Maricopa County Animal Care & Control (MCACC) is asking the community to keep the holiday spirit alive by "pawing" it forward and performing acts of kindness for animals in MCACC shelters through its new "Paw it Forward" program.

Last summer, a woman came to MCACC's East Valley Animal Care Center in Mesa and offered to pay the adoption fee for five shelter dogs. As she was making her donation, the woman presented staff with a business card that read, "This random act of kindness is done in loving memory of Lily Rue."

Upon further investigation, staff learned that Lily was stillborn on August 29th, 2014. Her family asked family and friends to do something kind in memory of Lily on her first birthday. The acts of kindness were then recorded on a Facebook page dedicated to Lily. Someone purchased groceries for a family in need; another person donated to a fund to rebuild a playground that had been destroyed by fire; while on vacation someone purchased ice cream for a small child.

MCACC's marketing team was inspired by Lily's family and their desire to keeping her memory alive in a positive fashion. After a discussion with Lily's mother, MCACC created "Paw it Forward" – a program with similarities and geared toward helping shelter pets.

"Paw it Forward" is an initiative to inspire acts of kindness from people all over the Valley throughout the year. The program


will highlight and emphasize the acts through a Facebook event on MCACC's Facebook page featuring photos, videos and information posted by folks who "pawed" it forward.

I never really understood how important it is to bring a meal to friends who've just had a baby until I had my first child. dropping off a meal matters much more than if you slaved away in the kitchen. Just remember that each meal new parents

receive is special because it makes their first few days and weeks a little easier. It also makes them feel apart of a community and having the support of other local families in huge.

1. Bring Food That Is Ready-To-Eat

PROJECT OVERVIEW:

AAA Landscape has proudly partnered with the Desert Ridge Community Association (DRCA) since 2006 and as a result of the ongoing management of the landscape, DRCA has won numerous awards for its landscape. AAA Landscape maintains over 85 acres of granite, 5,431 shrubs, and over 33,000 trees. In addition, there are 3 large wash areas which provide the homeowners walking paths through the natural desert landscape. AAA Landscape was approached by FirstService Residential and the DRCA Board of Directors to come up with cost saving measures for the association by conserving water across its vast network of common areas, while still preserving the lush beauty of those landscapes. If possible, the association hoped to leverage its existing controller technology to help minimize costs.

CHALLENGE:

AAA Landscape was requested to investigate and evaluate the state of the existing Central Control Irrigation System at DRCA. The existing irrigation system, a Motorola Irrinet/ Scorpio system with 35 Scorpio controllers powered by 3 main Irrinets, was approximately 15 years old and had challenges functioning as a Central Control Irrigation System. The remaining life span was +/- 5 yrs. The system also did not enable precision irrigation management and the ability to monitor flow data the way we needed it to to manage our water budgets.




SOLUTION:

From the project's inception, the development team sought to ensure that environmental responsibility was designed into all facets of the site, including landscape and irrigation components. AAA Landscape recommended and installed a Rain Bird® IQ™ Central Control System which monitors DRCA's irrigation system, maintaining peak water efficiency even in periods of high heat or during occasional rainstorms. A Rain Bird drip irrigation system offers pin-point watering of every individual plant on-site, eliminating waste. Water-smart Rain Bird components, such as valves and flow sensors, enable each site to take full advantage of water. A good working system alone does not ensure a well managed site. Data collection and database programming services were also provided to give the community the most accurate system information to begin with. This reduced initial over-watering, the amount of system fine tuning required, and enabling DRCA to see a faster return from their investment. The result was a turnkey system with full support from AAA Landscape and Rain Bird Services.

COST AND WATER SAVINGS:

AAA Landscape proposed a water decrease between 15% to 25% percent. So far, DRCA has an approximate 31% decrease in their water usage the first year, and an additional 23% decrease the second year. AAA Landscape has also played an intricate role in partnering with Rain Bird on upgrades to the technology of the Central Control Irrigation System and has absorbed these costs with Rain Bird, passing thousands of dollars in savings to the DRCA keeping the system operating efficiently. You made it through the holidays. You made it through the winter months. Now spring is upon us and it's time to get outdoors, get active and enjoy the great weather. It's time to start golfing again. Rather than just going out to play and try to "knock the rust off your clubs," take some steps to start off on the right foot. If you have been playing continuously all year, try taking a step back to get on the right track. It's time to rededicate yourself to your golf game.

Begin by evaluating your equipment. Is your equipment set up to give you the best chance to play your best? First, check your grips. Are your grips worn or slick? If your grips are slick, try scrubbing them with soap and water and wiping them down. If your grips are worn beyond they point of cleaning, then have them replaced. Second, have your loft and lie angles checked if you haven't had them checked in the past. Adjusting your loft and lie angles to fit your swing is a simple way to increase your consistency. Last, evaluate your clubs. Do you have any clubs

that are worn or outdated? Often times, upgrading to clubs that are in new condition or have newer technology can give you better performance from your equipment.


Next, start to practice again before you go play. Simply spending a little time to practice can help you get back into the groove again. Instead of just going out to hit some balls, start practicing with a plan. A common expression in golf is that "the first thing to go is your putting." Start your practice with putting. Begin practicing short putts and gradually move to longer putts. By starting with short putts first, you will begin to develop your touch and feel again. Next, practice your chipping and pitching. By practicing your chipping and pitching, you make small swings and get a feel for correct impact with your irons. Finally, move to the driving range and practice your full swing. By starting out small you're giving yourself a chance to play your best again.

Lastly, get some help if you need it. As a golf instructor, students are always telling me how good

they used to play or how far they used to hit the ball. Sometimes diminished success in an area is due to new physical limitations, but often golfers just get off track or develop some new bad habits. Seek help at the beginning or take a step back to get some help for increased long term success. Most of the time, golfers either do not know what is happening in their swing or they simply can't see what is happening. Another

set of eyes or a new perspective from an instructor will get you down the road to enjoying golf again.

Whether you are just getting back into golf or you need to take a step back, start off on the right track. By rededicating yourself to golf, you will be getting a fresh start and increasing your success. Whatever your goals may be, a fresh start will result in enjoying golf once again.

Neighborhood Policing in Black Mountain Precinct

Happy New Year to everyone and while we are already a month into 2016 the New Year feel is still upon many. The Black Mountain Precinct officers are working very hard to accomplish our goals and to help serve you in the best possible way. One way we do this is through the Neighborhood Policing Unit. Many of you have heard of the plethora of acronyms that we use here at the City of Phoenix Police Department, such as CAO, NET, BMP, CFMH, MROP, PNP and that is just the tip of the iceberg.

The Black Mountain Precinct or BMP as we are called, has a Neighborhood Policing Unit just like all the other police precincts. It is comprised of three NET squads or Neighborhood Enforcement Teams and one CAO or Community Action Squad which is also divided down even further into more specific duties. All of these officers are well trained in the community policing philosophy of our department, the specific aspects of our assignments, are assigned here through a selection process and generally have many years of patrol experience before they come here. As a specialty squad within the patrol division we are in marked police vehicles and in uniform most times but depending on the type of investigation may not be in uniform. Since we are assigned to the patrol division, our first responsibility is to be a support function for patrol and assist them in any way needed, so many times we are answering radio calls or enforcing on view situations. Each NET and the CAO squad are supervised by a Sergeant and these four Sergeants report to the Resource Lieutenant.

The Black Mountain Precinct is one of seven police precincts that cover the City of

Phoenix and it is broken down further into three squad areas. It is labeled numerically for our Communications Bureau as 200 or 2 and so the squads are then broken down into the 21, 22 and 23 squad areas. Each squad area then has 4 beats within them. I have attached a map of our precinct showing the various squad and beat areas.

The NET squads or Neighborhood Enforcement Team are assigned each to a particular squad area although they have precinct wide responsibilities as well depending on the violent crime type assigned to them for follow up. That is one of their job duties is to follow up, assist Detectives and apprehend suspects for the violent or property crime category assigned to them. These would be crimes that occurred in the Black Mountain Precinct or that suspects living or staying in our precinct wanted in other parts of the city. The NET squads also assist the CAO's with enforcement plans in the assigned squad areas for ongoing neighborhood issues, look for any wanted felons in the area, execute or assist in search warrants, assist in any tactical projects as TRU in the precinct or city or any other projects deemed necessary by the precinct Commander.

The CAO squad or Community Action Officer Squad has two CAO's assigned to each squad area, a Crime Free Multi Housing officer (CFMH), a Misdemeanor Repeat Offender Program officer (MROP) and a Programs Coordinator.

The CAO's are assigned by squad area to serve that area, although if there is a precinct wide issue we can work on those as well. Within our areas, each CAO is responsible for solving ongoing or other issues within that area, liaison with neighborhood groups, businesses or HOA's, form new Block Watches and assist



existing ones, teach Crime Prevention, direct needed resources in to their area to address ongoing issues, take enforcement action on problems in their area. CAO's are also part of the precincts TRU or Tactical Response Unit to respond to precinct or city wide tactical issues. CAO's also assist in executing search warrants as needed. supporting patrol officers through answering calls, special event security planning and whatever else the precinct Commander deems necessary for us to do. One of the CAO's is also assigned duties as the precinct Liquor License officer. This responsibility includes the review, investigation and approval of all new liquor license establishments, liquor license transfers and special event permits.

Within the CAO squad there is also a Crime Free Multi Housing officer (CFMH). This officer works with multi housing properties / apartment complexes in the entire precinct to assist management on any crime issues that are on the properties or impacting the surrounding neighborhoods from the properties. The CFMH officer helps get the property into the CFMH Program which is a three step program to help properties become certified in the program which increases the rent ability of the apartments and attracts quality law abiding residents. The CFMH officer also works on long term problem properties through the Abatement process, teaches Crime Prevention at multi housing properties and assists the CAO's on any issues they are working on.

The Misdemeanor Repeat Offender officer (MROP) works on identifying career criminals that are repeat offenders for misdemeanor crimes that impact the quality of life in the neighborhoods of the precinct. This program works with the City

Prosecutors office to get enhanced sentencing for these offenders for arrests on crimes they are continually committing, these can include but are not limited to assault, trespassing, shoplifting, and many more. This officer also works on enforcement efforts as it relates to transients panhandling or soliciting, camping on private property and the other crime issues related to transients but also works on assisting transients in getting services or assistance if they request it. There is one full time officer assigned to this position and

a second officer that is technically a CAO but due to the nature of this assignment is assigned to this program as well.

The Programs Coordinator works on the squad and coordinates the many precinct wide functions for our neighborhood groups such as Coffee with a Cop, Community Alliance Meetings, coordinates and assists residents who participate in the PNP Program (Phoenix Neighborhoods on Patrol), works with businesses to execute Authority to Arrest for trespassing issues, liaisons with the

downtown Community Programs Bureau and assists the CAO's with any issues they need help with.

This is just a brief description of what we do at the Black Mountain Precinct Neighborhood Policing Unit. Below is a list of assignments and contact information of the officers and areas for the CAO squad. 

The price for a home alarm system has become very affordable with or without central security monitoring. Also, when going out of town, the City of Phoenix Police Department has a free vacation watch where you can sign up to have your home checked up on by a patrol car from time to time. Desert Ridge has some of the lowest crime rates in the Phoenix metro area but we

can do even better. The best way to lower the crime rate and keep it down is through prevention. We need to stay vigilant and keep an eye out at all times, not only for our own homes, but for those of our neighbors as well. That will help us keep property values up and continue to make Desert Ridge our "Shangri-La".

We have fantastic anti-crime programs in Desert Ridge with our off-duty City of Phoenix Police Patrols, our Silent Witness matching grant program, and even our Urban Tactical security patrols. WARMING UP

Before You Head to the Trail!

It's the Phoenix winter and the weather is beautiful. For exercise many will decide to go out for a hike on one of the valley's numerous trails. Hiking is an extremely popular activity that people chose for their regular exercise routines. Yes, many of people are on a time crunch and just want

to hit the trail. Many people forget to warm up or stretch due to their busy schedules. Not warming up can lead to an injury or a nagging muscle strain.

Research has been shown that a dynamic warm up is more beneficial for some-one than static stretching and no stretching at all as it helped to improve a peoples power and agility just by performing a dynamic warm up (1).

Dynamic stretching is stretching refers to performing movements done in a slow and controlled manner to warm up your

muscles and joints rather than classical static stretching. Dynamic stretching can be as simple as arm circles, toe taps, lunges or squats.

I recommend before you decide to hit the trail spend at least a few minutes to warm up. This can significantly help your body prepare for your hike. So, here is a group of functional dynamic stretches that will get you warmed up and ready for the trail. Perform 5 to 10 times per movement and then switch legs to ensure warming up both side of your body.



Explorer Middle School Visual Arts Teacher






In this edition of Artist Spotlight I would

There are three pen & ink stippling drawings. Students create these drawings by dipping a pen into ink and they stipple all of the detail and value for the drawing to come to life. The wolf drawing is half pencil drawing with shade and shadow and the other half is created using a zentangle patterns.

I am so pleased with the level of work, commitment, and passion these talented students have demonstrated with their artwork.





